

# Adventist University Choir Given 1<sup>st</sup> Award in Korea

dventist university in Korea was widely broadcasted through TV newsduring an evening golden hour on January 18, 1999. The music department of Korean Sahmyook University was invited to have the 1999 New Year's Music Concert during the noon hour on January 18. It performed in the lobby of the Government Sechongno Buildings in Seoul, and was sponsored by the Ministry of Government Administration & Home Affairs and Government Buildings Management Service. The program was under the auspices of the government's Ministry of Education.

The university group was warmly welcomed by Director General of Government Buildings Management Service. Then Dean of Student Affairs of the university expressed heartfelt thanks for this opportunity. The 40-minute program attracted over 600 people, many were government workers.

The program was filled with variety. It included a violin trio, male double trio, soprano solo, tenor solo, female and male duet, and male choir. Although Korea is still under the IMF situation and is struggling against financial difficulty, these students raised their voices with happiness, joy and hope expecting something special for the new year. Since the audience was the general public, songs were chosen from Korean and foreign folk songs.

When the double trio sang bright and joyful songs like "O sole mio" and "Funicule funicula," attendees responded by clapping their hands. Everyone was pleased with the excellent music offered free of charge.

The Adventist university was asked to present this program because of their male choir of the university. The 22nd National University Music Contest was conducted under the auspices of the Ministry of Education in the Korean government at Yon-Se University on November 12, 1998. Korean Sahmyook University's male chorale took the prestigious first award. The university's male choir received the same award last year too.

The choir is composed of 52 students. Ten are from the music department, I from business administration and 41 are theology students. While the choir was trained by Professor Suk Ki Kim, the conductor was Hun Chin Pe, and the pianist, Hye Lim Han. Both are students. They sang a German folk song "Pine Tree" and a Negro spiritual song "Steal Away", and won the first prize among 18 universities in Korea. These two songs were arranged by Professor Moon Yang Cho.

The Korean Sahmyook University has received the 1st award six times, and also other awards since 1977. Consequently, the name of Sahmyook University is well recognized, especially among music lovers. The university has approximately 2,800 students; and, of those 160 are studying music.


#### Prosperous Language Institutes in Taiwan

anguage institutes in the Northern Asia-Pacific Division are very effective instruments to share our faith to others. We currently have English laguage schools in Japan, Korea, Taiwan, and Mainland China. Additionally we have now a request to start an English school in Mongolia. This means that we need many more English teachers from abroad. We would like to ask the readers of this newsletter, NEWS & VIEWS, to respond to this modern "Macedonian Call" from these countries.

The writer had an opportunity to visit the English schools in Taiwan on November 22, 1998. When I arrived at Kaohsiung Airport, Mrs. Marlene DeCoito, Director of San Yu English Bible Center, and Golden, who is one of her office secretaries met me. After serving in Thailand, Marlene came to Taiwan. She has worked there 4 years.

They took me to 5 branch locations of the English Bible Center. Most of the English schools are in conjunction with Seventh-day Adventist church huildings. However, there are exceptions. Some schools are in commercial buildings and one is in a hospital operated by an Adventist physician.

Presently there are 8 branches in Taiwan with a total enrollment of around 1,300. They have 32 foreign teachers. Some are from South Africa, U.S.A., Canada and Jamaica. A number of teachers are from South Africa because the director comes from that country. English schools in Taiwan are very blessed hoth spiritually and financially. The existence of English schools brings enthusiasm for evangelism and financial help to the church. Teachers are very enthusiastic witnesses although they are young and inexperienced in theology.

These young teachers are faithfully working for the Lord in spite of many cultural differences. Each English class is composed of less than 10 students. They usually teach 7 hours a day for 4 days per week. Furthermore, they spend their time from Friday to Sunday sharing their faith to other students through Bihle study, outings and other activities. As the result of their effort, many students are led to know Jesus Christ as their personal Savior. Since Taiwan is not a Christian country and the people have a strong family tie, it is not easy to baptize people whose loved ones oppose the change in their religion. In spite of such difficult situations, there are 10 to 15 baptisms annually through the English schools.


## Learn English Bible Seminar

anuary 11, 1999, the doors of the Northern Asia-Pacific Division large meeting room were opened to the residents of Ilsan, Korea. A red banner, stretched across the front of the room, showed that they had come to the "Learn English Bible Seminar." The seminar was scheduled to begin at 5:30 pm, but many interested students arrived early. Several local newspapers carried the advertisement for this special seminar and brochures were handed out in public squares.

"Learn English Bible Seminar" fits its name exactly. The only textbook is the Bible. Worksheets have been prepared using mnemonics. The lessons follow the 27 fundamental beliefs of the Seventh-day Adventist Church as they are presented through God's Holy Word. Each evening they discuss a new topic and vocabulary, and they practice pronunciation. The worksheet becomes the property of the students so they can take it home for further study. Approximately 60 students attended the first evening. An introductory test was given to each student to ascertain their level of English comprehension. Several did not have an adequate understanding of English to be eligible for the classes. However, the present attendance averages about 40.

The young come, seniors come, mothers bring their small children and come. All are welcome. The opening evening each student was given a registration card and a new Bible. The Bible will be their free gift if they attend at least 10 classes. Sonja Kim and Hyun Sook Park, secretaries in the Northern Asia-Pacific Division, have played an important role in preparing the materials for these classes. Lily Cho and Jae Wook have also actively participated in welcoming the students and have assisted where needed each evening. The classes are held three days each week: Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday from 5:30 to 6:30 pm.

The classes are free. The Bibles are free. The lesson materials are free, the certificate upon completion of the Seminar will be free. So, also, the salvation offered through Jesus Christ is free. It is our privilege to make "... this gospel of the kingdom" available to anyone who is interested. Local church pastors attend regularly. They will study the Bible with anyone who wishes to continue after the close of the seminar.
