FROM THE FIELD.

On Nov. 28, I left London for a tour in the North. I first called at Birmingham, remaining there over Sabbath and First-day, with Brother Andross. The North England Conference Committee held a meeting considering plans and arrangements for the work in the Conference.

On Dec 2, Brother Andross and I went on to Liverpool to meet our brethren coming from America on the *Majestic* Dec. 4. There were in all, twenty-two in number, destined for the British field and other parts of Europe. The Lord had blessed them with a good passage for this season of the year. We extend to all a most hearty welcome.

From Liverpool I went on to Belfast. Here I remained till Dec. 17. I was much pleased to find Brother Hutchinson and all the workers of good courage and very busy, and the work making steady headway. At the time I was with them some precious souls took their stand for the Lord, and identified themselves with the Gospel message for this time.

The health work has made a decided advance-5. They have been able to secure a rented : wase at a very cheap rate, and in a very good sistation, which they have fitted up very neatly and conveniently for a sanitarium. They were just getting is in readiness to receive patients, and give tne various kinds of treatment. I am also much pleased to say that the new institution is well equipped with a small but good staff of workers. Dr. Bell, the physician, is remarkably well fitted for his position, and he is very ably assisted by Brother Replogle and Sister Wright-thoroughly trained and experienced nurses. I much enjoyed my short stay with them in the sanitarium, and was much pleased, not only with the pleasant and convenient arrangement, but also with the spirit of earnest devotion. The presence of the Lord was very manifest around the family altar.

The Lord has greatly blessed the faithful and earnest labours of Brother and Sister Hutchinson. They began the work alone and under many diffi-

culties, but the Lord has been with them, and now their heart is much rejoiced to see the enlarged developments of the work in these various lines. We are also glad that there are prospects of an increase in the labouring force in that field. May the Lord continue to bless and prosper the work there very much.

LABOUR FOR ALL.

The following from an appeal to the people in the California Conference in the Pacific Union Recorder, is equally applicable to Seventh-day Adventists on this side of the ocean, and so we pass it on:—

Let us all wake up, and stand up, and enter heartily, prayerfully, and vigorously upon the work of spreading the Third Angel's Message as never before. Please do not wait to be licensed or otherwise "recognised" by formal action of the Conference Committee. Ask the Lord what there is that you can do. Consecrate yourself to Him, and ask earnestly what He will have you to do. Then begin just where you are, at whatever Christian work your hand shall find to do. And there is abundance of this that can be done everywhere by all.

Many of our people have lived where they now are long enough for all the people of the community to know that they are Seventh-day Adventists, and, through them, that the seventh day is the Sabbath. Many have distributed literature in the neighbourhood where they are to such an extent that they think that the people do not want to read any more. But there is one phase of the work of the Third Angel's Message that has not been so fully employed. That is the Christian help work, or medical missionary work-personally visiting, to help the sick, the sorrowing; taking a personal interest in the daily life and affairs of all who are round about you, to help them in every possible way that need may demand or opportunity offer. This is now the wide-open door through which all our people can enter into the very heart of the work of the Third Angel's Message. And this work, taken up carefally, prayerfully, and considerately, will open the way for the distribution of literature, and also will cause all the people to take a deeper interest in what is the meaning of your being a Seventh day Adventist, and the seventh day being the Sabbath. And this is precisely what the Holy Spirit is given to you for; for thus it is written of our Leader, our Example, our Head. Read it:—

The Spirit of the Lord God is upon Me; because
The Lord hath ancinted Me to preach good tidings unto
the meek;

He hath sant Me to bind up the broken-hearted,
To proclaim liberty to the captives,
And the opening of the prison to them that are bound;
To proclaim the acceptable year of the Lord, and the day

of vengeance of our God; To comfort all that mourn."

When the Holy Spirit is poured upon you for that purpose, if you should not step in and fulfit the purpose, then of what benefit can the pouring out of the Holy Spirit be to you?
