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50th Anniversary of Radio Ministry

in Tokyo, Japan

he Japan Union Conference of the Seventh-day Adventist Church has celebrated the 50th Anniversary of the Voice of Prophecy Radio Broadcasting in Japan with the attendance of around 100 on September 1, 2002 at the Seventh-day Adventist Tokyo Central Church in Tokyo where the former union office with studio was located. Seven among nine radio pastors in the past 50 years were able to attend this special occasion both from mainland Japan and overseas including the U.S.A. and Korea.

The first regular weekly radio program started through Radio Tokyo Broadcasting Station in Tokyo in 1952, though one time radio program produced by the church was broadcasted in 1949. The first radio pastor was Paul H. Eldridge, an American missionary to Japan at that time, who was able to speak Japanese very fluently. Although he was not able to come to Japan this time because of his age, 88 years old, he gave a video message and affirmed that the inauguration of the radio ministry in Japan was just God's miraculous guidance as well as the financial support from the General Conference of the Seventh-day Adventists.

The Japanese Voice of Prophecy program began on August 2, 1952, through JOKR, a 50,000-watt station which reached 40 million Japanese. The broadcast was heard each Sabbath at 8:30 a.m. P. H. Eldridge was the program director and speaker. The program was made according to a format similar to that of the American Voice of Prophecy broadcast. Thus, Japan was the first union to use Voice of Prophecy radio broadcast in the Northern and Southern Asia-Pacific region. The beginning of the radio broadcasting in Japan was an epoch-making event for the Seventh-day Adventist Church, because the North American nationwide radio broadcast of Voice of Prophecy had been inaugurated in 1942, only ten years earlier.

From the second radio pastor or speaker to the current ninth one, Japanese workers have succeeded the job as radio

pastor. The 30-minutes weekly radio program on Sunday became once very popular through the major commercial radio stations in the country and was known as "Sunday Family Hour" composed of the children's story, listeners' birthday celebration and messages to adults. In the meantime, however, the program was later changed from 30 minutes weekly to 5 minutes daily, "Hikari to Tomoni," (6 times a week) targeting to only adults.

In addition to this medium-wave radio program, in 1987 the Voice of Prophecy studio in Japan began to produce 60 minutes (currently 30 minutes) daily short wave program for the Adventist World Radio/Asia-Pacific region being broadcasted from Guam.

The contents of the 50th anniversary program were a brief history of the radio ministry in Japan presented by video pictures, interview with the past radio pastors, special music, and so on. Besides the past radio pastors, many former and current staff of Voice of Prophecy participated in and enjoyed the program and fellowship with their friends.

The Voice of Prophecy studio in Japan is now working for not only the radio programs, but also the Bible Correspondence School, cassette/CD/video production, Internet and satellite evangelism, etc. Thus, the studio plays the role of a mini media center in the church. The current director of the Voice of Prophecy and Speaker in Japan is Tadashi Yamaji whose father was also the former director and speaker.

On Sabbath afternoon a group baptism was conducted and 24 souls were baptized into the church. In the closing program for the weekend each of Taiwan Mission's 9 districts reported on the Lord's work in their districts and shared both testimony and song to the glory of our Lord.

The Lord richly blessed the time spent in sharing. Plans are underway to hold another camp meeting in the coming year.


