While crossing the Atlantic, and about one thousand miles in mid-ocean. we overtook a small steamer bearing the name of the Rose Lea, loaded with lumber and bound for England. we came nearer her, we could see that she was making an effort to come nearer us, and when we were about a quarter of a mile away she began signaling to the effect that having lost her steering gear she was quite helpless, was drifting, and wished assist-

taken in tow, but our officers said it would delay them two weeks, so refused the request, and our vessel passed on and left them behind, drifting.

This might seem to some to be a cruel, heartless thing to do, but remember it was not a case of life or death with the crew; they were in no immediate danger, as the weather was calm, and the sea smooth, and they had not yet come to the point of abandoning their ship. What they wanted was to save the cargo, to hold on to their wordly possessions, to save the vessel, and were willing to run any risk in order to do it. So we left them drifting with every breeze and wave, and what became of them, or rather what would happen if a severe storm arose and found them in that condition, one could easily imagine. It was sad to leave the little boat alone on that great expanse of water, without anything to guide them, but if they would stay with it what else could be done?

There are many such souls among us as a people who could be well represented by this steamer. They have lost faith in the truth, and consequently in the Word of God, their steering gear is gone, they are drifting with every wave of temptation and sin, but still they cling to their old craft of worldliness and are not ready to leave it, and will run any risk to stay by it. Were they ready to leave it and come on board God's vessel of truth which is strong, safe and sure, they would soon be carried into the port of safety. ance. WESTERN WASHINGTON.

RATES TO THE CAMP-MEETING.

Our brethren and sisters are very likely wondering why we have not given notice before this late date respecting reduced rates to the campmeeting at Kent. We can take space enough to say only that the arrangements with the railroad company for special rate have just been completed, though we began negotiations with them some weeks ago.

We herewith announce to our people in Western Washington that the usual offer of a fare and a third is made for those coming by rail to the meeting.

The following points should be care-

- (1) No one can get the reduced fare where the regular fare to Kent is less than fifty cents.
- (2) No return ticket will be sold for less than twenty-five cents.
- (3) Pay full fare on purchasing ticket to Kent, being sure to take certificate from agent showing payment made. Hold this receipt till you reach the camp-ground, and there have it countersigned by C. E. Knight, conference secretary. This will entitle holder to purchase return ticket from Kent to starting point for one-third regular fare. The offer to us of this reduced rate by the railroad company is conditioned on there being not less than one hundred persons coming to the meeting over the railroad lines and holding the regular certificates. Hence we urge all who can do so consistently to come by rail so that we may not be disappointed in getting the offered reduction in fare.
- (4) Tickets under these special arrangements may be purchased over the Northern Pacific not more than three days before the opening day of the meeting, May 16, and are good for return only two days after the close, May 26; and over the Great Northern any time from two days before the date when work begins on the ground, which is May 6, to three days after the close of the meeting, May 26.
- (5) Hold your baggage checks till you reach the camp-ground and there get advice at conference head-quarters in reference to drayage from depot to the camp.

Those coming over the Great Northern and having baggage checked will likely have to re-check to Kent in Seattle. It will be in the same depot, however, and can be quickly done.

The camp is about one-half mile west from the Northern Pacific depot and about five blocks west and north from the Seattle-Tacoma Inter-urban station.
