### SABBATH SCHOOL WORK.

*Dear Superintendents:* I have been thinking for a long time of writing you about the work in your several schools. You remember that several things were talked up in our Sabbath school work last year. We hoped that much would have been said through the INDICATOR this year. There are some probably in every church and society that do not attend the Sabbath school, who observe the Sabbath or are favorable to it. Will you not take pains to see that all such persons are supplied with the lessons, and use your best efforts to get them all out to your schools? We are living in a time when every Sabbath-keeper should be thoroughly posted in the lessons of practical religion that are contained in the lessons for this quarter. Every day we should make it a point to do something to get others interested in the study of the Bible.

Where the brethren and sisters are much scattered and you cannot visit them, write to

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them asking them to come and join the school, and see that families who cannot attend, are supplied with proper books so that they may get their lessons at home and keep a record of same with collections, and report every month to your secretaries: so that we may know how they are prospering. Much more can be done than now is, if every officer and teacher is faithful in trying to get others into the school. There may be those among first-day keepers who have children that you can get to come and join the school. You can reach such children sometimes easily, and then there is a chance to do something for the parents. Satan is marshalling all his forces and should we not also be active in our work?

Precious souls may be saved by your faithfulness. You may think that just looking after those who come to the school on the Sabbath is all your duty, but think it over and see if each of you cannot find someone that you can interest in Bible study. You will be surprised when you once engage in the work of searching out those who can come if properly approached. There may be children who would come and have not clothes so that they can. You might arrange it so that what is needed might be furnished in a way not to offend, and thereby win a soul for the kingdom; let the children know you are interested in them. Some of the older brethren and sisters may think they cannot learn their lessons, but encourage them to come and perhaps use their Bibles, or let the teachers ask them questions that are easy to answer, so win their confidence and help them to have confidence in themselves.

CUTLER.—Sister Mandana Cutler, wife of Charles Cutler, was born April 30, 1836, at West Falls, town of Aurora, N. Y. She was married to Mr. Cutler of Aurora in 1858. For several years she was a member of the Methodist Episcopal Church; but between seven and eight years ago, she began keeping the seventh-day Sabbath, and also espoused the faith of a soon personal advent of Christ. Her faith in God and her love for his Word enabled her to develop a Christian character, which did not leave her during her long days and nights of suffering, and gave her light and support through the valley and shadow of death.
