#### -0-Our Tithe and Mission Offerings

The tithe receipts for the first five months of 1938 still show a gain as compared with the same period of 1937, but the percentage of increase was down to 4.6 as compared with over 13 per cent earlier in the year. It appears that financial conditions generally are samewhat less favorable, as reflected in these figures. However, we understand that crop conditions over the most of the union conference field are somewhat more favorable than last year, so are hopeful that they will be a factor toward increasing the income of our people and the tithe receipts for the support of the cause.

The average per capita mission offerings though, have not increased at all, as you will observe from the mission fund statement; for the increase show in the per capita offerings from Iowa and Minnesota was offset by the decrease in those from the Dakotas. We greatly appreciate

the incerase shown in the offerings from Iowa and Minnesota and sincerely hope that with at least somewhat better conditions in the Dakotas, the offerings from those conferences will also increase. After hearing at campmeeting of the great needs in the mission fields, and observing the rapid decline of religious liberty in many countries, surely the Midsummer Offering to be given on Sabbath, July 16, to supply the most pressing needs, should receive a liberal response from each one of us. May the Lord help us all to be faithful stewards of what He entrusts to us, and may we each enjoy His promised A. R. Smouse, Treasurer, blessing.
