Division. This will also explain the seeming discrepancies in the German Unions. It will be seen that there is a considerable difference in the number of dollars relative to the number of marks given. This is particularly due to the fact that during the Harvest Ingathering Campaign the financial side was so organized that it was possible to change the money as soon as it was received. In this way nothing was lost by delay. In other cases, of course, it was not possible to do this, and so by the time the funds reached the Division treasury, the dollar had so risen that the mark was of much less value.

It will also be noticed that no fractions of mark are reported. Rather than to put in so many figures, we thought it would be more practical to stop at the millions. Therefore, all figures for German monies represent the millions only of marks received.

We would also call attention to the fact that gifts for the Big Week Fund are not included in the total mission offerings. These appear in a separate column together with other special offerings.

making in every country. In fields like the Britisli, the Latin, the three German and Scandinavian Unions, this department has for a number of years been steadily developing under strong experienced leadership.

Very promising beginnings, however, have now been made also in Czechoslovakia, Hungary, Jugoslavia, Bulgaria etc. It was the writer's privilege during November, to conduct a number of meetings in the interests of the Home Missionary Department in Hungary. As one visits these churches it is an encouragement to notice the growing interest in this branch of the work. Borne of the knowledge that without their co-operation the work cannot be finished their interest is all the more intense.

This quarter being the time of the Harvest Ingathering work, the general enthusiasm was naturally centered upon this important campaign. The results of this effort cannot, of course, be made known until next quarter, but suffice it to say that most of the large unions have surpassed their goals. Even in Central Europe where the industrial and financial situation to-day is so gloomy, news comes to us of a glorious victory. The East German Union has already received Swiss francs: $30,861.60$ and at the time this news was received further sums were expected. We look for similar reports from the other two German Unions. What these figures mean - sums gathered in a time when the, dollar was rising daily, no hourly, bringing the most careful calculations to nought - can be realized only by those who have entered into this experience. One may perhaps
conceive a faint idea of this from the fact that the first trillions we received from the East German Union, when converted immediately into stable currency realized Sw. Fr. 19,600, thanks to our well organized financial plan evolved for the emergency; otherwise, if the old plan of having the money forwarded to the Division Treasury had been followed, it would have dwindled down to about 15 francs by the time it could have been used.

The Lord has also helped wonderfully in all the other unions of the Division. The presidents and workers in particular took a very active part in this year's campaign and we express our thanks to them here. But to the Lord be all the glory.

## The Publishing and Canvassing Work.

„Behold, I will send for many fishers, saith the Lord, and they shall fish them; and after will I send for many hunters, and they shall hunt them from every mountain, and from every hill, and out of the holes of the rocks." Jer. 16:16. This prophecy we sha!l see fulfilled in the latter days. The Saviour once said to His disciples: „I will make you fishers of men". At that time the number of disciples was very small, but in the last days, when the work of the Lord is nearing its consummation, He will send out many fishers and hunters.

The Third Angel's Message is to be proclaimed to every nation, tongue and people. The work of the hunter can be compared with that of the can-

vasser, who goes and looks up the people in all the mountains, hills and even in the holes of the rocks. This work can never be accomplished alone by the ministry. Our great need in Europe to-day is such hunters who will make it their business to find the people in out-of-the-way regions and tell them of the soon coming of the Lord. The more literature we circulate, the greater will the demands become for our books explaining these Bible truths.

During September I had the privilege of visiting the conferences in Poland where we conducted colporteurs' institutes. In that country the inhabitants number $30,000,000$, but we have only 15 canvassers there. In this field, indeed, we lack hunters, who will go out to search for the people living in the towns and more isolated villages to tell them of this blessed truth.

Also in Budapest, Hungary, we had a very fine institute. Hungary has a population of about 8 million people and we are happy to say that the canvassing work here is well organized. We have about 30 canvassers, mostly very promising young people, and a good missionary secretary.

In Jugoslavia we could not conduct an institute, because our conference had been forbidden oy the authorities; nevertheless we held a number of meetings with smaller groups of canvassers at a time and at different places. We hope, however, that in the spring, when the book "Our Day" is completed, we shall again have liberty to conduct meetings, so that we can then make up for this loss.

Our next stop was at Sofía, Bulgaria. Up to the present we have had no canvassers in this field. We held a canvassers' institute with the brethren and sisters who had come to attend the conference, and at the end of the meetings 15 young people offered their services to engage in the work, six of them being willing to begin immediately. The Lord helped us find a bright young man as field missionary secretary, who will be a good help to the canvassers in their pioneer work. An edition of 10,000 of the book „Signs of the Times" is off the press, and a further edition is in preparation.

In Roumania we held institutes in three different places. In that union only 20 canvassers have worked thus far, a number far too small when we consider that some 15 million poeple are waiting there for the message. At the close of the institutes about 100 brethren and sisters were willing to go out into the work, in spite of the many persecutions and dificulties they have to meet in that priest-ridden country. Three field secretaries were chosen here to head up the work in three conferences. In Bukarest we have a new publishing house and a chapel, and in Hermannstadt, Transylvania, a depository is operated. Our stock of books is very small and more funds are needed to get out suitable literature.

But there is certainly no country in Europe
where our publishing houses and canvassers have had to suffer as much as in Germany, owing to the terrible depreciation of the mark, so that they have become poor, in spite of hard work. The canvasser could not buy new books at the prices he received for the old stock. On Sept. 26 a book of 550 pages was sold for Swiss francs: 10.25. On Oct. 10 for 2.60 , on Oct. 30 for 12 francs and on Nov. 11 for 2.10. Notwithstanding these difficulties the number of colporteurs has not diminished considerably. But it was very difficult under these conditions to get the correct exchange rate, when converting the marks into dollars. We thought it best to estimate the books according to their value in dollars, rather than on the basis of the currrent exchange of the day. A book that is sold for two dollars in America for instance, should have the same nominal value here, whatever the currency in which it is sold. Now that the gold mark has again been introduced in Germany, we hope that reporting will be made easier during the year 1924.

When looking back on the past three quarters of this year, we must say that the Lord has richly blessed the publishing and canvassing work here in Europe.

## Bulgaria and Rumania.

In company with brethren H. F. Schuberth and H. Böx, the writer attended annual meetings during the latter part of October to the middle of November in Bulgaria and at various points in Rumania. In the former country, the conference was held at Sofia, the capital. In Rumania, the meetings were held in succession at Klausenburg for the Transylvanian conference, at Focsani for the Moldavian conference, and at Bucarest for the Muntenia conference.

The work is onward in these fields. Our own people had come in from the various sections of the country and the evening meetings were generally so crowded by outsiders that many could not be accommodated.

In Bulgaria some 30 new nembers were received during the three quarters of this year. Eight persons made the covenant at this conference in baptism. Brother Stefan Konstantinoff who has had some years of training at the Friedensau school was ordained to the gospel ministry after a number of years of successful service in the field. He is our first native-born Bulgarian minister. The Bulgarian mission, under the leadership of brother Otto Staubert, will now be operated in three districts, viz. those of Sofia, Varna and Philippopel with brethren Staubert, Thomas and Konstantinoff in charge. The prospects for future growth are promising.

In Rumania the outlook is most encouraging in spite of all the difficulties and the opposition on
the part of the clergy. Though religious liberty is guaranteed by the constitution, yet its interpretation and application are left to the caprice of the authorities in the country, who are influenced by the priests.

When engaging in conversation with a lady after midnight as we traveled from Bucarest northward while standing in the crowded car, we had an opportunity of learning the conditions. Being told that we were Adventists, the lady exclaimed: „Oh, then you are the people that is so furiously hated by our priests and is spoken of so much in our country."

All sorts of reports are spread against us by the priests who claim that we decorate the walls of our meeting halls with most grotesque and abominable pictures, that our ministers step on the cross that is placed in the water when performing the rite of baptism etc. People are astonished when entering our places of worship to find that they have. been deceived by their priests and they usually become friends of the message.

The director of a large banking house said in leaving the meeting he had attended: „What wonderful thruths you people have, I have greatly enjoyed this meeting." The chief of the security police in a certain city where we held the conference expressed himself to the effect that he had not come in his official capacity but that with lim it was a matter of conviction and sentiment. He is reported to have said to some friends in the city: "You wait and see whether these Adventists are not right in their claims after all." Such are the testimonies we hear in many places.

At the conference in Bucarest, no less than 22 churches and companies were received into fellowship as the fruit of the last two years. It was most interesting to listen to the experience these brethren had in spreading the truth broadcast though it is not uncommon for them to be severely beaten. In fact, every member here seems an active missionary. Many have never seen or beard ${ }^{4}$ minister. They read a tract or hear of the message from someone and they will then obey the truth. We were told that a hundred more workers could well be located in the country to follow up the interest.

During the first three quarters of this year 748 persons have been received into the churches in Rumania by baptism and vote so that their membership has increased to 4310, September 30. The authorities do not seem to believe our figures that must be reported to them every month as they claim to have knowledge of many more according to the stir our work is causing in the country.

The question of schooling their children is one that causes great concern among our brethren. They are often expelled from the schools though education is compulsory, and then the parents are
even fined, on the ground that the children refuse to make the sign of the cross. Yet the Lord is helping them wonderfully in many cases so that these difficulties contribute to making the message known to the masses.

In the union committee session held in connection with conference at Bucarest plans were laid that will materially help to foster the various branches of the work in the Rumanian union. A new important feature in the opening of a training school for workers in that field at Focsani in January 1924. Professor P. J. Gaede is already on the grounds engaged in preparation for this work. The outlook for the work in general is certainly most encouraging. Brother Paulini, the president, and his co-workers need our prayers in their trying experiences.

Hall with us again, the associate secretary of the Publishing Department of the General Conference, who has responded to our call of helping us some ten months in our publishing work. We extend a hearty welcome to him and are assured that much good will result from his efforts in building up and strengthening our growing publishing interests in Europe.
