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I SHOULD ATTEND CAMP-MEETING

Because

"The camp-meeting is one of the most important agencies in our work. It is one of the most effectual methods of arresting the attention of the people and reaching all classes with the gospel invitation."

"Properly conducted, the camp-meeting is a school where pastors, elders, and deacons can learn to do more perfect work for their Master. It should be a school where the members of the church, old and young, are given opportunity to learn the way of the Lord more perfectly, a place where believers can receive education that will help them to help others."

"Our camp-meetings are arranged and held at great expense. God's ministers who advocate unpopular truth labor excessively at these large gatherings to bear the message of mercy from a crucified Redeemer to poor fallen sinners. To neglect or treat these messages with indifference, is to slight the mercy of God and his voice of warning and entreaty."

"God has committed to our hands a most sacred work, and we need to meet together to receive instruction, that we may be fitted to perform this work. We need to understand what part we shall individually be called upon to act in building up the cause of God in the earth, in vindicating God's holy law, and in lifting up the Saviour as the 'Lamb of God which taketh away the sin of the world.'"

"The faith of most Christians will waver if they constantly neglect to meet together for conference and prayer. If it were possible for them to enjoy such religious privileges, then God would send light direct from heaven by his angels to animate, cheer, and bless his scattered people. But he does not propose to work a miracle to sustain the

faith of his saints. They are required to love the truth enough to take some little pains to secure the privileges and blessings vouchsafed them of God. The least they can do is to devote a few days in the year to a united effort to advance the cause of Christ and to exchange friendly counsel and sympathy."

"Our camp-meetings are the golden opportunities of the year for our religious work. Like the annual feasts of ancient Israel these seasons are an important means of education. Anciently * with offerings of gratitude they came, from the men of white hairs to the little child, to meet with God in his holy habitation. As they journeyed, the experiences of the past, the stories that both old and young still love so well, the songs that had cheered the wilderness wandering were sung, God's commandments were chanted, and, bound up with the blessed influences of nature and of kindly human association, they were forever fixed in the memory of every child and youth.' Surely no effort should be spared to make our summer gatherings count for all they should be in the lives of our dear boys and girls, and the 'blessed influences of nature and of kindly human association' should not be lightly regarded."

(Concluded)

God has not left the subjects of his kingdom without a visible seal or mark to distinguish them from the subjects of earthly powers, in addition to the secret sign or seal in the gift of the Spirit, by which they are sealed unto the day of redemption. The Lord said unto Moses, "These are the words which the Lord hath commanded, that ye should do them. Six days shall work be done, but on the seventh day, there shall be to you an holy day, a sabbath of rest to the Lord." Ex. 35:1,2.

And further, "Moreover also I gave them my Sabbaths, to be a sign between me and them, that they might know that I am the Lord that sanctify them." Eze. 20:12.

God blessed and sanctified his holy rest day. How appropriate, then, that he should make this the sign of a sanctified people. This sign, like the realm to which it belongs, is for time and eternity; for the Lord will have a tried people in all ages, whose loyalty will be revealed in loving obedience to his commands.

The Sabbath can never become the sign of rebellion. The seditious of all ages have sought to obscure the Sabbath either by utter disregard for the day of rest, or by substitution. True Sabbath-keeping is prompted only by love, and cannot, in the very nature of things, belong to the realm of force.

God, who is love, knew the power of love; and he knew that love in the human heart would lead man to seek to help his fellow. In other words, when the helpless one had sought the Lord, and he had delivered him from the powers of darkness, and translated him into the kingdom of his dear Son (Col. 1:13), that one, having found the new realm, would immediately begin to work for the deliverance of others, thus becoming an ambassador of the kingdom of Christ. This work requires revenue, and the Lord has not failed to provide for it in his word, so that those that minister about holy things, having no inheritance among their brethren, may be maintained in the Lord's work; for we read: "And behold, I have given the children of Levi all the tenth in Israel for an inheritance, for their service which they serve, even the service of the tabernacle of the congregation." Num. 18:21.

Nor is the priest or minister exempt from rendering support to the Lord's cause in the earth because he has only that which the Lord has given him from the people; but he also must be an example of rendering material support: "And the Lord spake unto Moses, saying, Moreover thou shalt speak unto the Levites, and say unto them, When ye take of the children of Israel the tithe which I have given you from them for your inheritance, then ye shall offer up an heave offering of it for the Lord, even a tenth part of the tithe. And this your heave offering shall be reckoned unto you, as though it were

the corn of the threshing-floor, and as the fulness of the wine-press." Num. 18:25-27.

From Malachi 3:8 we learn that the Lord requires his true people to make offerings for the support of his kingdom on earth, in addition to rendering to him his own; and that he regards the withholding of either by the subjects of his nation as robbery. It can not be, then, that any that are guilty of robbery of God's kingdom in the time of its need, in order to prosecute the work for the salvation of men, will ever see the inside of the glorified kingdom. The nation, kingdom, or church which the Son of God, with the Father, has established on earth, is the same that will be glorified eternally. The nations of earth represent the highest idea of human organization; but the wreck of these is foretold in the following language: "Yot have I set my king upon my holy hill of Zion. I will declare the decree: the Lord hath said unto me, Thou art my Son; this day have I begotten thee. Ask of me, and I shall give thee the heathen for thine inheritance, and the uttermost parts of the earth for thy possession. Thou shalt break them with a rod of iron. Thou shalt dash them in peices like a potter's vessel." Ps. 2:6-9. And when the universe shall witness the overthrow of man's dominion, then shall come to pass the words of the prophet: "And thou, O tower of the flock, the strong hold of the daughter of Zion, unto thee shall it come, even the first dominion; the kingdom shall come to the daughter of Jerusalem." Micah 4:8.

Here again, the king, and Zion the church, are inseparable. The Son of man, when requested to explain the parable of the wheat and tares said, "He that soweth good seed is the Son of man; the field is the world; the good seed are the children of the kingdom; but the tares are the children of the wicked one: The enemy that sowed them is the devil; the harvest is the end of the world; and the reapers are the angels. As therefore the tares are gathered and burned in the fire; so shall it be in the end of this world. The Son of man shall send forth his angels, and they shall gather out of his kingdom all things that offend, and them which do iniquity. . . . Then shall the righteous shine forth as the sun in the kingdom of their Father, Who hath ears, let him hear." Matt. 13:37-43.

In this language we have in brief the entire history of the people of God down to the time of their deliverance. It is noticeable that every name applied to them by inspiration signifies an organized body, whether it be nation, kingdom, Zion, or the body; and also that this body is all that will survive the wreck of nations,--the burning of sheaves, which is only another name for the organization of men, and all else that has cursed this fair earth.

I have only briefly touched upon a few points relating to organization as outlined in the Scriptures, but with the hope that it may lead to more thorough study of this important subject.

We reached the home of Brother Evens a little after noon where we were entertained until the next morning. Here, in the afternoon, we had the privilege of taking a real Finnish bath in a Finnish bath house which rested and refreshed us very much.

The next morning Brother Bjork and I started alone through the woods for Brother Loukinen's home, making a call or two on the way, reaching there about one o'clock. They were filled with joy at seeing us, for they have very few callers, living three miles from their nearest neighbor with only a foot path to their home through the deep woods.

As they were both very desirous of being baptised, we devoted the time to the study of the Word with this in view. As Brother Bjork is a man upon whom the Spirit of God rests and who is sound and firm in all points of the faith, I felt that I could depend upon him much in this very important work as interpreter. We found them to be sound and firm in everything as far as they understood. They accepted the light on the tithe, the only question being how it should be paid. They paid a faithful tithe on all they had in the house before I left there the next morning.

Owing to the limited opportunities which they have had we took much time and care in explaining the truth and examining them. Surely God has been their teacher by his Holy Spirit.

The next morning about eight o'clock we made ready and went down to the river about ten minutes walk from the house. As soon as we reached the stream Brother Loukinen fell down upon his knees and, raising his hands to heaven, poured out his heart in prayer. I then prayed, Brother Bjork interpreting. When we arose I led them into the water, and there, in the depths of the forest, in the rushing waters of the Gravered River, with none but their little family, Brother Bjork, and the angels of heaven near, I buried them with their dear Saviour in baptism.

It was a blessed occasion. The woods seemed to be full of angels. Of all my work in the Gospel ministry, this was the sweetest experience.

After returning to the house we made ready to take our leave. Brother Loukinen guided us on our way to the end of his land. There, dropping upon his knees, he motioned for us to kneel, and taking us each by the hand, he prayed. Then Brother Bjork prayed, myself praying last. We then arose and bade him farewell, not expecting to meet him again in this life, yet joyful in the Blessed Hope of the very near future.

Praise God for this first fruit from among the Finns of this region. O, brethren, it pays to pray for the Finn.

VISIT AMONG THE CHURCHES.

Leaving Petoskey May 21st, at 6 A. M., I arrived at Onaway the afternoon of the same day, where I was driven to the home Brother Jas. O'Reilly, and set about for the perfecting of plans for the Sabbath-school Institute program, which had been sent out ahead and was to be held the following Sabbath.

On arriving at the place of meeting, we found a neat church building in the very midst of the business part of a town of 2500 population. Eight years ago the little church was built in the edge of the native forest, which shows how rapidly towns grow up in the northern country. A goodly representation was present to take part in the exercises.

Among the papers read and discussed were, "The Training of Teachers", "How to Become a Soul-winning Teacher", "How to secure Home Study," "The Superintendent's Blackboard," "Five Common Mistakes of Superintendents," "Five Common Mistakes of Teachers", "How to Make Our Opening and Closing Exercises More Interesting."

A lively memory verse drill was given by the boys and girls, each verse illustrated by an appropriate drawing on cardboard.

When the subjects of "Need of Trained Teachers," "Proper Use of SABBATH SCHOOL WORKER", and "Home Department Members", were up for discussion, a lively interest was shown and many valuable thoughts brought out by different ones. One of the best teachers expressed himself as being unable to teach without the help given in the WORKER, and all felt that they derived great benefit from the suggestions it gives.

In regard to the Home Department work some of the young people volunteered to take up that phase of the work, looking after the isolated ones as a part of their regular missionary work, their motto being, "Every Isolated Member in Our Vicinity to be gotten into the Home Department Work."

The Young People's Society is raising money for a library and several conversions have taken place of late, the result of the Young People's work. One young man recently converted is taking a lively interest in the work of the society and says he wants to do all he can to advance the work of the young people because they did so much for him.

When the Standard of Attainment and Missionary Volunteer Reading Course was explained to them, it was evident that it is too late in the year to begin that work now but one of the members suggested that they begin now to save money with which to buy the needed books for next year.

A good work was done here last year by the church school teacher, Mr. Ludington, who is now at Berrien Springs studying for the ministry, and as he will not teach next year, the school board are showing their interest for a continuance of the good work, by asking already that an efficient teacher be sent them. Several of the young people are planning to go away to school in order to better fit themselves for the Lord's work.

May 25th, I visited Whittemore. Here I found Sister Craig who is an old pioneer in the message, and a sister of C. L. Taylor, also the Miss Taylor who has been in India several years as a missionary. The same interest is seen here, in the educational work as was noted in other places and they will either have a church school or those who have children will move where they can have the advantages of a Christian education.

At Rose City we found the prayer-meeting that "didn't die." Altho there are but two families of Adventists here, Brother Mathew's and Brother Dwight Spencer's, they have a regularly organized Sabbath-school and never miss having the weekly prayer meeting. These two families are doing what they can to scatter the light of truth and are petitioning that help be sent them by way of a tent effort. Thus the truth will be carried, the faithful one reached, and then shall the end come.

In the midst of a prosperous farming community, looms up the little church of Omer, which is also their school-house. The building is newly papered, sides and ceiling, equipped with patent seats, blackboards in abundance, an organ, and other things that make it convenient for school work. The brethren are now raising money to paint the outside and when this is done, they have a building that will do credit to the cause of God and to our schools.

It being "Educational Day" the program sent out by the General Conference was carried out, each one showing his interest by carrying his part of the program. The discussion that followed helped to impress the truths brought out.

Some removals from this place have in a measure weakened the work, but those who are left feel that the work must be carried on, and a special effort will be made to maintain the Young Peoples Society, even tho they will meet but once a month.

At this place also they are paying plans for a church school and calling for efficient help. May the Lord grant their desires.
