

Chinese Union Mission (CUM)

Inaugural Session In HK

he inaugural session of the Chinese Union Mission (CUM) was held under the motto, "One Accord, One Mission," on June 13 - 15, 1999, at the Kowloon Panda Hotel, Hong Kong. The CUM is the outcome merging the South China Island Union Mission (SCIUM), covering Taiwan, Hong Kong and Macao, with the East Asia Association (EAA) including mainland China and Mongolia. In the meantime, Mongolia was separated from the CUM and became an attached mission field of the Northern Asia-Pacific Division (NSD).


There were 107 attendants. Among them were 2 from the General Conference (GC), 6 from the NSD, 77 from the former SCIUM, 9 from the EAA, and 13 special guests. Although there were many seats reserved for the delegates from mainland China, we could not see any direct delegates. There were no representatives from government offices or religious bureaus in respective territories.



Jan Paulsen, General Conference President


One of the special guests was Jan Paulsen, president of the GC, who contributed to make the CUM a reality. He was the chairman of the GC Survey Commission for the SCIUM and EAA. Furthermore, he served as the chairman of EAA in 1995 and 1996. In the opening ceremony of the session, he said, "This is really a historical meeting... Our business is spiritual ... Salvation is always a gift ... God does not reject anyone to be saved ... If God does not give up saving people, why can we give up because of difficulties of evangelism in some countries?"

It was another characteristic of the session to invite the former presidents of the Far Eastern Division and SCIUM, and chairmen of East Asia Committee. All invited people could not come, however, Ottis Edwards, Doyloe Barnett and his wife, Samuel Young and his wife, Nathaniel Yen and H. Carl Currie participated in the meeting. Most of them were assigned to the morning or midday devotionals.

P.D. Chun, NSD president, began to preside over the session and he gradually passed its chairmanship to Eugene Hsu, the first president of CUM. There were 14 prepared issues to discuss. Some of them were, "Chinese Union Mission Operating Policy, "Structure of the Chinese Union Mission," reports of the SCIUM and EAA, etc. One of the most important items was the nominating committee. The 21 committee members, including the 3 officers of the CUM (Eugene Hsu, president; Stanley Ng, secretary; Paul Cho, treasurer), spent about 8 hours with prayers and opinions to choose associate officers, departmental directors, union executive committee members, and union institutional board members. want to introduce myself and share with you some of our plans for the Ministerial Association (MA), Global Mission (GM), Health Ministries (HM), and Adventist Global Communication Network (AGCN).

After serving 18 years as a district pastor in the SAD, IAD, and NAD, I served as the Church Ministries director for the Texas Conference. Then we moved to AIIAS, where I taught Missions and Evangelism for six years. Close interaction with students at AIIAS and in their home churches gave me a new vision of the needs of the church of Asia. At the end of May, 1999, I came to the NSD to work in the offices listed above.

My wife, Nolly, is a teacher by training. She is presently serving as a secretary to the Associate Secretary/Communication/PARL departments of the NSD. Our son, Christian, is presently serving as a pastor of the historical church of Battle Creek, Michigan. Our daughter, Melissa, is presently taking a year off from her studies at Southern Adventist University in Tennessee to be a student missionary in Poland.

My pastoral and teaching experiences, as well as twelve books that I wrote while teaching at AHAS, are available to congregations, pastors, institutions, and church organizations in our division.

Seminars, such as, "Witnessing among World Religions," "Church Planting," "Adventist Church Growth," "Urban Missions," "Effective Soul Winning," "Public Evangelism," and "Adventist Pastoral Ministry" are some of the services provided by the MA. In the area of GM, I envision an army of Pioneers entering non-entered cities and people groups. The challenges of the NSD will not be met by only a handful of lay workers participating in church planting. Volunteers should contact their local Conference/Global Mission coordinators. We will provide training to these courageous church planters.

Since health evangelism is an effective, entering wedge, we want to secure a proper connection between health programs and doctrines through immediate and adequate follow-up. I envision health institutions working hand-in-hand with gospel workers in soul winning efforts.
