WILLING HANDS AND HEARTS.

A FEW days ago a poor man, learning from the canvasser, that we were expecting shortly to start a health institution, insisted on paying threepence instead of a penny for his Good Health, asking that the extra two pence be applied toward the forwarding of such a good enterprise. The amount, of course, was small, but the spirit that prompted it is admirable.

It is this spirit of co-operation that our medical missionary work most requires in getting a successful start in Great Britain. When every one who knows these principles will faithfully do what he can to pass the knowledge on to others, the work will prosper. Some have thought that lack of money is the main hindrance; but with a thousand pairs of willing hands and a thousand loving hearts, the money will not be long in coming.

Let those in every church who feel the burden of the medical missionary work, pray that the other members may also be led to see more clearly that the health principles are a vital part of the message which is to go to all the world. There are a thousand Sabbath-keepers in Great Britain, all of whom must have realised some benefit from the health principles. Let us remember that grief-stricken mothers are laying their little ones to rest beneath the sod for lack of the light God has given to us. Many others are afflicted with disease, who might be well and strong.

Will not every reader of the Worker bestir himself to take part in this work, by the circulation of our health journal? Do as the wife of one of our ministers did the other day. Visit the people in your own street and neighbourhood, and invite them to take the paper. If you go from door to door with your heart brimful of love for humanity, you will have rich experiences, and you will want to go again.

Don't wait till you have a lot of time. Go out if it be for only a half hour. Missionary work thus accomplished in the midst of trying home cares and burdens, is fraught with the richest blessing. The Christmas numbers of both Present Truth and Good Health, will afford opportunity for every one to do some work during the next few weeks that will tell for eternity. The offices furnish both papers at a liberal discount, so that if each member should sell only half the number ordered, and give the others away to the poor, there would be no loss. Let us sow liberally, that we may reap liberally. Let every one have a part in this work.

SCOTLAND.

As we have not made any report to the WORKER since coming from the Leeds meeting, we take this opportunity of doing so. We have removed our public meetings from Bath Street, into a more commodious hall in a very thickly populated part of the city. While we have not had at any time large audiences, we have seen a growing interest in the meetings, and a very encouraging attendance. Brother J. Stokes is connected with me here in the work of the Gospel ministry, and we have had times of refreshing in the enjoyment of the sweet presence of God.

In connection with our meetings we are conducting a series of Gospel health meetings. Monday evening, Oct. 27, we opened the first of the series with a very encouraging attendance. The programme was arranged so that while making the meeting interesting, it would also be profitable and conducive to the good of the people. A ten minutes' talk was given by the writer, entitled,

Free Ventilation." This was followed by a short address given by W. B Scott, on "Correct Breathing," after which Sister Mary Lamie gave a practical demonstration in the treatment of lung diseases. In connecting the two great lines of Gospel work, we are simply giving the "right arm" its rightful place in the body, the only place where it can be productive of everlassing good.

We are glad to report the interest manifest in the members of our Sabbath-school, in the lessons arranged. This quarter we formed four good adult classes, one intermediate, and three primary classes. We believe the Sabbath-school to be a "tower of strength" in the education of our people in the message for this hour.

Cottage meetings are also conducted from week to week in Glasgow and the surrounding districts.

Brethren E. Aplin and R. M. Lamie, who are engaging in Bible work and canvassing, are also assisting in these meetings. The conducting of cottage meetings while being inexpensive, has proved to be a very efficient means of reaching the people with the truth. Sister M. Lamie, who has been labouring in Liverpool for the last two years, has now joined us in this country, and we are sure the Lord will continue to use her as a means of blessing to this people.

Our readers will be pleased to know that something is also being done in the city of Edinburgh. Brother D. P. Miller and family have recently arrived from New York, and settled in Edinburgh. Brother Miller is working on true missionary lines, by going about doing good. He is introducing Present Truth, our pioneer missionary paper, and also carrying the Gospel of health for the body through our organ the Good Health magazine. The Lord will bless his labour of love.
