A retrospect is not out of place, as regards our life and faith, and our work as well.

Every worker, man or woman, should examine his own work and apply the acid test to see if it is genuine, — if it has a reward in it which will come to him.

Some people say, "I do not work for a reward. I work out of true love for God." Be that as it may, the reward for service is strongly stressed in the Bible. The Psalmist sang: "They that sow in tears shall reap in joy. He that goeth forth and weepeth, bearing seed for sowing, shall doubtless come again with joy, bringing his sheaves with him." Ps. 126: 6, A. R. V.

Daniel must have thought of reward when he wrote: "They that be wise shall shine as the brightness of the firmament; and they that turn many to righteousness, as the stars forever and ever." Daniel 12:3.

Paul thought of the reward awaiting him as he took a retrospective view of the past. Then it was that he wrote: "I have fought a good fight, I have finished my course, I have kept the faith: Henceforth there is laid up for me a crown of righteousness, which the Lord, the righteous Judge, shall give me at that day." 2. Tim. 4:7. 8.

James stressed the same thought when he wrote: "Blessed is the man that endureth temptation; for when he has been approved, he shall receive the crown of life." James 1:12, A. R. V.

Our Saviour Himself often held out the reward for faithful service. "Then shall he render unto every man according to his deeds." Matt. 16:27, A. R. V. "For thou shalt be recompensed at the resurrection of the just." Luke 14:14. "He that receiveth a prophet in the name of a prophet shall receive a prophet's reward. And whosoever shall give to drink unto one of these little ones a cup of cold water only in the name of a disciple, verily I say unto you, he shall in no wise lose his reward." Matt. 10:41, 42.

The Lord intends that every worker shall be rewarded according to his own works. As the year closes, let us examine our service, and rejoice in our future reward. How many souls have you won for Christ? That is the real objective of all our service. Have you thrown yourself into this warfare with all your strength? The fight to-day is between heaven and God's children on earth on the one side, and Satan and the unsaved on the other.

Have you done your best for Christ during the past twelve months? If you have, rejoice with your Lord in this great service.

As you close the old year, count up your jewels that you have secured for the coming eternal kingdom. Reckon each soul won to Christ as worth more to you than millions of money. Do not be satisfied with what others have done; we have a right to rejoice in our own labors. Now is the time to take a new inventory.

Then there must be victory in our own lives as well, — victory over sin, victory over evil thoughts, bad tempers, envies, and jealousies. Every advance step is cause for rejoicing. Every weakness overcome is cause for joy. Let us buckle on the armor anew for the best year of hard work for God in all our experience.

Primitive Godliness and the Missionary Organization of the Church.*

When we speak of "primitive Godliness", we at once think of the godliness of the early Christians. Newspapers often emphasize the fact that Seventh-day Adventists are preaching Christianity as it was practised in the early days and that we are endeavoring to bring the church back to that condition. Here are two statements that

have recently come to my notice. A Moravian missionary in discussing the situation in our denomination, which he declared to be so much better than in many others, said: "Just wait until your believers number two millions and then we shall see what your spiritual condition is like." A Lutheran pastor expressed himself as follows: "There is something very attractive about the smaller sects. The spirit of love and brotherly kindness is manifested among them to a much larger degree than in the larger churches. The logical conclusion, therefore, is that nothing can be more dangerous to such a sect than its own too

successful propaganda, by which it virtually commits suicide."

According to this it would seem as though a large number of believers constitutes a grave peril to primitive godliness. Every student of church history must acknowledge that, to a certain extent, this is true and it is applicable also to our own history.

Time may cleanse us from much dross, but it also brings many dangers in its train. Time enlarges our vision and also our numbers. In the latter fact lies the danger.

What role, then, does the missionary organization play in the church to meet this danger? What were the outstanding features of the early Christians?

Ready to Bear Witness.

They stood against a world of enemies, philosophers, sceptics, false prophets, unbelievers and scoffers. And what did they do? They cried with a loud voice, "We have the Truth." This bold spirit made one of the Roman Caesars exlaim a few hundred years later, "O Galilean, thou hast conquered!"

There are many texts in the Bible which bear upon this subject. I would call special attention to those found in Acts. 4:18—20 and 8:1. 4. This is the spirit the Home Missionary Department aims to cultivate in our churches and it is thus a great support of the ministry.

And what is the result of such endeavor? The Hungarian priest stated it correctly when he said: "The greatest danger with these Adventists is that immediately they join the church they become missionaries."

If this missionary organization succeeds in getting this *spirit of bearing witness* into our church members, then this most promising feature of early Christianity would serve as a barrier against the dangers that threaten the church.

Ready and Willing to Sacrifice.

The second characteristic of the early Christians was their willingness to sacrifice. Here again the missionary organization helps in a large measure to keep this spirit alive among our people. Think of the gifts that are collected in the various departments, in the Self Denial Week, and especially in the Sabbath school.

The early Christians besides giving of their means devoted also much of their time to the service of the Lord. Think in this connection of the many lines of home missionary work in which we endeavor to train our people. Innumerable are the cases where joy, happiness and a deeper consecration have been the result of this sacrifice of money or time which tend to keep souls in the truth and to revive that spirit of primitive godliness that we all desire to experience.

Readiness to Work.

The book in the Bible which deals more than any other with the subject under consideration is most significantly called "Acts". This seems to indicate that "primitive godliness" and "acts" are inseparable, in fact are identical. Those early Christians stood for practical Christianity. They were not content to give a theoretical answer to the question, "Men and Brethren, what shall we do?" but they demonstrated how to do it.

It is evident that the missionary organization aims at reviving and maintaining such a readiness to work for the Lord, as is illustrated by the distribution of literature, the Bible work and Christian help work in which all our members engage. What a blessing this is to the church and the individual! What a soul-winning agency is represented in the millions of papers, tracts and books distributed each year! To sell our literature for no personal gain whatever is certainly a most noble work.

Think of the material and spiritual success attending the Harvest Ingathering campaign. One union last year reported more than thirty souls won to the truth by follow-up work after the campaign, and this is no isolated case. The slogan, "Souls above Goals", indicates that the Home Missionary Department aims at being a soul-winning agency in deed and in truth.

The same is true of the Bible work done by our lay members. People not of our faith have stated time and again that this voluntary Bible work has made a great impression upon them, more, in fact, than if the preacher had come himself whom they regard more or less as a paid servant.

If love is the outstanding characteristic of Christianity in general, it was certainly the main feature in the days of the early church and hence is most essential also in our own time. Our Christian help work tries to devise ways and means to demonstrate this love by visiting the sick, helping the poor, aiding the infirm, which is a source of great blessing to everyone engaged in this service.

Without our missionary organization the church would fall asleep as a result of mere formality. It is this spirit of activity that will keep the church alive to her calling and preserve her from the dangers described in Rev. 3:1. 2: "I know thy works, that thou hast a name that thou livest, and art dead. Be watchful, and strengthen the things which remain, that are ready to die: for I have not found thy works perfect before God."



While it is natural that North America as the home base of our world-wide work should supply the bulk of this new little army — 128 —, Europe is coming in for her liberal share of thirty-six

Professor Price on Evolution.

Those attending the Winter Council will long remember the scholarly, faith-inspiring talks on Evolution given by Professor George McCready Price of Stanborough College. In four lectures he exposed the fallacies of the evolution doctrine and showed the impossibility of reconciling its principles with a belief in a personal, all controlling Deity.

In the first adress, The Anti-Christian Doctrine of Modern Evolution, Professor Price contrasted the views of the evolutionists with those held by believers in a fiat creation. Christianity teaches that the world was created by the command of God, whereas the essence of the Evolution doctrine is that there is no beginning. Christians believe in the supernatural; the evolutionists deny it. Christianity proclaims a God infinite in all his attributes; Evolution presents a finite Divinity, checked and circumscribed by evil and needing the assistance of mortals to overcome it. Thus to the evolutionist the origin of evil, as believed by the Christian, is sheer nonsense, and since there can be no such origin of evil, there can be no Fall and consequently there is no need of a remedy. So the evolutionist rejects the Atonement and views the cross as a barbarity. Surely "The issue is clear and sharp between this heathenish doctrine and the Gospel of Christ which is now heralded with new power by this people, and on us will fall more and more the burden of preaching the real Gospel."

Having thus pointed out the differences between Evolution and Christianity, the speaker proceeded to give Scientific Evidences against the Theory of Evolution. The old Darwinian method of trying to prove that by long, slow processes one kind of life can be changed into another, called the Biological Method, has been discarded by scientists themselves. These now base the argument for Evolution upon the Geological Method which, by taking the fossils found in the rocks and by arranging them according to their complexity in structure, attempts to prove a continuous development of life from the simplest forms known to the most complex. But this method is arbitrary and based on assumption since it is impossible to prove what fossils are old and what young. Then, nowhere in the world are the rocks found to lie in the serial arrangement demanded by the scientists, and in large sections in Switzerland, Scandinavia, England and America the rock formations are actually inverted. That the whole scheme is an artificial account of the origin of species is admitted by no less an authority than Professor Bateson of Canada who says, "We have no acceptable account of the origin of species". Not so with Seventh-day Adventists who know on whom they believe.

"Scientific Evidence in Favour of a Deluge" formed the subject of the third lecture. Only by admitting a great upheaval or catastrophe can the problems that confront the scientist be solved. In the ocean all is still below a depth of 1,000 feet, yet deep ocean life has been found in fossil form high above sea level. How did it get there by the evolution method? The Mammoth, frozen suddenly in large numbers in Siberia's ice, is nothing but an Indian Elephant. How was he destroyed? And "the dramatic extinction", as one scientist says, of the Dinosaur, an animal that lived in the United States,

German East Africa, East Asia and South America, is inexplicable unless a catastrophe such as the Deluge is admitted. The enormous deposits of fishes, which no doubt form one source of petroleum, cannot be accounted for by any natural processes. But the belief in a Deluge explains these problems. Evolutionists, however, dogmatically deny the Flood because to admit it would be to admit the supernatural, the miracle.

The last address dealt with a "Telescopic and Microscopic View of the Universe." Not only the immensity of the universe, of which our solar system forms an infinitesimal part, but also the smallest division of matter, not even seen by means of powerful microscopes, reveals controlling influences not inherent in itself. These influences are called Natural Laws but that is only a name and explains nothing. Nor can any explanation be advanced save that of an all-controlling Providence in whom we live, move and have our being. If we seek Him we shall find Him. But many say to-day, "Let nature speak to us according to our preconceived ideas and not God." It is to proclaim the message "Worship Him that made heaven, and earth, and the sea, and the fountains of waters, that we have been placed in the world at such a time as this. W. M. Landeen.

The young people and children in our homes and churches are in deadly peril. No flock was ever more endangered than the lambs of this people. Temptation is more subtle, more alluring, more irresistible than ever.

burdens are heavy, time is limited and money scarce, and we are losing the personal touch, so that things are done too much by proxy.

Now, we will not be able to conserve our youth by fault-finding, scolding, reproving, criticism, nor shall we be able to win them by being hard, autocratic and dictatorial. There will be no response, should we employ such a method.

There are two very necessary essentials in this work of conservation:

- 1) Love the Youth
- 2) Have confidence in them.

We must take them into our thoughts, our prayers, our plans, we must place right and true ideals before them and help them to make right decisions. We have these means to assist us:

- 1) God and His Spirit
- 2) The Home

- 3) The Church
- 4) The Sabbath School
- 5) The Missionary Volunteer Society-
- 6) Our Christian Schools
- 7) Individual Effort, the personal touch.

"It will require the most delicate tact, the most thoughtful consideration, the most earnest prayer, that heavenly wisdom may be imparted. The youth are the objects of Satan's special attacks; but kindness, courtesy, that tender sympathy that flows from a heart filled with love to Jesus, will give you access to them. You may win their confidence so that they will listen to your words, and thus be saved from many a snare of the enemy." "Christian Education", pp. 222, 223.

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The Sabbath School Department.*

The Sabbath school may be rightly considered a Bible university. Of first importance in the work of our Bible university is that we have the Sabbath school lessons in as many languages used in the Division as possible. At the last Mid-Winter-Council we had the lessons in 27 languages for the

adults and in 14 for the children. According to the latest information available we now have the lessons in 34 languages for the adults and in 14 for the children. So while the number has been increasing for the former, that for the children has remained stationary. Some study should be given to ways and means for bringing out the lessons for children where the edition must be small.

I am glad to report both increased enrollment in the children's Sabbath schools and an increased interest in the subject of the best methods for teaching. For the fourth quarter of 1925 172 Picture Rolls were used in Europe, to say nothing of the many used Rolls sent out to the mission fields. One union, the Rumanian, has conducted a special two weeks' course in their training school in kindergarten methods.

In several unions Sabbath school conventions have been held, which have been much appreciated by the brethren who have had the privilege to meet and discuss together the needs of the various phases of the Sabbath school work. Among the unions where such meetings have already been held in the local conferences are the West German, the Polish, the Hungarian, the Rumanian, and the Central European unions. Usually these meetings were held at the week-end, from Friday evening to Sunday night. They have been held at some central point in the local field, and have been attended by Sabbath school superintendents from all the principal Sabbath schools at least. Sabbath school teachers and other brethren have attended as far as possible. These meetings are one of the best ways to help our dear Sabbath school workers in their endeavor to attain greater efficiency in their important task.

Another means of helping the Sabbath school teachers in the discharge of their responsibility is found in the Sabbath school paper. We now have such a paper in French, Rumanian and Hungarian. In German, plans are being laid for merging the paper now printed for the teachers of the children's Sabbath schools into an organ to serve all Sabbath school teachers. This will be one of the most important advance steps yet taken, as what is made available in German is helpful to such a large percent of our constituency here in Europe. There is also talk of a Sabbath school paper for Scandinavia.

The Sabbath school as a soul-winning and soul-preserving agency occupies an important part in our work, but our reports have not been sufficiently complete to present any figures on this point.

The financial side of the schools is encouraging when we consider what they are raising in funds for the mission fields. Complete figures are not available at this point for 1925 (Compare the statistical report), so we cannot present a comparison between the tithe and the Sabbath school offerings for the various unions in Europe for the past year; but the average quarterly tithe for the first three quarters of the year shows in every case an increase over the average quarterly tithe for the year 1924. The total Sabbath school offerings for the third quarter of 1925 were in most

cases larger than the offerings for the corresponding quarter of last year.

One of the most interesting plans for the increase of the Sabbath school offerings is what is known as the thirteenth Sabbath school plan. Each quarter the General Conference Committee chooses a certain field and asks the Sabbath schools of the whole world to give a definite amount to that field. It is on the basis of this as one source of income that the budget is voted. But the plan does not only bring the money to cover the budget for that field, but readings are prepared by its missionaries which present to our people the world over the needs of their work. This study of different fields quarter by quarter gives our people an excellent missionary education, and has proved a great stimulus to their liberality. We would like to recommend that a request be made to the General Conference for a 13th Sabbath for Ethiopia and East Africa sometime in 1927 (This request has been voted. Ed.).

The membership in the Sabbath schools shows an encouraging increase. The fourth quarterly report will probably show that we have reached an enrollment of 90,000 and a quarterly donation of \$50,000. It should not be impossible to reach an enrollment of 100,000 and a quarterly donation of \$60,000 before the end of 1926. We have every reason to be encouraged but we should press on towards the still greater things God wishes us to achieve for Him.

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The Printed Page.

Considerable time was given at our Winter Council to the interests of our publishing work. Brother Böx, associate secretary of the department reported on the development as expressed in the sales by the colporteurs who now number 1414 in the European Division. This is an increase of some 200 over the preceding year of 1924. For the eleven months of 1925 for which figures were available, the sales had reached \$ 849,047 and we shall not be far from the mark of one million dollars including the month of December which would mean an increase over 1924 of some \$ 250,000. This certainly is a splendid showing which would be still better if the inflated currency in some countries were not reduced to the actual rate of exchange to the dollar.

Elder C. E. Weaks, secretary of the department supplemented this report when speaking on 'The Spiritual Elements of the Publishing Work' and its influence. Some very remarkable experiences were related how the Lord was leading out in preparing the people to buy our literature. Cases were multiplying in the different countries where individuals had seen certain colporteurs and their books in a dream and as a result were anxious-

ly waiting for these men to come with the God-given message. Brother Weaks pointed out the interesting fact that in October of last year the European Division actually led the world in point of literature sales with \$ 75,211.84 against \$ 63,481.85 in North America. The West German Union outstripped all other unions in the world with a sale of \$ 16,352.48. The three German unions, in fact, sold more than half a million dollars worth of literature in 1925 or more than one half of all our sales in Europe.



Brethren in Rumania:

The one to the left is the father of a two year old child which he buried in secret with the assistance of the brother to the right, contrary to the laws that forbade the burial of our believers in the village cemetery. They were both chained together and marched 4 km to the nearest police station. The brother in the centre is a colporteur, imprisoned for circulating our literature.

Brother A. Vollmer, manager of the Hamburg Publishing House, gave us a most excellent study one morning on 'The Needs and Dangers of our Institutional Workers' basing it on 1. Pet. 2:5 for its spiritual aspects and on the first verses of Exodus 31 for some very practical applications. The Lord endows men with special gifts and calls them by name. We must know that the Lord has given us a part in His work and it is our duty to do it well. As we listened to this presentation our

hearts went out in sympathy and in special appreciation of the faithful service rendered by our institutional workers who are so often tied down to mechanical routine work,

In the following business session Brother Vollmer then gave some figures illustrative of what the veteran Hamburg House was doing in the way of producing literature and the amount actually sold in 1925. 59,133 parcels were mailed out of 5 kilos each against 49,876 in the previous year. This is an aggregate of one ton of literature for each working day. This does not include, however, 550,000 copies of the Harvest Ingathering paper which make 5500 additional parcels, nor 3000 parcels or 19,301 single packages of printed matter, not to speak of the shipments by freight to the depositories at Basel, Hungary and Czechoslovakia nor another 5000 parcels to the city of Berlin alone. May the Lord bless every one engaged in the production and the circulation of the printed page bearing the message for this time and may it bring salvation to those who read it.

Miscellaneous.

The Winter Council of the Division Committee convened at Gland, January 13—21. The Council this time was confined to members of the Division Committee with a few local visitors. When preparing the agenda plans were laid to make the spiritual factor of this gathering prominent. Following the regular devotional hour each morning the Departmental Secretaries were given opportunity to present the spiritual elements of their respective work. The following subjects were presented and discussed:

An excellent spirit of co-operation prevailed throughout the meeting which was very helpful in solving the financial problems of the Budget which, after the original calls had been reduced considerably, were cut another 10% to bring it within the compass of our prospective income during 1926. The total amount voted is \$ 699,353 of which \$ 189,077 are appropriated to our mission fields. In addition to this there were special appropriations from the Educational Fund of \$ 19,675 and from the Chapel Fund of \$ 6,700 and \$ 42,900 to be raised in the Big Week for the Missions' Press Fund, of which \$ 13,715 will be raised outside of Europe.

We have before us a copy of the verbatim report on the subject "Is Evolution True?" between George McCready Price and Joseph McCabe (representing the Rationalist Press Association) held at the Queen's Hall, London September 6, 1925, with Earl Russel presiding. The report covers 60 pages and is very interesting reading. Some 2200 persons were in attendance when Prof. Price had an opportunity of presenting his views on the question. The report may be obtained through the Stanborough Press Ltd. Watford, (Herts) England at the price of 1/- net.

We were also very pleased to receive copy of a new periodical in the Russian language published at Kiev, in the Ukrainia, entitled: "Blagovestnik" i. e. "Gospel Messenger". It is a 32 page quarterly with coloured cover design. In the introductory remarks Brother J. A. Liwoff, President of the Ukrainian Union, states that this is really the successor of a paper last published in 1919 under the same title when it had to be discontinued because of the paper crisis. In view of the present scarcity of funds they plan to publish this paper once a quarter only. Later they hope to publish it monthly with the Sabbath School lessons. We rejoice with our Russian brethren at this new addition to their periodicals of which they now have two in Russian and one in German. In a letter Brother Liwoff speaks of the joy they are having in the Lord's work. They have been able to hold a number of general meetings in their Union during the last year in which they enjoyed perfect liberty. For the first time after a number of years our brethren have had printed Week of Prayer Readings from which, he says, they have gained much spiritual strength and they are very hopeful as to the future. In the Ukrainia they have also secured permission to conduct a training course for workers.

Brother H. J. Löbsack has safely returned .from his extended trip to Central Asia and the region around Mount Ararat. He was very hesitant when setting out on this journey soon after his return from the Far East as he was rather ill. In a recent letter he says that he started out sick for Transcaucasia. The doctor had advised him to get medical treatment in a hospital or special clinic for which, however, he had no time. His voice returned to him again when compelled to speak. He has some therapeutic methods of his own which prove effective. In eight weeks, he says, he travelled 11,000 kilometres and returned home in good health. Since January 1924 he has covered no less than 41,533 werst or 42,000 kilometres and feels grateful for the sustaining grace of the Lord.

Brother J. V. Wilson, President of the South Russian Union, has encouraging words of the work in his field. They have also been able to hold a number of conferences. In October they organized a new church at Eriwan near Mount Ararat. They have taken up work among the Mohammedans in Transcaucasia where they hope for good results. There seems to be an opening among the Bahais, a Mohammedan sect whose religious head long resided in Akko, Palestine. They have also some Syrians in their churches who are anxious to secure literature in their own tongue. Our Armenian brethren are also longing for some reading matter. In Tiflis a young Grusinian brother is being trained for gospel work among his own people.

We call the following words from a letter from Brother L. V. Finster, President of the Malaysian Union Mission:

"We appreciate Brother and Sister Eelsing very much (recently come to this field from Holland). They stayed with us four or five days in our home while passing on to Java. One thing I liked about him was that he started a large public effort even before he was really settled in Batavia, When I passed through there he had an attendance of about 200 persons and we are looking for some good results from this work. You will be glad to know that our baptisms will run over 500 this year in our Union. Also our book sales will be over \$ 55,000 gold."

We learn that a native taylor of the Republic of Liberia, on the west coast of Africa, has recently sent a letter to our publishing house in England ordering a yearly subscription for PRESENT TRUTH and five books, which had been found advertised in a book he must have purchased some ten years ago from somebody, to judge by the prices quoted.

This is a peculiar incident illustrative of how God is opening up the way for us now that we are contemplating to enter this new field.

Our Statistical Report.

We have endeavoured not to be late in publishing our report, but, owing to the delay in receiving the reports from various Unions, it was unavoidable this time. The first reports came from Bulgaria and the Central European Union (Jan. 19 and 21 respectively). Then followed the Hungarian (Jan. 25), the West and East German (26 th), and the Czechoslovakian and Scandinavian (27 th). The reports from the Latin, Baltic, British and Rumanian Unions arrived on the 1st of February, and from Jugoslavia and Poland as late as the 4 th.

In the last quarter of 1925, an addition of 2,684 new members was made, showing a gain of 377 over the same period of the previous year. The net gain in membership during the fourth quarter of 1925 amounted to 1,086, against 836 in 1924, and 1,763 in 1923.

The financial report shows an increase in tithes and offerings over and above that of the same period in previous years (see Recapitulation on Page 12 and 13).

You will notice that in Column 25 of this report, for the first time, we are giving the average of mission offerings per capita per week. Previously this was given per member per quarter, and in the yearly report an average of the offerings given by each member during the year. While the mission offerings for the last quarter of 1923 were only \$ 0.12 per capita per week, they rose in the fourth quarter of 1924 to \$ 0.17, and have reached in this present report \$ 0.18.

Annual Report.

During the year 1925, in the European Division 10,186 souls were added to the denomination, (9,015 by baptism, and 1,171 by vote). The net gain was 5,048, so that our membership at the end of the year totalled 80,469.

From the following table it will be apparent that the figures for the two years prior to 1925 were higher, but this does not apply to the Czechoslovakian, Hungarian, Rumanian and Scandinavian Unions. The Mission fields, too, show an increase over last year's net gain —

The Financial Report. In one year alone our people throughout the Division have given more than \$1,000,000 in tithes. If compared with the previous year this shows an increase of 22%. The average amount of tithe per capita has risen from \$11.11 to \$13.54 per year.

Although the mission offerings are larger than in previous years, they have not kept pace with the tithe. In 1924 they were 51.9% of the tithe, and in 1925 only 46.5%. On page 20 appears a specification of mission offerings, that is, Columns 3 to 8 of the specification correspond with Column 22 of the large general report, and Columns 11 to 13 with Column 25. It is worthy of note that the total mission offerings in Bulgaria amount to

62.8% of their tithe. This shows a wonderful readiness on the part of our poor people to give, and especially when we consider that the Harvest Ingathering amounted to only 31% of their total offerings. In some of the other Unions the Harvest Ingathering reached 55% of the total offerings.

During the seven years from 1914—20 the net increase of membership in the European Division amounted to about 20,000, but in the four years from 1922—25 our membership increased from 58,635 to 80,469, or nearly 22,000.

It took 37 years, reckoning from 1874, to arrive at this figure, for on the 1st of January 1911, our membership in this Division numbered 21,948.

It is impossible to do justice to the different features of this large report in the small space allotted to us. A careful study of this seemingly endless list of figures will reveal our standing. They tell of what God is able to do through human beings. They speak of noble effort and victories, and the soul-saving power of the Message for these last days.
