#### BIBLE STUDY.

THE urgent necessities that are making themselves felt in this time demand a constant education in the Word of God. This is present truth. Throughout the world there should be a reform in Bible study; for it is needed now as never before. As this reform progresses, a mighty work will be wrought; for when God declared that His word should not return unto Him void, He meant all that He said. A knowledge of God and of Jesus Christ "whom He has sent" is the highest education, and it will cover the earth with its wonderful enlightenment as the waters cover the sea.

Above all other books, the Word of God must be our study, the great text-book, the basis of all education; and our children are to be educated in the truths found therein, irrespective of previous habits and customs. In doing this, teachers and students will find the hidden treasure, the higher education.

Bible rules are to be the guide of the daily life. The cross of Christ is to be the theme, revealing the lessons we must learn and practise. The Word of God, spoken by Christ in the Old and New Testaments, is the bread from heaven; but much that is called science is as dishes of human invention, adulterated food; it is not the true manna.

In God's Word, is found wisdom unquestionable, inexhaustible,—wisdom that originated, not in the finite, but in the infinite mind. But much of that which God has revealed in His Word is dark to

men, because the jewels of truth are buried beneath the rubbish of human wisdom and tradition. To many the treasures of the word remain hidden, because they have not been searched for with earnest perseverance until the golden precepts were understood. The Word must be searched, in order to purify and prepare those who receive it to become members of the royal family, children of the heavenly King.

The study of God's word should take the place of the study of those books that have led minds into mysticism and away from the truth. Its living principles, woven into our lives, will be our safeguard in trials and temptations; its Divine instruction is the only way to success. As the test comes to every soul, there will be apostasies. Some will prove to be traitors, heady, high-minded, and self-sufficient, and will turn away from the truth, making shipwreck of faith. Why?-Because they did not live "by every word that proceedeth out of the mouth of God." They did not dig deep, and make their foundation sure. When the words of the Lord through His chosen messengers are brought to them, they murmur and think the way is made too strait. In the sixth chapter of John we read of some who were thought to be disciples of Christ, but who, when the plain truth was presented to them, were displeased and walked no more with Him. In like manner these superficial students also will turn away from Christ.

Every one who has been converted to God is called upon to grow in capability by using his talents. "Study to show thyself approved unto God, a workman that needeth not to be ashamed, rightly dividing the word of truth." 2 Tim. ii. 7, 15. This charge to Timothy is to be an educating power in every family.

# The Health Work.

#### THE PURCHASE OF THE SANITARIUM.

WE have long been desirous to see a health institution established in our midst. From all parts of the Kingdom questions have come to us, asking if we had an institution where the methods and principles advocated by this people were illustrated, and where patients might come to receive treatment and obtain instruction in carrying out the laws of health. The interest thus manifested has led the brethren to put forth every reasonable effort to secure such an institution.

In November last our attention was first called to some property at Caterham, in Surrey, fitted up and used as a hydropathic institution.

The location, price of the property and general terms, seemed the most favourable of anything that had been brought to our notice. About the first of January it became necessary to decide at once as to whether we would take the property or not. With

the promise of assistance from America it was decided to purchase the property, at a cost of £3,000, —£2,000 to be furnished by the Mission Board and £1,000 to be raised in this field. Those in charge of the different divisions of the British field have taken hold nobly. The amount to be raised averages £1 per member. It was fully realised that it would be a big task to raise this amount in the short time given, viz., sixty days. But relying upon the faithfulness of our people and their deep and practical interest in this enterprise we have gone forward.

On March 5, the sixty days expired, and the purchase of the institution was completed. We have now taken possession, and arrangements for the operating of the same will be made as quickly as possible.

Now you will all wish to ask us, "And did you get the money with which to make the purchase?" To this we can answer, Yes. The Mission Board sent theirs in good time, and £50 more than was formerly promised. The North and South England Conferences presented their full quota, and Wales and Scotland in part. Ireland, too, sent us a liberal donation. So the money was in hand to pay the purchase price, and there is no debt resting on the institution.

But while a good number of our churches and smaller companies have come forward and furnished their full quota, and some even more, others have not done this as yet. Some have made weekly pledges and others have made promises which they have not as yet been able to fulfil. To meet the deficiency thus caused, the officers of your conferences have secured money for the time being to make up the full quota, thus giving you all an opportunity to come forward with your gifts.

Now, dear brethren and sisters, do not let this matter rest, till your full share is made up. And let the stronger help the weaker. The reason why your conference officers did as they have done, was for the purpose of giving you a little more time to raise your part, and at the same time secure the institution. The conferences have therefore become responsible for an amount that must be returned, and will be when the full amount comes in, and we are assured that this will soon be done.

The blessing of the Lord has followed the working up of this enterprise in a very marked manner. In every place where they have taken hold with faith and courage they have witnessed the Lord's wonderful working in their behalf. And the blessing of the Lord will still continue as we go forward. Any in the South England Conference may continue to send in their contributious to Mr. A. Bacon. May the Lord's blessing continue with this work is our earnest prayer.

#### A FEW WORDS WITH OUR WORKERS.

We have been greatly encouraged to note the progress made by the friends who are handling Good Health in different parts of the field. This suggests the importance of supplying the paper to customers as early in the month as possible. We are usually able to supply the papers from the office between the 20 h and 25 h of the preceding month, and we are glad to get our agents orders as early as possible.

Excellent words are also coming from our readers, whose interest in the principles seems to be growing rapidly. One friend writes that she appreciates Good Health because "it really tells people how to live." Of course, this is the object of the magazine, and when the workers who handle the paper are themselves in touch with these principles, and are learning day by day to carry them out more fully in their own homes, it enables them to drop a suggestion now and then, that will prove very helpful to the readers. Truly disease is rapidly increasing, and a great many people are looking anxiously for light and instruction that will enable them to escape its ravages.

Professor Shaw, who is in charge of our mission work in India, writes that Good Health is much appreciated there. The workers find that it is an aid to them in getting into the homes of the people. and bringing them the whole Gospel. Some of the natives are also taking up the circulation of Good Health, and showing much interest in it. Beginning with the April number we are printing an edition of a thousand for the work in India, with a special cover. Our brothers and sisters in Canada are also taking a deep interest in the magazine, and have ordered a permanent club, which they expect to increase shortly. If any of the readers of the Worker have friends in these foreign fields, they may be glad to know that the paper can be sent to any country in the Postal Union for the small price of 1/6 per year, post free.

We would ask the Worker family to do their best for the special temperance number of Good Health, which will be out the latter part of the present month, and will be dated April. It will also be our Easter number. The Lord has opened the way for us to secure contributions from some eminent temperance workers, and we feel certain that the magazine will sell readily. There will be

articles from Lady Henry Somerset, Professor G. Sims Woodhead, of Cambridge, Mr. J. T. Rae, editor of The Temperance Record, and also some paragraphs from the Bishop of London. These prominent personages have done much for the cause of temperance reform, and their contributions will help to interest the people in the magazine. We also have an important article from Dr. Kellogg, dealing with the beginnings of intemperance, and bringing out clearly some of the special principles of true temperance. Dr. Waggoner contributes an article on "The Root of Temperance." Brother John Pypsr, of Belfast, editor of The Bible Temperance Educator, writes on "The Wine at the Marriage in Cana." Dr. F. Fleetwood-Taylor, of London, takes up the treating of accidents and emergencies without the use of alcoholic stimulants. Dr. Hoenes and Dr. DeForest also have excellent articles. The magazine is well illustrated, containing cuts of a number of the most prominent temperance workers, and also a beautiful frontispiece, together with a full-page announcement of our new sanitarium at Caterham.

We have sent out a circular letter to all our workers asking them to fill out a preliminary order blank, and return it to us at once, so that we may know just how many copies to priut. There should be no delay in this. The present is an opportune time in which to spread a knowledge of true Bible temperance. The country is being overrun with alcoholism, which is gaining ground very rapidly, especially among the women. People of the world see these things, and are deeply concerned. How much more should we be, for how can the solemn truths of God's Word be comprehended while the mind is under the influence of drink?

Circulating this number will also enable our brethren and sisters to come in contact with and assist the temperance workers in their immediate vicinity. You can consistently ask their co-operation in circulating this number of the magazine. which is devoted especially to temperance. Some have not been able to contribute their full amount toward the Sanitarium Fund. While taking hold and circulating a large number of copies of this issue of Good Health such can make up the amount, and thus help the work in two ways. The children also can do splendidly with a paper which contains such an interesting variety of cuts. We feel confident that you will all do your very best. May the Lord bless each worker abundantly, and give health and strength, and much of His special grace for this important house-to-house work.
