### First Production of AWR Programs

in Mongolian

he first Mongolian radio programs for Adventist World Radio (AWR) were produced at the headquarters office of the Mongolia Mission Field (MMF) in Ulaanbaatar, Mongolia on July 7-13, 2003.

Tadaomi Shinmyo, Communication Director of the Northern Asia-Pacific Division (NSD), visited the country to assist Dale Tunnell, MMF Director, and two staff who were assigned to produce the radio programs. The staff were Eggie, male script writer and speaker, and Sarah, female script writer and speaker. Furthermore, Enkheh, office worker of the MMF, became announcer of the program. Besides these three workers of the MMF office, Tomroo, a Baptist Christian and technician of a private FM station in Ulaanbaatar, really helped in recording and editing for the programs. Without his faithful cooperation, we would not have been able to accomplish the task.

Recording of the radio programs started on July 8 in the studio established at the basement of the MMF office building. Although the studio is humble and simple, it functioned well in keeping the recording room quiet for four days with electricity. In the meantime, the staff was

forced to record at Dudley and Eunie's family (Filipino missionaries) apartment because of electricity problem in the MMF office for one day (July 8).

The production of AWR programs in Mongolian had been already planned in 2001 with the help of Akinori Kaibe, AWR Asia/Pacific Region Director, and necessary equipment was donated to the MMF by AWR. Therefore, it was a great joy for all of them who participated in the production. They produced 13 weekly programs and each program was designed for thirty minutes.

There are three major parts in one program and this format is the same in all programs. Namely, after introduction by announcer, the male speaker talks about the secrets of human relation, then listeners can enjoy Christian music. Thirdly, female speaker shares Bible stories. In the end, announcer appears again requesting the listeners' responses as well as informing Sabbath programs, mail address, telephone and fax number, and email address of the MMF headquarters.

The production team will continue to prepare the radio programs regularly so that the AWR Guam Station may receive sufficient number of the Mongolian programs for broadcasting. The first Mongolian broadcast is expected from October 2003.

### in Guam and Japan

n Adventist World Radio (AWR) Conference was held at the AWR Station in Guam on June 27 and at the Japan Union Conference (JUC) Office on June 30 - July 1, 2003 under the leadership of Akinori Kaibe, AWR Asia/Pacific Region Director.

The production workers of AWR in the Northern Asia-Pacific Division (NSD) were invited to participate in the conference. They were Tadaomi Shinmyo, Communication Director from the NSD; Daniel Jiao, Director of the Chinese Union Mission Media Center; Tadashi Yamaji, Communication Director of the Japan Union Conference (JUC); Miyuki Hatazawa, Announcer of the JUC studio; Kozo Abe, Technician of the JUC studio; and Ki Myung Lee, Producer of the Korean Union Conference studio.

The participants learned how the AWR Guam Station is operated and managed, and also to communicate with its staff face to face. Beginning broadcast in 1987, the station is now sending the Adventist messages in 24 languages for 56 hours per day through four curtain antennas. The short wave radio programs from Guam reach almost half of the globe.

After moving to Japan, they visited the JUC radio production studio and video production studio, respectively. Then, they discussed to strengthen Internet ministries in the NSD and presented their own union's current Internet usage. # Taiwan Community Service Responds to SARS

hen the recent outbreak of SARS hit Taiwan, the Church asked itself what it could do to help. Besides outlining clear measures for local churches to follow in fighting SARS, Community Service leadership contacted US-based Adventist health-care facilities to enlist their help in donating much needed medical equipment. At a time when isolation gowns were in short supply on the island, the church was able to provide 15,000 gowns to hospitals and government centers.

The generous gifts were made possible by a number of American hospitals, including Loma Linda Medical Center, Florida Hospital, Kettering Medical Center and Glendale Adventist Hospital. In all 15,000 isolation gowns were donated, 640 N95 masks, 200 tympanic thermometers, 366 special isolation jump suits, 4,000 surgical masks and 288 special face shields. In addition to these the Chinese Union Mission donated 10,000 face masks for distribution to church members throughout the Mission.

# Women's Leadership Education *in KUC*

he Women's Ministry Department of the Korean Union Conference is coordinating an active and fruitful work each year. Each church in the union follows the International Women's Day of Prayer in March and Women's Ministry Emphasis Week in June. Through these efforts, each church is providing spiritual discipline, leadership education and evangelistic work for women. Especially in the area of preaching in which women have not been allowed to participate, significant change in thinking is

happening. Many churches, which previously did not allow women to preach at Sabbath worship, are providing such opportunities. One church which had not had any female preacher for nearly 100 years recently asked a woman to take the pulpit. These

changes are reflective of the hard work that many women have done to change the prevailing attitudes in the Korean church.

In addition, a "School for Mother" has been run in churches with the goal of training women to be more effective and caring mothers and to lead their unbelieving husbands to the faith. About 200 women attended this training program and graduated about 150. On April 23, a professional women's meeting was held at KUC auditorium. Professional women such as doctors, college professors, pastors, and counselors discussed how they could contribute to the work of God and what type of structural changes were needed for women to take a more active part in church work. For example, the attendees called for change in attitudes as well as structural improvements that would lead to more female leaders being elected to union and local conference offices and committees.

On June 6-8, KUC hosted a retreat for families of female pastors. It focused on spiritual discipline for female pastors and healthy family life. Also, the retreat reaffirmed the calling of the pastors and

discussed the unique ministry opportunities that these pastors face. Participants of the retreat suggested that female pastors receive equal respect and benefits as male pastors. The Korean Union Conference has 828 pastors among whom only 18 are women.

In each local conference of the union there is at least one women's evangelism team. During the first half of this year, these teams held four evangelistic meetings that led to 13 baptisms.

## **Death of Pioneer Medical** Missionary - George Innocent

r. George Innocent, who pioneered medical work in Singapore, has died in Loma Linda, California, at the age of 93. A memorial service was held at the Loma Linda University church chapel.

Dr. Innocent was born in Warwick, New York on September 30, 1910. He married Florence Carter on June 23, 1935 in Eagle Rock, California. They first did mission service in Seoul, Korea for three years. Then they spent two years at the Bangkok Adventist Hospital. When the war came to Thailand, he was in charge of closing the hospital and the Japanese imprisoned the Innocent family. After just a short time, they were repatriated and left for the USA.

The General Conference asked Dr. Innocent to go to Singapore in December of 1946, where he made plans to start medical work in Singapore. He opened a clinic in February of 1948 in two renovated front rooms of the Southeast Asia Publishing House. Thus started the Youngberg Hospital in Singapore.
