Counsel From a Great Leader

The counsel given and the plans laid by the veterans in this movement have made Seventh-day Adventists a progressive denomination, and for our guidance and advancement we are still following in the pathway outlined by the faithful pioneers in this blessed hope.

A little over thirty-five years ago Elder A. G. Daniells, who at that time was president of the General Conference, devoted much of his time to building and maintaining a strong colporteur force in every conference throughout the North American Division. Said he—

"You know and we all know that the revival of the canvassing work means the revival of other departments of our work. This work calls into service young men and women who would otherwise turn to the world. It gives them an experience that fits them to be sturdy workers in other departments of the cause. It brings into our churches a missionary spirit. It is the most economical line of work in the denomination. . . . It is the most practical and personal work we are doing. The canvasser goes to the people and he leaves literature along his track. Those who do not purchase, have their attention called in some way to the last message of God to men. . . . Surely a work of this character deserves the most earnest and persistent effort on our part for its revival. I hope you will write this matter up for your conference paper and that you will correspond with every minister and church officer you possibly can. . . for the purpose of arousing the brethren and sisters to take hold of this work. If the month of October could be devoted to earnest efforts in this line, many persons might be induced to take up the work by the first of November. This would give them seven or eight weeks' canvassing before the holidays."

in this line of work and that you are fully aware of the times in which we are living, also the unfinished task which is before us, I appeal to you again to contact your Book and Bible House or field secretary, requesting full detailed information concerning possibilities with the Home Workers' books. The Registrar's Office

Perhaps to many people a registrar's office seems a place where a person answers a few questions and fills out some blanks, and is thus enrolled as a member of the particular school he has decided to attend. Perhaps they think of it also as a complete record of student's grades in the courses he has chosen.

The registrar's office at Union College is this, and more. From this office are issued to other institutions of higher learning, to medical colleges, to nurses' training schools, and to teacher-certification authorities, transcripts of the credits of former students. In this office are compiled each year summaries of enrollment and other statistics which are used in the institution's own study of some of its problems, and in the many and varied reports that must be made at intervals during the year to the union conference and the General Conference, to educational associations, and to the United States Department of Education and other governmental organizations.

During the summer a great deal of correspondence with young people who are thinking of attending college is handled by the registrar's office group. This "summer campaign" work includes mailing out catalogues, sending application blanks to those desiring them, assembling entrance credentials of applicants for admission, and seeing that each application receives the attention of those whose approval is necessary before a letter of acceptance can be written to the applicant.


The workers in the registrar's office this summer include, besides the

registrar, three young women who are working practically full time, and two who work from one-half to twothirds of their time in this office. One of those who works full time is the president's secretary. She also has charge of keeping up to date the lists of young people to whom information concerning Union College is sent from time to time. Another is employed in issuing transcripts and compiling considerable of the data to be used for statistical purposes. The

others assist in the correspondence that is handled through this office and in the various miscellaneous duties incident to the work in any office.

Altogether, the registrar's office is a busy, happy place where a group of young women are earning a part of their college expenses and receiving training that will be useful to them when they have completed their college work.
