# A Retrospect

The year 1922 will go down in history as one of sorrow and disturbance, from which troubles our work and workers were not altogether exempt. The first months of the year were saddened by the Russian famine. At times it seemed as though hundreds, if not thousands, of our own believers would perish, but thanks to the prompt and liberal help of our brethren, relief was given in time to save almost all of them. In August and September our people in the Levant Union passed through a trying experience. As the Greek army was driven out of Asia Minor many of our believers were banished and some lost their lives. We have but few believers left in Asia Minor and the church in Constantinople has been greatly reduced in membership. In Russia we lost one of our most fruitful ministers, Brother Grietz, who died shortly after baptizing over one hundred new converts, at the close of a remarkable revival effort. In November Brother Wilson, who has laboured so successfully in Siberia, was arrested and is still in prison. The colporteur work, too, has met hardships of various kinds in Central and Southern Europe.

We mention these hindrances only to emphasize the more the great victories and signal success granted us by the Lord, for during 1922 the Advent Movement made good progress in the European Division. On the whole our work has been favoured with more freedom from the governments than in previous years. Our missionaries and conference labourers have enjoyed good health. The attendance in our schools is larger and our students are doing well. We have been able further to enlarge our mission work. Encouraging reports are coming in from our faithful labourers in the regions beyond.

Our secretary, W. K. Ising, has spent the winter in a very profitable trip visiting
our scattered believers in the Near East. In Mosul he baptized seven precious souls and organized our first church in Mesopotamia with eight members. In North Eastern Africa, the missions in Gallaland, Abyssinia proper and Asmara have been organized into a Union Mission. The prospects before us in that field are encouraging. All through 1922 we received urgent requests from Brother Raspal, our missionary in Mauritius, that work be begun in Madagascar. The Division has now taken steps to send a missionary to begin work in that large island this year. Brother Hall recently visited Egypt and plans are being laid to print several books there in the Arabic language. The sale of literature in the Division, as well as our other activities, has increased, as the various reports in this quarterly will show.

In our great objective, that of soulwinning, we have had a good harvest. The number of new converts gained was 8,275. We have gone over our membership list with care and our net increase is 4,156. This brings our membership to 62,831 . In a letter just received from Brother Löbsack in Russia it is stated that in 1922 they baptized I,757 in that field, which is considerably in excess of the ruprs that came to us. Judging by letters iron all parts of the Division we feel fret to say that this year promises to be very fruitful in soul-winning. The financial situation in Etrope is unusual. Owing to the great drop in the German mark our funds do not show up as well as they otherwise would. Our tithe in 1922 was 2,262,381 Swiss francs, while the offerings were 907,442 francs. In closing we want to express our gratitude to all who have made this good report possible. The future is indeed uncertain but we must be stouthearted, hasten on the work, watch unto prayer and give to God the best that we have.

## The Statistical Report.

The year 1922 has been marked by the fall of European currencies. Of these the German mark has been affected the most. In January, 1922, one dollar equalled 175 marks, but in December it took 6,625 marks to buy a dollar. As a result thereof prices and wages in Germany went up, but not in proportion to the fall of the mark. Consequently the value in American currency of the tithe and offerings from Germany depreciated from month to month, but on the other hand more funds came in. In spite of these circumstances the tota! contributions of 1922 exceeded, as shown below, the total contributions of 192I by $\$ 9,468.9$. The literature sales were
$\$ 4,09 \mathrm{I} .93$ lower than the preceding year, owing to the fact stated above that the prices did not rise in proportion to the fall of the mark.

## The Home Missionary Dept.

For many years Home Missionary work has been carried on successfully and diligently by our faithful members in all the unions that make up the European Division. The first step towards an extensive organization in Europe was taken when we gathered in Gland at the close of 1922. The result of last year's Harvest Ingathering work was $\$ 7 \mathrm{I}, 137.57$. This amount is lower than last year, but it must fis noted that it is die to the low rate of
exchange of the German mark, and that in truth the amount not only shows a gain, but a high gain in comparison witn the year 1921. At that time the value of the mark was 245 to the dollar, but at the close of 1922 and the beginning of 1923 it fluctuated between 9,000 and 50,000. From this it is evident that no matter what zeal our brethren in countries with low currency might have put forth, they never could have reached the amount of the previous year. The 900,000 papers used were distributed in nineteen languages. The

An example of how our people feel towards this plan is apparent from the following letter which I received from a servant girl recently. She writes:
"Now we have come to the Self-Denial Week, and I rejoice that the dear people everywhere are so happy in making a sacrifice. As the giving of money is no sacrifice for me, I have been pondering just what I ought to do, in order to really bring one. A voice seemed to whisper, 'You can bring a sacrifice in abstaining from food which you relish.' Love makes everything possible and quickens us to find means and ways, does it not? So I told Sister H. just to give me dry bread during this week, and no eggs, cheese, milk or other things which we usually have. I think I shall be able to gather a few crowns in this way. And there is still another offering I want to bring, and that is myself. May the Lord look upon all

## What Have Our Young People Accomplished in 1922 ?

OUR young people are rapidly developing into a strong factor in our missionary advance. The record of the past year as shown in our report indicates that the young people are entering into soul-winning work with the vigour and enthusiasm of youth. Ig2I had a good record with an average of 5 missionary visits for each society member. During ig22 we have an average of more than 9 missionary visits per mem-
ber, a total of 80,398 missionary visits by our young people. Counting an average of 5 missionary visits a day for a minister, it would take 50 ministers, working 6 days in the week for 53 weeks to do this work. But it has been accomplished by 8,647 young people under the leadership of 45 secretaries. This is not all, for these young people have also given 55,009 Bible readings, distributed 559,447 papers and magazines, 13,049 books, II3,996 tracts, and have written 12,628 letters, receiving in answer to these 6,292 .

If the fifty ministers mentioned above had attempted to do this work each one would have had the following daily programme to carry out:-

## The East German Union.

THE membership of this union at the close of 1922 was II,912. It is the fifth largest union in the world. It embraces seven organized conferences and one mission field, including all of Eastern Germany and Lithuania. Our workers during the year consisted of ordained ministers 6I, licensed ministers 28 , licensed missionaries 17 , temporary and self-supporting Bible-workers and missionaries 50, medical workers and nurses 44, and colporteurs 213 . The total number of churches in the Union are 317. In Berlin alone there are 27 with a membership of 1,799.

Notwithstanding the fact that Germany has been under such a severe financial distress during 1922; the mark so unstable and the wages low compared with the high cost of living, our people were faithful in paying their tithe and offering. The total tithe amounted to $42,435,449$ marks, a per capita of 3,562 . The total amount of offerings to missions reached $13,370,370$ marks, a per capita of 1,122 . Our dear people are always faithful, and never fail to help when help is needed. Their purse is constantly consecrated to the work of God, which they love.

The total contribution for home mission work amounted to $3,000,000$ marks; forlocal church work, $10,000,000$ marks, and the amount of the tithe appropriated to fields outside of the conferences reached the sum of $4,243,544$ marks.

The eleven church buildings throughout the union owned by the legal association are valued at $91,200,000$. Neither of these buildings has any debt resting on it, unless it be such as has already been provided for by the union.

Neither have the conferences accumulated any debt during the year on account of the tremendous fall. of the mark. The tithe always covered the salaries and lab-
our expense. At the close of the year there were still over 7,000,000 marks surplus left, which was distributed as equally as possible among the conferences to serve as a working capital.

Our Mission Seminary at Friedensau, and our sanitarium at Zehlendorf, are both making commendable progress. The seminary is now a junior college (fourteenth grade school), with a good strong faculty elected for next year. We are very much encouraged with the prospects of the school. A goodly number of students of our three German schools, who are finishing their academic (twelfth grade) work are planning to attend school at Friedensau next year for the purpose of taking the two years' advanced work planned for them there.

The sanitarium is also making more than ordinary progress. During 1922 a large additional building was erected, so that at least ino patients can now be accommodated. By far the larger part of the expense of this new structure will be covered by the earnings of the institution; the rest has already been provided for by the union.

The work in our Lithuanian mission field is still in its infancy. Our present membership in that field is eighty, with four churches. There are, however, about twenty-five to thirty souls waiting for baptism and organization. What we need the most in this field is literature in the vernacular. We hope to get this soon.

Last, but not least, might be mentioned the missionary activities in our churches. The value of our book and literature sales by our lay members amounted to 12,566 ,440 marks last year. We are glad to report that our young people are taking a very active part in our church work. We have a large host of young people in our union who will be the burden-bearers of the future. May the Lord keep them strong and faithful.

has in a special manner blessed our workers and our churches. The same is also true of our institutions.

The work done by the departmental secretaries has been greatly appreciated, and surely these faithful workers are doing excellent work. It is interesting to see how they gather both old and young around the banner of the cross, and how they are able to instruct and inspire the people to go out in the cities and in the country selling our good papers, tracts and magazines, and thus sowing precious seed and leading souls to Christ. This, together with the faithfulness of our dear people in paying an honest tithe and giving liberally of their means, has in a vigorous way contributed to the advancement of the threefold Gospel message.

In 1922 the Lord added I, 346 new members to the Scandinavian Union, and the ontlook for 1923 is even better than it was a year ago. On an average the public meetings have never been so well attended as they have been this winter, and our institutions have never had brighter prospects than they have at the present time. And best of all, there has never been such a longing in our churches for a deeper experience pertaining to spiritual things as there is now.

Brother G. E. Nord, who since October I, I922, has been in charge of the Scandinavian Union, together with a staff of faithful ministers, doctors, nurses, teachers, Bible-workers, colporteurs, and other workers, is busy proclaiming and spreading the truth. They are all of good courage, trusting fully in God and their brethren. God is leading them and working for them, and behind them stands a faithful and loyal people, supporting them with their prayers and their means. Let us pray for the work in the Scandinavian Union. ## The Latin Union.

While the Latin Union can boast of no great accomplishments during the past year, it can truthfully say, to the glory of God, that in most ways the year 1922 was the best and the most prosperous in its history. Under the blessing and guidance of Heaven, advancement was made in every field and in every department.

The debts on the institutions at Gland
were reduced 75,000 francs, and our other two union institutions materially increased their assets without increasing their liabilities.

The income in tithes and offerings showed a marked gain over 1921-the returns from the Harvest Ingathering Campaign alone being far in excess of the entire amount given for missions by the Latin Cnion during any one year previous to 1920.

Our new school at Collonges completed a successful school term, and entered upon its second year's work with confidence. Extensive improvements were made, and considerable new equipment added. All of this was paid for in cash, so the school continues as it started-free from debt.

In May, 1922, the French publishing house was moved from Gland, Switzerland, to a good property that had been purchased for it near Paris. A new cylinder press, a linotype, a power cutter and other valuable equipment were installed in the plant. Even with these increased facilities, the house has to work overtime to meet the demands made upon it by the field, and the prospects are that more room, as well as more machines, will have to be provided soon.

The colporteur work made remarkable progress during 1922 -both in the territory of the French publishing house and in other parts of the union. New books were printed in Italy, and a good corps of colporteurs is being developed to carry the printed page to Italy's forty millions.

The past year's evangelistic efforts added to our churches between three and four hundred souls. We hope the day is not far distant when we shall see many times that number won for God annually in this great field.

The believers throughout the Latin Union join in praising God for the blessings of the past year. To Him belongs all honour and glory for what has been accomplished. To Him we also rededicate our lives for greater and more faithful service. The work in the Latin Union, with its 125 million people, is hard, and often perplexing; but we face a brighter and more promising future than everand we face it with perfect confidence. With the help and blessing of God, we know that success is sure.

## The West German Union.

We are glad to welcome the reappearance of the Quarterly Review. ## The Colporteur Work.

Those who have the truth to proclaim in Europe have indeed a great work entrusted to them. Obstacles will always come to hinder our work, but the Lord wishes us to work on in faith till His time come. Europe has received the call: "Go forward." "The greater the difficulties are that have to be overcome, the greater the victory will be that is gained."-"'Life and Work."
"We are fast approaching the end. The publishing and spreading of our literature,
which contains the truth for this time, should constitute our work."--"Testimonies," Vol. 8, p. 89.

Europe is surely that part of the world which has been most visited by war, famine and political disturbances during the last years. Despite all these circumstances a great work has been accomplished in the matter of scattering our literature, and yet there are countries where hardly a beginning has been made, and therefore the future holds much work in store for us before the Lord's work is finished. The books and papers containing our truth lie strewn like autumn leaves. At the convention in Gland, where all our union field secretaries and publishing house managers were present, the aim we set ourselves was: "An increased circulation of our literature in all lands and languages." We have to-day in Europe twenty-one publishing houses, and nearly 1,ooo canvassers, whose constant occupation is the circulation of our books and papers. Two new publishing houses, in Rumania and Czechoslovakia respectively, have been opened lately, and a third one in Budapest is nearing its completion. A1though our colporteurs in those countries do not hold an actual permit to canvass with our books and papers, yet they are doing their work joyfully, knowing that the Highest Authority has sent them on this errand. In countries where canvassing has been done for years, the seed sown is beginnning to spring up, and we see many honest souls being won to the truth as a result of our literature, which first of all drew their attention to the third angel's message. The colporteur work is missionary work of the highest order when done in the right way.

As in the past year all reports were sent straight to America instead of being forwarded to the Division Office, I am not able to quote exact figures for sales, but shall be able to do so next time.

## British Union Conference.

During the year 1922390 persons were added to the church membership of the British Union. Of these 315 were received by baptism and 75 by profession of faith. The total losses by death and other-
wise were heavy, reducing the net gain to 50 persons.

Because of adverse financial conditions, as compared with the year 1921, there was a decrease in tithe amounting to $£_{1,760 \text {.- }}$ 3 s . 2 d . and in mission offerings amounting to $£_{\mathrm{I}, 857.8 \mathrm{~s} . \mathrm{IId} \text {. }}$

Our gross sales of literature were $£_{25,999}$. Is. Iod., with a net profit of $£ 564$.

Our sales of health foods were $£_{16,776 \text {. }}$ 9s. 3d. with a net profit of $£_{594}$.

Stanborough College began the school year with a student enrolment of 103, 78 of whom were resident and 25 of whom were non-resident. In London two additional church schools were established.

During the early part of the year an addition to Stanborough Sanitarium was completed at a total cost of a little more than $£_{I, 400 \text {. This extension adds materi- }}$ ally to the treatment-room facilities and greatly increases the comfort and efficiency of that excellent institution. Because of these improvements, the Sanitarium has obtained increased patronage.

The British Union Conference administration building was completed at a total cost of $£ 2,456$. 10s. 4 d .

During the latter part of the year plans were begun for materially increasing our evangelistic work. With faith in God and steadfast confidence in the final triumph of present truth, we are looking forward with pleasure to the tasks of 1923.

## The Central European Union.

Wirn regard to our report for the year 1922 we should like to draw attention to the number of souls won during the year. We gained by baptism and vote 1,029 souls. Although times are very hard our Union has been able to settle with its workers according to the circumstances obtaining at the time. Also we were able to raise the working capital of the conferences out of the surplus so that they were enabled to pay the wages for the first months of the year.

At present our conferences count only in millions without exception. Not only our Austrian workers, who receive more than one million kroner for the month, but also our workers in the German fields are now millionaires counting their wages for
the year. German Switzerland is the only one of our fields with a stable currency. In our union we are able to apply in all directions the conjugation of the grammatical rules: bad, worse, worst, and also good, better, best!

The report for the four quarters of 1922 gives us a very good picture, such as we have not had for a long time. In the Central European Union we baptized 959 and gained by vote 70 souls; of that number 128 souls have become members of the Austrian Conference. Austria is a country of purely Catholic inhabitants. In Vienna we have had good success in spite of the difficult conditions. In this place we baptized 74 souls.

In spite of the significant raise in wages which had to be arranged for, our members have been loyal in their offerings and tithes, as the report shows.

Our departmental work is enlarging more and more and is of very great help in stabilizing the progressive work in our fields.

The medical missionary work in our Union will receive a new impulse not only through the enlargement of our sanitarium at Aibling-in which institution our school has been held during the winter monthsbut also on account of Dr. P. Schmidthe secretary of the medical mission-being there as leader.

Besides our Home for Nurses in Wiesbaden we have a good number of young sisters who desire to become nurses. Sister Jandola Surber, of Swiss nationality, is now engaged by our Union in visiting and teaching the churches in our fields to promote this important department of our work.

The most serious question in all parts of our Union is the need for halls. Many churches do not know where they will hold their meetings on Sabbath.

The reason is as follows: If we pay our workers enough so that they are able to live with their families, this will not allow us to rent or buy meeting places for public work because the costs are too high, and meetings cannot be properly advertised.

During the last year we were able to bny some properties and fit up some of our rented halls with the help of the General Conference.

In Zürich where we have one of our best
churches on the continent (there are 270 members) we were able to buy a property in the best part of the city. The general meeting of the European Division will be held there this summer.

The expression of our trust as workers in this Union you will see from the motto: Eben ezer!

## The Regions Beyond.

During the past few weeks we have reveived several letters from our missionaries in Africa. They all breathe the spirit of hope and courage. There is a real desire on their part to co-operate with the mission board in its arduous task of financing the work in all parts of the world today. The great thing that concerns them, however, is what to do with the many calls that are pressing in upon them. Word comes from one field after the other making calls for teachers and workers. There is a real awakening in the hearts of those who have been so long in heathen darkness. They are now going to the missionaries themselves and calling for help. Brother Langford who has charge of our work in West Africa writes concerning a chief who has repeatedly requested that we send a worker to his village. When Brother Langford visited there recently he expected to put the chief off by promising to send a worker next year, but on his arrival he found a number of people keeping the Sabbath though no worker had ever laboured there. They had gone ahead and erected a little building where they were meeting for worship. They were all ready for a school. There are many other instances like this. The great question that concerns the heart of the missionary is, How can we say no to these people? And really this is a grave question. Here are these souls in heathen darkness, groping their way toward the light of life. It certainly lays a heavy responsibility on us who are more favourably situated. Oh, that God would lay upon us the real burden for souls and that we may keep our eyes on the regions beyond as well as on
the home fields! Let us by all means strengthen the bases at home but always remember that the far-away fields call for men and means so that those of other colour and other tongue may be won for the truth.

## Our Orphanage in the Near East.

Following the Council at Gland, in company with Brother Erzberger I left for the Near East. We studied the situation with reference to the school at Constantinople and were able, in the providence of God, to arrange for its transfer to Salonica. There were naturally diffculties connected with this but it will be sufficient to say that all the young people are now safely located in temporary quarters a little to the east of the above-mentioned city. The matter of permanent location of the school is something that must be considered. We have temporary quarters, however, until near the close of the year. Owing to the fact that about a million refugees have been crowded into Greece which itself has a population of only about five million, one can easily see that any surplus housing accommodation they might have had would be very quickly occupied. Consequently there was no hope for us to secure any building. The only thing we could do was to build. Every step that was taken in this was marked by the distinct providence of the Lord. Now we have a nice wooden erection which provides dormitories for both the boys and girls, and another section containing class-room, chapel, kitchen, pantry, etc. The whole thing cost us a little less than two hundred English pounds. Brother Larson is doing splendid work in the school and has the confidence of all the young people. Brother Greaves rendered excellent help in securing the special advantages we obtained at Salonica. Let us remember this school in our prayers. Pray that the Lord will bless those who have charge of it, also that the young people may be saved for the cause of truth.
