The Statistical Report.

Since 1874 when the work of our denomination was started in Europe it has been growing from year to year. The European Division to-day consists of 17 Union Conferences and Union Missions with 60 Local Conferences and 39 Mission Fields, 23 of which are located in Europe and 16 in the Mission Territory belonging to the European Division. The European Division has 12 larger Training Schools and 12 Church Schools besides a number of native schools in the Mission Fields. 12 Publishing Institutions and 10 Health Institutions are also operated in the Division.

Together with the usual Statistical Report we are printing this time a table showing the progress of our work in Europe from 1880 till to-day. In 1880 the entire number of Seventh-Day Adventists in Europe was 516. At the end of the second quarter this year the Division had 1832 churches with a membership of 65 284. During the second quarter 1923 the tithe amounted to \$ 103,679.70 and the offerings to \$ 39,550.28 compared to \$ 109,810.42 and \$ 30,755.74the same quarter last year. As it will be seen the tithe has decreased while the offerings have increased. 2962 new members were taken in by Baptism and by Vote during the quarter compared

The European Council at Zürich.

For the first time since pre-war days a larger council of the workers in the European Division convened July 13—21 at Zürich where, three years ago, an informal gathering was held for the consideration of problems arising out of the state of war that had been ravaging Europe for a number of years.

Generally speaking this period of "Reconstruction" has not brought the pacification sought and hoped for and so the cause of God has to be carried on, and the walls built, to speak with the prophet of old, "even in troublous times". These days spent together in counsel, however, have been an evidence that the various branches of our missionary endeavour have experienced a constant growth in spite of the many drawbacks and difficulties besetting us on every hand.

The Central European Union, and in particular the Swiss Conference, in whose territory

the conference was held, had done everything possible to provide for the comfort of the three hundred delegates that had come from the fields far and near. They secured free lodging especially for the large company of German brethren for whom also the Swiss Federal Government had reduced the pass-port fees to one fourth of the usual rate in view of the unfavourable exchange of the mark.

The "Kaufleuten" hall, the largest and best place in the city, had been rented at very reasonable terms for the session so that, with all the adjacent apartments sufficient room was available for the deliberations in the full council and the work of the various committees that had been appointed to study the different problems and to submit recommendations. For some of the evening meetings, and on the two Sabbaths, the local church was invited in and quite a few attended from other sections of the country.

The program had made provision for seven meetings a day lasting from 8:30 a. M. until 9:30 in the evening. Strong spiritual food was given in the devotional hour and the two Bible studies of the forenoon, the two former being conducted generally by Elder W. A. Spicer whose help together with that of the other brethren in attendance from the General Conference, viz. J. L. Shaw, H. H. Hall, W. E. Howell and J. S. James was greatly appreciated by all.

We were sorry indeed that none of our Russian brethren could attend the council who felt that, owing to local conditions, they should best remain in the field for the time being. Letters

The business matters of the council were considered in two meetings each day and one hour in the afternoon and the evenings were devoted to the work of the departments, for short reports from the unions and the mission fields, many of them being illustrated by stereopticon views. From 4:30 to 6 sectional meetings were held, the one directed by L. H. Christian for the union and conference presidents, another for the ministers by J. C. Raft, and a third, which was sub-divided into other groups, by H. H. Hall for publishing, educational and other interests. Several hours had been set apart for the discussion of questions handed in by the delegates. Special studies and lectures were such on church organization and discipline, foreign missions, the growing power of Rome, gospel work in larger cities, purity of living etc.

The closing meeting of the council was held Sabbath, July 21, at 3, lasting till 6 P. M., L. H. Christian speaking on "The Mission Outlook", followed by a symposium of very interesting brief talks by some of the missionaries.

Space forbids to enter into the many details of the work done during these meetings. However, in view of the fact that this is the first large council of its kind in the European Division, it was thought that the reports submitted by the committees should be given here in full for the benefit of the workers and officers who will read this paper so as to have them available for cooperation in promoting these general plans and resolutions enacted. Some matters referring to local conditions, and of temporary character, have been eliminated from the body of the reports which we give as follows:

Resolutions.

Gratitude to God.

Being assembled at this Council from many fields in the European Division, we feel to thank God from the depth of our hearts for having made it possible at such a time of political unrest when all the disintegrating forces of the Adversary are at work, to meet here in such a large gathering as representatives of this Advent Movement from different lands and peoples in Christian fellowship and counsel. We express our heartfelt gratitude to our Heavenly Father for preserving our lives amidst these troublous times and for the many evidences of divine blessing in the work He has committed to us as weak instruments and ministers of His grace in carrying the gospel to the world.

We pray the Lord to give us a clearer vision of the importance of these times and of the greatness of the work yet to be done and we consecrate ourselves anew this day for more efficient service in the cause of the Master and thus to hasten the glorious consummation.

Appreciation to America.

As we review the increased impetus given the various lines of our work in Europe by the generous financial help and experienced counsel on the part of our brethren in America, we wish to place on record our sincere appreciation of this material support rendered us through the General Conference requesting that this expression of gratitude be communicated to our dear fellowbelievers in America who, we trust, will continue to manifest a kind interest in, and sympathy for, the work in Europe during these times of our great need.

Greetings to Russia.

It is with a deep feeling of sympathy that we think of our dear brethren in Russia who, owing to the political situation, are still deprived of join us in the privileges and blessings of this Council. As they remember us and our deliberations here in their prayers, we extend to them our brotherly greetings and assurance that we are all one in our aims and purposes, praying God that conditions may soon shape in such a way that our efforts can be united more closely and definitely for the finishing of the work.

Committee on the Ministry.

While all about us in every country we see evidences that the Lord, according to His promise, is pouring out His spirit in a special manner upon the people, awakening honest souls and leading many to call upon God to know the way of deliverance, we recognize anew the need of more Gospel ministers to enter the field, and we realize anew the need of greater power and more complete consecration and a deeper experience in Christ on the part of all ministers, sent of God to give the last message of the Everlasting Gospel to men in these last moments of the judgment hour.

We therefore take upon our own hearts, and commend to others, the following considerations concerning the Gospel Ministry.

- 1. The high calling of this ministry of the Gospel should ever be before the minister who is required of God to walk worthy of the vocation wherewith he is called (Ephesians 4:1). He is to be a "man of God" (1 Tim. 6:11), separated unto the service of God to minister in holiness of life, through the grace and power of Christ, for whom he speaks and lives. He is to be not only a teacher, but an example to the flock in devotion and prayer, and self-sacrifice and earnestness and labour for souls.
- 2. In the midst of a world of low standards the minister of God is under solemn bonds to maintain the high standard of Christ's life of purity, in thought and act, giving no offense in anything that the ministry be not blamed (2 Cor. 6:3), and that no reproach may be cast upon Christ and His cause, whose representatives we are in a special sense (2 Cor. 5:20).
- 3. We recognize that God calls for an efficient ministry, ever increasing in powers of service. To this end the minister is called to live the student life (2 Tim. 2:15), as well as the life of prayerful devotion and earnest work for souls.
 - 4. We recommend that our ministers, in planning a course of lectures, resort to the old plan of presenting the third angel's message in all its fullness, and refrain as much as possible from the presentation of sensational, philosophical and political subjects.
 - 5. We recognize that the proof of the divine call to the ministry is to be shown before the labourer- is ordained to give his life to His service. First should come the fruitage of souls won in evangelistic service, then the setting apart to the full work of the ministry.
 - 6. The Word of God admonishes us to carefulness in the ordination of men to this work (1 Tim. 5:22), in order that only those whom the Lord has called, and who have the gifts for fruitful service should be set apart for this work. As we see the fields everywhere white unto harvest, while the labourers are few, we feel that more earnestly than ever we should pray the Lord of the Harvest to send forth labourers into His harvest. In view of this we ask union and local conferences to be watchful to encourage consecrated young men with evangelistic gifts to prepare to enter the ministry.
 - 7. While we recognize the fact that only the call and anointing of God can fit men for the work of the ministry, we realize also that God expects those who engage in this work to cultivate all their powers, moral and intellectual, for the strongest possible service. Therefore, we recommend that young men intending to enter the ministry be encouraged to attend our colleges and training schools, and take thorough courses of study in preparation for strong and efficient work for God.

8. Having in mind the help that comes to the minister through regular and systematic reading of good books, we recommend that efforts be made to provide a Ministerial Reading Course Committee, asking them to arrange with each Union Conference the appointment of sub-committees for each language area, whose duty it shall be, in counsel with the general committee, to select and recommend books for their reading courses.

Committee on Finance.

- Whereas Divine providence has protected the vital interests of this cause in restraining the passions of the multitudes, over-ruling the affairs of nations and fulfilling the prophetic word concerning our times and,
- Whereas God has committed to us the only means of salvation for both individuals and communities, and is wonderfully blessing His people, granting to them refreshing showers of the latter rain and fortitude during periods of special trial, revealing the abundant riches of His grace in many parts of the earth by turning to the light of present truth large numbers of persons who have received little or no instruction from the living missionary, opening doors of entrance to many localities resulting in constantly increasing calls to which it is our duty to respond without delay, and
- Whereas The instability of monetary values in Europe makes it very difficult for us to provide proper financial support for the cause, therefore Resolved
 - 1. That we do all within our power to overcome these financial difficulties by increased faithfulness in the payment of tithe, enlarged liberality in offerings, and in making arrangements whereby these shall be provided systematically and at regular periods.
 - 2. That our churches throughout the Division adopt the envelop system for collecting tithes and offerings.
 - 3. That we adopt the General Conference plan of a Missions Rally Sabbath each quarter for the purpose of setting the cause of missions before our churches and giving an opportunity for providing any portion of our foreign mission goal that may be lacking, the last Sabbath of the first month of the quarter is to be set aside for this purpose.
 - 4. That in connection with the Missions Rally Sabbath in July we observe a Self Denial Week, and if in any locality this is not a desirable time, the executive committee of the Union Conference select a date to be used in such field.
 - 5. Recognizing the importance of exercising strict economy in all our conferences, missions

and denominational institutions; nevertheless we emphasize the importance of conference auditing committees and institutional boards paying to employees a reasonable, just and living wage, — remembering that "the labourer is worthy of his hire."

- 6. That in establishing new institutions, erecting office buildings, purchasing or erecting church edifices and enlarging existing structures, institutions and institutional properties, we adhere strictly to a cash or "no debt" policy.
- 7. a) That no church undertake the purchase of laud or the erection of a building without first obtaining the counsel of the local Conference Committee.
 - b) That no local Conference either permit or undertake the buying of property or the erecting of buildings for either church or institutional purposes without first seeking counsel from the Union Conference Committee.
 - c) That no Union Conference take any action involving the expenditure of large sums of money for enlarging existing institutions or creating new ones, without first consulting the Division Conference Committee.

Home Missionary Department.

Harvest Ingathering.

- Whereas The Harvest Ingathering wherever adopted has proven to be a great blessing to us and to our churches, to our mission treasury and to the world, we place ourselves on record as being faithful and enthusiastic promoters of this campaign in our different fields, and pledge ourselves as workers;
 - a) to put forth strong efforts in house to house solicitation of funds during the campaign, thereby setting an example to our church members.
- b) To encourage every member in a practical way to take an active part in the campaign.
 The Committee recommends:

That, aside from the setting of a financial

goal, which has proven to be a great help and incentive to faithful work wherever adopted, we favour and encourage the setting of a service goal of at least 10 hours of actual house to house work by every member during the campaign.

Big Week.

We Recommend,
a) That April 13—19 be the date for the Big Week in 1924. Although freedom will be given to the various unions to change this date on account of prevailing conditions in their territory, it is, however, hoped by the Home Missionary and Publishing Departments that this date will be adopted throughout the whole Division. If changes be found necessary in certain fields, the Division as well as the Union Home Missionary Secretaries and Conference Field Secretaries should be notified;

b) That we encourage all our workers and lay-members to give their whole profit on the sale of literature during the Big Week to the Publishing House Extension Fund, and all who are unable to take part in the selling of literature, a whole day's wage to the same fund.

Educational Department.

Inasmuch as our Conference presidents make up a large proportion of the members of our school boards, and

Inasmuch as our Conference workers are in closer touch with the field than our teachers, and

inasmuch as the greater part of our workers have been in our schools and know their value in preparing for service,

We invite a most hearty co-operation on the part of our Conference presidents and all our field workers in carrying the responsibility for the success of our school work, helping to induce our young people to attend our schools and working with our faculties to make our schools efficient to meet the needs of our young people.

Inasmuch as our schools are educating and training our young people to be sent to their permanent place of service in our cause, and

Inasmuch as our Conference and mission field leaders are the ones to direct and counsel them after they have left the school,

We invite our presidents, superintendents and all classes of conference and mission workers to visit our schools as frequently as possible during the school year, to keep in touch with the students and to encourage and counsel them in their work while at school, therefore

We especially urge our conference and mission field leaders to study the needs of the field sufficiently long before the end of school so as to make provision in the work for a maximum number of those students who are ready to enter the field.

Inasmuch as many of our students are finding great difficulty in procuring the necessary means to pay for their school-expenses, and

. *Inasmuch* as we feel it our duty to do all we can to help students to help themselves at this time of trying circumstances,

It is recommended that our conference leaders, school boards and faculties do everything possible to assist them in the following ways:

1. By encouraging the young people to take advantage of the scholarship plan and providing in the school efficient instruction and preparation for their work. 2. By undertaking seriously to develop the industrial work in our schools for its many-sided values as a factor in education and in selfsupport.

Young Peoples Department.

Whereas There are still thousands of young people in our ranks who might be won for the Master and trained for service, if continued and earnest effort were put forth in their behalf,

- 1. We recommend That our secretaries devote a larger proportion of their time to the work of winning young people.
- 2. We recommend That in view of the important work before our departments in the field, we seek for the closest co-operation between conference leaders and secretaries of departments and that each conference strengthen its department work.

Publishing Department.

Recognizing that the circulation of Gospel Literature is the most rapid, and most economical, and one of the most effective means of carrying the message to the world, and that this is especially true in Europe with its large reading population, *We recommend*

- 1. That our Conference officers, workers and church elders join our field missionary secretaries in encouraging consecrated men and women to enter the regular colporting ranks.
- 2. That the advantages of the scholarship plan be carefully explained and strongly urged upon our young people, and that we encourage our school faculties to keep before their students the large opportunities for leadership offered by the Publishing Department.

While it is generally understood that the experiences gained in the colporteur work are such as often to prepare the colporteur for responsibility in other lines of denominational activity, and while we are glad to have such preparation recognized by our Conferences, we believe it should be done in a careful way. We therefore

Recommend that counsel be always had with the Field Missionary Secretary before inviting a colporteur into other lines of work.

Inasmuch as considerable misunderstanding seems to exist over the transfer of colporteurs, we

Recommend that the following suggestion of the General Conference on this subject be our guide in all such transfers:

"86. That we adhere to the recommendations of the General Conference and Union Conferences in the transfer of colporteurs the same as of other workers."

Whereas regular conventions have proved important factors in building up and maintaining

the efficiency of all phases of our publishing work, therefore,

We recommend that a general convention for the Union Field Missionary Secretaries, Publishing House Managers and such others as the Division may select, be held every two years, and that yearly conventions be conducted in each Union for the local Field Secretaries and such others as the Union Committee may invite.

Whereas Successful work must be preceded by a thorough preparation of the canvassers,

We recommend That the canvassers' institutes in the local Conferences be held at least from three to five days.

Sabbath School Department.

In view of the rapidly increasing churchmembership in the European Division and the need of their being thoroughly and systematically instructed in the Bible and the truths of the message, and as this is the chief work of the Sabbath School, therefore,

1. We recommend, That Union and Local Conference Sabbath School Secretaries be appointed throughout the Division, whose work shall be the fostering and developing of Sabbath School interests in their respective fields.

Whereas There is need of some medium whereby the Sabbath School Department may communicate help to the officers and teachers of the Sabbath School, therefore

- 2. We recommend, That the medium offered by the Conference papers throughout the Division be used for this purpose, as space may be arranged and where such a medium does not now exist, the instructions to be given be issued by mimeograph or some other economical form.
- 3. We recommend, That the European Division adopt the following General Conference Sabbath School goals, and that these be kept continually before the people:

Every Church Member a Sabbath School Member, Every Member Striving to be Perfect in Attendance, Every Member Studying the Lesson Daily,

A Weekly Teachers Meeting in every Sabbath School,

Personal Work for every Pupil, More Liberal Offerings for Missions.

In order that our Sabbath School officers and teachers may be better instructed regarding their respective duties, therefore

4. We recommend, That, Testimonies on Sabbath School Work", the little book entitled "From Acorn to Oak", the departmental leaflets on Sabbath School Work and the Manual of Instruction now in preparation, be translated into the languages of the European Division as they may be required. 5. Voted, That we request the Sabbath School Department of the General Conference to supply the 13th Sabbath Missions Quarterly in as many of the European languages as may be consistent with the growing needs of the field. In view of the low rate of exchange in many

parts of the European Division, making the cost of the Sabbath School Worker prohibitive to a number of Sabbath School officers and teachers, who understand English and desire the helps contained in that journal, therefore

6. We recommend, That the European Division and the General Conference affect some arrangement whereby this journal may be supplied to the English readers in places where the exchange is low at a reduced cost.

Medical Department.

- Whereas The Lord has greatly blessed His people in providing definite instruction regarding the laws of health, therefore be it *Resolved*:
 - 1. That as a people we study more carefully the principles of healthful living and natural treatments as outlined in the Word of God, the Spirit of Prophecy and in accepted teachings of science, first that we may be in health in this life and prepared for the coming of Christ, and second that we may be better fitted to use the "right hand of the message" in bringing others to a knowledge of the truth.
 - 2. Inasmuch as conditions in many of the countries of Europe make it practically impossible to secure medical qualifications for physicians from without their territory, be it resolved, that chosen young men in such countries as Russia, Poland, Roumania and Germany be encouraged and assisted, if necessary, in securing a medical education.
 - 3. We recommend that annually a medical council of the heads of the sanitariums be held in one of these institutions, rotating as desired.
 - 4. Whereas many sisters are prepared in several European countries for medical missionary work, *Resolved* that these be organized and encouraged to co-operate with the conferences in their work.
 - 5. Whereas health literature is a very important factor in promoting the work of the message, therefore,

Resolved

- a) That careful study be given to improving our Health Journals and that the best medical talent available be utilized in editing these journals.
- b) That as fast as consistent, leaflets and medical books be provided in the various languages, and
- c) That the Home Missionary Department and the Colporteur Department push the sale of these publications.

Prior to the council, and after its close, the Division Committee held a number of sessions to prepare the work and close up the items left over. Among those of general interest may be mentioned the appointment of brother Mc Geachy of Egypt as missionary to Mosul, Mesopotamia. Thus work will be definitely opened up as a new mission field in the very heart of the former land of Abraham.

Three German missionaries are called for by the Far Eastern Division to connect with educational and evangelistic work in Japan, Korea and China. Selections will be made accordingly.

Our union family will be enlarged by the organization of the Baltic Union taking in the border states of Esthonia, Latvia and Lithuania, thus far connected with the Scandinavian and East German Unions respectively. Brother D. Wall, of the Elsace conference, has been appointed in charge of this union that starts out with a membership of 2628 and with the best prospects of future growth.

Other important matters have been given careful attention such as regulating the wages of our German brethren on a certain gold basis so that more justice will be done them in view of the fluctuating currency, though it is difficult to arrive at satisfactory solutions so long as conditions are not stabilized.

The question of the budget was one comthoughtful consideration manding most and prayerful study. With all due economy in weighing the immediate needs of the various fields in this large Division and its growing interests, our tab-. ulated lists call for net appropriations totalling \$511,334.—. It is hoped that more than \$300,000 of this sum will be covered by allowances made by the General Conference at the session of the Fall Council convening at Milwaukee in October which will be attended by several of our leading brethren from Europe so that our needs will be strongly presented. But it will nevertheless require most strenuous effort on the part of everyone on this side to carry out the plans laid in these deliberations.

It is true, so long as we are labouring in the cause of God in this state of imperfection we shall not be able to get along without the material means by which His spiritual ends must be reached. But it is equally true that an important mission lesson is involved in the good counsel given us by the Master: "But seek ye first the kingdom of God, and his righteousness; and all these things shall be added unto you." This note should ring in our ears and inspire us as we scatter into the field to enter, with new hope and courage, upon this spiritual work of the Lord.
