The General Conference Committee's Council

The General Conference Committee's Council at Takoma Park, Washington, D. C., April 4-15, continued several days longer than was expected.

Many questions effecting the world-wide work of Seventh-day Adventists were considered. Some of these questions were perplexing and far-reaching in character. The council was held in the convenient, yet plain modest building of the General Conference office recently erected in Takoma Park, Washington, D. C.

The report of our missionary operations and the treasurer of the General Conference showed that 1905 had been the banner year in our work in foreign fields; that over fifty thousand dollars more means had been raised for the foreign work in missions in 1905 than in any year previous, and that a corresponding extension of the work in the foreign lands had corresponded to the liberality of the people.
