

COURAGE AND GRATITUDE.

To those who know and really love God's work in Europe, the report for the past year will be a source of cheer and confidence. True, all would have been happy had we seen larger results. God wants to do much greater things for us, yet when we think of conditions as they are in the world, we have reason to be grateful. Our membership has increased to over 88,000. The Sabbath School membership and work, which has been so signally blessed of God these last years. is now 104,284. The average attendance was 5,394 above that of 1926. There has been an increase in ordained ministers from 434 to 451. Our mission offerings show a cheering growth of \$22,517. The tithe has gone up \$83,175. There are other phases of the report which do not show advance, and which demand earnest consideration. We know that our Union and local conference presidents, and all other field leaders, departmental men, and institutional workers, are doing their utmost to build up the work. We wish to thank them all for their co-operation and earnest efforts.

The Evil One would destroy God's work, but victory is with the Lord. During the year some of our workers and members have suffered severe persecution. We are grateful that Brother Bauer, who was in prison so long and whose life has been in real danger, is now free. He is well as is his family. Most of our missionaries, too, as of our workers in the homelands, have had good health. A few have been ill and to others have come most trying experiences. We would make special

mention of Bro. and Sr. Jensen in Abyssinia, whose two little boys died of dysentery the same day, and of our dear Brother Helbig in Liberia, whose beloved wife was taken ill and died a week after she arrived at Hamburg. We want to thank Bro. Helbig, as well as Bro. and Sr. Jensen, and indeed all our missionaries who have been sick because they have so courageously stayed at their post. Just as we write this, word comes that Sister L. R. Conradi of Hamburg has died. She will be remembered by all who knew her as a godly woman, whose quiet life always made for peace and goodwill. Only Bro. Conradi can know what her constant faithfulness has meant to him through the years, and we extend to him our very sincere sympathy in his bereavement.

We are now in a new year. Each year brings us nearer to the day of God and the time when every opportunity to work for Him will be gone. How solemn this thought should be! How it should awaken us to more earnest endeavour in the Master's cause! We cannot in detail mention the various phases of the report. Our Statistical Secretary has done so very fully in the general summary. We would, however, express our great joy at the progress seen in our foreign missions, and for the splendid results in the work in Russia. Let us remember those fields as well as one another in our prayers. As we stand together in confidence and courage, God will lead us onward to success and to larger things this present year.

THE WINTER COUNCIL AT VIENNA.

A very important meeting of the European Division committee occurred at Vienna, November 22—30. This was the regular Winter Council which was held a little early in order that the various fields might know before the beginning of the year the amount of the budget granted them for 1928. This Council was a most interesting one, and the readers of this journal will be glad for a summary of the important actions taken.

First and foremost the 1928 budget was the largest annual budget ever voted by the committee. Including general appropriations, mission extension fund, school fund, and relief funds, there was a total of \$ 900,613.00 appropriated. Soon the total appropriations of the European Division will be a million of dollars a year. Other than some help on the mission extension and relief funds, only \$ 175,000 of the 1928 appropriations come to us from the General Conference.

The first action of the Council was a vote of sympathy to Brother Schillinger, from whom Death, the great enemy soon to be conquered, had taken his faithful companion. What a blessing to proclaim the message of the near advent of Him at whose voice the graves shall open and give back to us our dear ones who have died in Christ Jesus.

The first item of the agenda to be considered was the General Conference call for two evangelists to China. Action was taken, calling for the release of Carl Schroeter and his fiancée from the Central European Union, and Erich Aurich and wife from the East German Union to fill this call. The photographs of these young people appear in this number of the Quarterly Review.

The meeting was throughout a great missionary council. The amount appropriated to our mission fields outside of Europe and Russia was the largest ever voted, amounting to \$ 227,406, including all funds. Almost the last item voted was a request to the Central European Union to secure

the release of K. F. Noltze for immediate service in Liberia. (His photograph also appears in this number). Many other actions were taken dealing with our mission fields. A new union to be known as the Arabic Union was organized, the territory of which should embrace the following countries: Egypt, Syria, Palestine, Transjordania, Cyprus, the Arabian Peninsula and the Northern Auglo-Egyptian Sudan. George Keough was appointed union superintendent, E. Schubert union secretarytreasurer, and C. Rieckmann union field missionary secretary. The Arabic Union at present includes only three local missions: the Egyptian Mission, the Syrian Mission, and the Mesopotamian Mission. Another major item in mission plans was the action asking three of our division men to visit mission fields early in 1928. Brethren W. K. Ising and W. E. Read were asked to visit the missions on the West Coast of Africa, and the British Union was asked to let their president, W. H. Meredith, accompany J. C. Raft to the East African Union. After visiting this union, Brother Raft was also asked to visit Mauritius and Madagascar. (By a later action he was also asked to visit Egypt and Syria, as well as Abyssinia if conditions permitted.)

This was the first division council since the organization of the German Inter-Union Association, an organization, which will mean much to the unification and harmonious development of our



rapidly growing work in the German field. Actions were taken agreeing to the plan that H. F. Schuberth move with his family to Berlin and that he devote his time largely to the work in Germany. taking O. Schildhauer fully on to Division payroll as a Division employee, and voting that Brethren Schuberth and Schildhauer be provided with an office in Berlin and an office secretary. The German Unions presented a request to retain their First-Day Offerings as a fund to help our poor people. The request was granted, extending the plan also to other unions, on the basis that the fields keep one half beginning with the first of 1928, and with the further understanding that in compensation for the loss in mission funds an effort be made to increase the Sabbath school and other mission offerings.

Besides the reports of the various departmental secretaries and of the union presidents, and resolu-



tions dealing with departmental matters (which appear elsewhere in this paper), among other interesting items considered I can mention only a few. It was voted to ask Brother Hennecke of Greece to look after the interests in Albania until we can definitely locate a worker in that country which shall be considered from now on as a separate field. Instead of the Week of Sacrifice plan as formerly conducted, it was decided to have a special self-denial offering for missions in midsummer as a freewill offering from both workers and church members. It was voted to hold the European Division Committee meeting next summer at Friedensau, August 15-22 and that the union conferences be asked to arrange for the attendance of local conference presidents as far as possible, and that they send their school principals. A Foreign Missions Council was planned for to be held in Friedensau, August 10-15. A commission was appointed to study the school needs presented to the Division Committee by a memorial from the British Union. Brother St. Rasmussen was recommended to take the Home Missionary Department as well as the Missionary Volunteer Department, which he has been carrying.

This council was not only a great missionary council, it was also a very spiritual meeting. We had the unusual privilege of having with us Elder Spicer, the president of the General Conference, and his morning studies were very much appreciated. Perhaps we will have room in our next number to give some extracts from these inspiring talks.

Missionary Volunteer Resolutions.

Living as we do in an unfortunate age for the youth, in which the prevailing influence is a spirit of carelessness, liberalism and self-indulgence, a time when temptations and dangers threaten to undermine the simplicity, earnestness, devotion and spirit of self-sacrifice.

WE RECOMMEND that workers and church officers during 1928 endeavour to become personally acquainted with every boy and girl, every young man and woman in the churches and groups of their fields of labour, and by a sympathete approach endeavour to help them with their problems and struggles and lead them into a definite stand for Christ and the Truth.

IN VIEW of the splendid results derived from our last Missionary Volunteer Week and Day, and believing that this spiritual campaign in behalf of the children and young people in our homes and churches has still greater blessings in store;

WE RECOMMEND that April 15—21, 1928, be set aside as Missionary Volunteer Week and that Sabbath the 21th be considered Young People's Day.

RECOGNIZING the tremendous importance of fostering spiritual work, encouraging missionary activity, giving direction to social and physical training and recreation among our youth of junior age,

WE RECOMMEND, a) That more careful study be given to, and greater emphasis placed upon, the Junior work by developing some form of uniform plan to meet the needs of the Juniors; and —

b) That a committee of five be appointed to give study to the matter and present plans for organization and operation at our next Council.

WHEREAS. Experiences have proved the great value and beneft of bringing the young people and

their leaders together for brief consideration of their particular work and problems, for the deepening of their spiritual life, and for the uniform promotion of plans and methods among them,

WE RECOMMEND, The holding of a Missionary Volunteer Rally and Institute in each local conference once a year.

Sabbath School Resolutions.

The committee appointed at the Gland Council to give consideration to children's lessons and Thirteenth Sabbath Readings presented their report which was adopted as follows:

In view of the importance of providing our children with Sabbath School lessons, and in view of the fact that from 1928 on, at least for a time, these will be different from the lessons for the adults.

WE RECOMMEND that the respective Unions plan to provide means for the printing, mimeographing or importing of such children's lessons.

We further recommend that a similar plan be followed in the case of the 13th Sabbath Mission Readings where necessary.

Another action taken by Council was as follows:

That we ask the General Conference to assign to our Division two thirteenth Sabbath Offerings in 1929, the first to be for Catholic Europe and the second for the West African and the Arabic Union Missions.

Publishing Department Resolutions.

In order to assist in raising the standard of our colporteur work, and to aid in conserving our funds in the conduct of this department,

WE RECOMMEND, that in granting colporteur credentials to our colporteurs, such credentials only be given to those whose records show that they meet the following standards:

- a) Firmness in the message.
- b) Proper influence in dress and manners.
- c) Faithfulness in his financial relations with the office which supplies him his literature.
- d) Faithfulness in the matter of regularly reporting the work done.
- e) Faithfulness in the use of his time.
- f) Sufficient success to warrant granting him the credentials which automatically entitle him to the courtesies and considerations given colporteurs.

Harvest Ingathering Resolutions.

The committee on the Harvest Ingathering plans presented a report which was adopted as follows: —

- 1) That we endeavour to reach a goal of \$ 170,000 in our Harvest Ingathering Campaign for 1928.
- 2) That the question of a goal chart be left with the Home Missionary Department and the minority committee in counsel with the Union Home Missionary Secretaries.
- 3) That we request the Home Missionary Department to secure for all the publishing houses and fields in our Division the necessary material for the Harvest Ingathering paper in due time.

PROGRESS IN OUR MISSIONS.

The Lord is blessing the efforts of our faithful missionaries in their efforts to win souls to the Lord. Our force of native workers is also growing year by year and it is encouraging to see the splendid response that is being made to their earnest appeals to the heathen for whom they labour. There is a real wave of evangelism spreading over our whole missionary force, both European and native and the results are being seen in souls won to the truth of God.

The year 1927 showed the largest net gain that we have ever had in our missions in this Division.

In 1925 the net gain was 232 In 1926 the net gain was 508 In 1927 the net gain was 642

We feel very glad indeed for this increase, although we sincerely hope that in 1928 we shall be able to report a much larger figure.

There are some interesting items to be seen as we make a comparison between the year 1927 and the year 1923. During those four years the work in our missions has been consolidated somewhat and new fields also have been entered with the message. It has been very necessary to strengthen the work in some of the fields where we were working in 1923. In many of those lands our missionary force was so slender that the work would have seriously suffered if any of our missionary force then in the field had left for furlough.

In 1923 we had 39 missionaries on our pay roll. If we include the wives the number would be 69. In 1927 we had 71 missionaries, or including the sisters, 122. Our membership in 1923 stood at 2,109. In 1927 it was 3704, or a little over 28% increase in the four-year period. Some fields however, have done exceptionally well. In the East African Union, for instance, they show an increase of 110% during the four year period while on the West Coast of Africa some fields show as much as 60% increase.

In 1923 we were working in sixteen different mission fields. Now the number has increased to twenty, the new fields being Mesopotamia, entered in 1923, Madagascar in 1926 and Liberia and

Uganda in 1927. We must reach out still further, however. We must stretch our tent for there are many other fields, particularly in Africa that are not yet entered. There are the millions in the French territories of the Dark Continent. These must hear the message.

In 1923 we were working in 34 different languages. Now we are working in 56. In 1923 we had 164 Sabbath schools with an attendance of 6,356. Now we have 324 Sabbath Schools with a membership of 14,770. In 1923 our tithes were \$ 13,463. In 1927 they were \$ 25,270 or an increase of 89 %. In 1923 the mission offerings reported were \$ 4,019. In 1927 the figures reported were \$ 14,848, or an increase of 270 %.

We take courage as we think of what the Lord has done but we earnestly pray that during 1928 we may see still larger results. In Europe we have one Adventist to over 5,800 people. In our missions in the Division we have one Adventist to over 47,000 people. So with a population of between 120 and 140 million people to warn and many countries still unentered with the message we must surely press on and never lay down the task until these unentered fields have representatives of God's message for this time.

OFF TO THE FIELDS.

We are glad to report that during 1927 several new workers joined our loyal force of missionaries and set sail for their new fields of labour in Africa or the Near East. Most of them were new workers. There was one exception, the case of Elder V. E. Toppenberg and family who, after their furlough, had spent some time in America. Later they accepted the call of the European Division to take charge of the new training school in the Arabic Union Mission and now they are located in Mataria just outside the city of Cairo.

Including the wives of our workers there was a force of 22 who went out to different fields. The fields benefiting were Liberia, Sierra Leone, Ruanda, Transjordania, Madagascar, Egypt, Abyssinia, Turkey and East Africa. The group was quite a cosmopolitan one, too, for the following nationalities were represented: French, German, Danish, British, Jugoslavian, Swedish, Italian and Austrian. We are very glad indeed to see these faithful workers devoting their lives to the work in these far-off fields. Most of them are in heathen Africa and really when one considers the dangers that face them on every hand, and particularly that of disease, when one thinks of the darkness of heathenism and all that this means, we should surely remember these workers day by day in

our prayers. We need to uphold their hands, that God may dispell the darkness that surrounds them and cause the light of His blessed truth to penetrate the darkened heathen hearts. A number of them are in Moslem fields and there they meet the terrible intolerance and indifference of Islamian. Let us plead with God that He may bless these men who are giving their lives to this special branch of the work. Let us pray that the prejudices may be broken down and that an entrance may be effected to the honest in heart and that in all these lands we shall see souls won to a saving knowledge of the truth as it is in Jesus.

A VISIT TO JUGOSLAVIA.

One of the new countries, organized since the war, is Jugoslavia. It has a population of almost 14,000,000, and includes the former countries of Serbia and Montenegro, most of Macedonia, and portions of what previously belonged to Austria-Hungary. Three main languages are spoken in this territory: the Serbian, the Croatian, and the Slovenian.

Our work in Jugoslavia is organized as a union mission, composed of two conferences and one mission field: the Adriatic and Wojwodina Conferences and the Sava Mission. But there are so few workers that for the present the union president is having to act also as local president for one conference and as local superintendent of the mission field.

It had been planned to hold five Sabbath school conventions: one week-end meeting for the Sava Mission, and one week-end and one mid-week meeting for each of the two conferences. These conventions began October 22 and lasted till November 6, and it was my privilege to attend all of these. It was my first visit to Jugoslavia and I found everything very interesting.

The first institute was held at Zagreb, October 22 and 23. Zagreb is a modern, and rapidly developing city. It shows few of those signs of a previous Turkish domination which are seen more clearly as one advances further south in Jugoslavia.

Religious liberty is written into the constitution of Jugoslavia, but it is not yet generally practised. Our right as a denomination to hold religious meetings, even for our own members, is not yet recognised by the government authorities; but in places where the local authorities have learned to know us and have seen what good citizens Seventh-day Adventists are, we are tolerated.

The believers in Zagreb meet in four different places in private homes. Zagreb is the headquarters of the Sava Mission, within whose territory live some four million persons. Practically every one of the twelve churches in this field sent one or more delegates to the Sabbath school institute held at this place. As Sabbath, October 22, had been appointed as a day of fasting and prayer for our missionaries and our work in China; the morning service, following the Sabbath school, was given over to a prayer and testimony service. It was striking to hear the prayers of these Jugoslavian believers, who themselves had suffered persecution for the truth's sake, as they prayed for our believers in China in this time of danger and civil war. The spirit of God came very near. The program for the afternoon and for Sunday morning and afternoon was that usually followed in our conventions. Evening after the Sabbath was occupied by a mission talk, and for Sunday evening we had a question box hour.

The next meeting was a mid-week institute held at Osijek, October 25 and 26. This place is located in the Wojwodina Conference. In the territory of this conference live some two and a half million persons. The program followed here was similar to that followed at Zagreb, except that Tuesday evening was devoted to a sermon on the importance of Bible study, and the mission talk was given Wednesday evening. I was again struck by the excellent quality of the papers presented by those asked to deal with different topics and phases of Sabbath school work. Of the 30 churches in this conference about half were represented at this institute, while the others sent delegates to the meeting held later at Curus.

The third institute was held at Belgrade, October 28-80. Belgrade is the capital of Jugoslavia and the headquarters of our Jugoslavian Union Mission. It is also the headquarters of the Adriatic Conference. This field has the largest population, about seven millions. It covers not only old Serbia, Montenegro, and Macedonia, but also Dalmatia, Herzegowina and Southeastern Bosnia. It is likely that this large field may have to be divided later as our work grows. Of the 28 churches in this conference about one half were represented by delegates at the week-end meeting held at Belgrade. The program here was much like that followed at Zagreb, with the difference that we had a teachers' meeting here on Friday evening and the morning service following the Sabbath school consisted in a sermon on the importance of Bible study. In Belgrade, in order not to disturb the neighbors living near the private home where the institute was held, the delegates refrained from singing. Instead one person stood up and read the words of the song, before the opening prayer was offered. Those who are so situated that they can sing freely, can hardly appreciate what this means to our believers in Jugoslavia, who are great lovers of music.

Going on to Nish, I attended the next institute, held November 1 and 2. This is an interesting city historically. It was here that Constantine the Great was born. There is an old fortification, dating from that time, which is now occupied by the military forces of the new and greater Serbia. Sixteen delegates attended this institute from ten different churches.

One delegate came from that Macedonian church where the brother paid tithe on the dead donkey. I was much interested to hear this story. This brother was a baker. When he began to keep the Sabbath, he asked his employer to give him the Sabbath free. He refused. The brother was without employment for some time. He then decided that God could not bless him because he had not been paying tithe. So he and his wife decided to pay

tithe. The question then was whether he should pay tithe on what he now had or on what he had when he began to keep the Sabbath. At that former time he had a donkey that had since died. The brother decided to pay tithe on the dead donkey. A further question arose in his mind: should he pay tithe on a fat donkey or on a poor donkey? When the donkey died it was poor; but the brother reasoned that if he had payed tithe, the Lord would have

blessed him and the donkey would have been fat. So he decided to pay tithe on a fat donkey. When he come back from paying the tithe to the conference, another man offered to employ him as a baker and to give him the Sabbath off and with an increase in salary. The Lord blessed the business of this brother's employer so much, that his former employer approached him. He reminded the brother that he had helped him when he came as a refugee

line. Our missionaries have been working for several years now, appealing to the tradesmen and European settlers for funds just as we do in the home land. Some of our workers in Egypt have gone to Alexandría every year and have been able to gather in between £ 70 and £ 100 sterling. Just recently two of our missionaries solicited in Jerusalem and Damascus with splendid success. We are finding the business people and others,

even in our African missions, responding nobly to the appeals we are making to them.

Even our believers in East Africa are becoming enthusiastic over this plan and while the work has to be done a little differently in those fields, yet our people are entering into the work with real zeal and enthusiasm. We do not use magazines like we do in America or Europe but we make use of the coloured cover of the Ingathering paper. This is reduced some what in size, and then pasted on

a piece of strawboard. Two eyelet holes are made in the top corners and the card is then suspended by a piece of cord from the neck of the worker. As he visits the villages the people soon become acquainted with his mission and while he may not bring very much money back, he will return loaded with perhaps cobs of corn or other native produce. These are then sold and the money placed in the Harvest Ingathering fund.

Word has just come from the Gold Coast on the West Coast of Africa of an interesting experience the brethren have just had and the really splendid results. The suggestion, it seems, came from one of our native workers and shows how our general plans may be adapted. missionaries with some of our workers from the coast go out to the villages. The first of all notify the chief that they intend to visit him. At the day appointed they interview him and talk with him about the blessings of God - of His goodness in giving them such a bountiful harvest and how everyone should return gratitude to Him in a practical way. The chief, usually agrees to make a gift and so the suggestion is made that he do this at a public service. Then they call on the people who congregate in the market place. Here the missionaries talk with the people. Just before the meeting a little booth is erected in one corner of the market place, just a simple native structure made of poles and plenty of green leaves. When the service is over the missionaries and workers retire to the booth. The plan is to have the chief come forward and make his offering. Then he addresses the people and urges his elders to come with their gifts. After this the people press in with their little tokens of gratitude. In the first village where this plan was tried the brethren received a gift of \sharp 22.10.0 and in a smaller village on the next day they had \sharp 15.2.6. At the time of writing arrangements had been made for visiting other villages but as yet we know nothing of the results. The experiences, thus far, however, have given our missionaries a view of the possibilities and they are very hopeful indeed that this may be the means of raising quite a large sum of money locally to carry forward the work of God.

The work of gathering money in the Ingathering Campaign is not what one might call easy work. It takes much time and much effort and our faithful believers in the home land are doing a noble work in their faithful service in this special campaign It cheers their hearts to know that while they are working diligently day by day our missionaries for whom they labour and even our coloured workers in Africa and our workers in other lands, are joining hands with them doing everything they possibly can to help themselves and to pass the blessings of the Gospel on to other needy fields.

During the year 1927, there were organized 225 new Young People's Societies in the Division, and our membership increased to 20,126. Bible work. As a result of the co-operative activities of our laity, 2312 souls were won during the year.

Harvest Ingathering.

The total figures for the Harvest Ingathering campaign brought us very pleasant and unexpected surprises. In expressing our gratitude to God and our appreciation to our fellow-labourers and our dear people in general for their extraordinary effort in the past campaign, we are pleased to state that the campaign brought in \$ 171,350.08 which is by far the largest sum raised in the European Division in a single campaign. It is \$ 11,000 above our goal of \$ 160,000, and $12\frac{1}{2}$ % increase over the 1926 campaign. The receipts in the Harvest Ingathering campaign, since its introduction into Europe, have been:

The Harvest Ingathering receipts now make up close to one third of all our mission offerings. It has been increasing in percentage from year to year, and we believe it will continue to do so. Some Unions raise more than 50% of all their mission offerings through the Harvest Ingathering. Others will undoubtedly sooner or later do the same.

Mission Extension Fund — "Big Week".

Another missionary campaign which has proven a great blessing to our people and to our mission work both at home and in foreign countries is the "Big Week" plan. Since this plan was

introduced in our Division four years ago, there has been received \$92,146.02. The amount for last year was \$22,589.73, just a trifle less than in 1926. We are in hopes, however, that the 1928 "Big Week" will bring us the largest returns yet. By the time the *Quarterly* reaches the field, the "Big Week" will be in the past in most fields.

The prospects for our departmental work in 1928 are as bright as the promises of God. We are optimistic, and not without reason, in regard to this year bringing us still greater encouragements with reference to further growth and progress in all lines of our many phases of departmental and denominational endeavour.

MANUAL FOR MINISTERS.

BURIAL SERVICE.

When the service is to be in the church or at the cemetery, it is well, if circumstances permit, to pray with the friends at the house before the procession starts, that God will comfort the mourners, and enable them to trust in His loving wisdom and overruling providence. It is proper for the minister to precede the casket as it is carried to the hearse or to and from the church and to the grave side.

Church service.

When all are seated and the undertakers have stepped aside, offer a brief prayer that God will speak to every heart His comforting promise of resurrection, and light up the darkness of the tomb.

Then read a suitable scripture, perhaps a collection of passages, according to the age and experience of the deceased. As a rule the reading will include such passages as Job 14:1, 2, 14, 15; Ps. 90:1—4, 10, 12; 1 Cor. 15:51—57.

A short biographical sketch of the life of the deceased is appropriate. A brief address follows. Draw helpful lessons for the living from the life and Christian experience of the deceased, pointing to the blessed hope of certain victory over the last enemy, the power of Christ to deliver from sin and death. Dwell on the promises with which the gospel comforts mourners, and hold forth the second coming of Christ as the "blessed hope" of all the ages.

A prayer should then follow, in which thanksgiving is made for all that God's goodness has done for the deceased, for the assurance that nothing of His good gifts is lost, that the morning of the resurrection will restore all that is now taken away, and make ample compensation for all earth's suffer-

ings; pray that the message of the tomb, speaking of the vanity of earthly things, and the truth of the resurrection, pointing us to the realities of eternity, may wake any present who are yet dead in pleasures or sins; for the various members of the family, for the dear ones left behind; for the finishing of the work of the gospel on earth, and the speedy return of the Life-giver to bring immortality. Close the prayer with the benediction.

The undertaker in charge usually now announces the order if the congregation is to view the remains. When this is done, it is ordinarily fitting that the congregation pass out after filing by the casket, leaving the mourners to take the last view somewhat in privacy. Otherwise the congregation remains seated while the casket is borne out, allowing the mourners to follow first, the minister preceding the casket to the hearse.

At the Grave Side.

While the coffin is being lowered into the earth, the minister will read appropriate scriptures, such as:

"I am the resurrection, and the life: he that believeth in Me, though he were dead, yet shall he live."

"Fear not; I am the first and the last: I am He that liveth, and was dead; and, behold, I am alive forevermore, Amen; and have the keys of hell and of death."

"I heard a voice from heaven saying unto me, Write, Blessed are the dead which die in the Lord from henceforth; Yea, saith the Spirit, that they may rest from their labours; and their works do follow them."

Then read the following:

"I would not have you to be ignorant, brethren, concerning them which are asleep, that ye sorrow not, even as others which have no hope.

"For if we believe that Jesus died and rose again, even so them also which sleep in Jesus will God bring with Him.

"For this we say unto you by the word of the Lord, that we which are alive and remain unto the coming of the Lord shall not prevent them which are asleep.

"For the Lord Himself shall descend from heaven with a shout, with the voice of the Archangel, and with the trump of God: and the dead in Christ shall rise first:

"Then we which are alive and remain shall be caught up together with them in the clouds, to meet the Lord in the air: and so shall we ever be with the Lord.

"Wherefore comfort one another with these words."

After this the form of committal will be repeated in these words:

Committal.

"Forasmuch as it has pleased Almighty God in H's love and wisdom to permit our dear brother (or sister) to fall asleep in Christ, we do tenderly commit his (or her) body to the ground; earth to earth, ashes to ashes, dust to dust; in sure and certain hope of a joyful resurrection to eternal life through Jesus Christ our Lord; who at his glorious appearing shall change the body of our humiliation that it may be made l'ke unto His glorious body, according to the mighty working whereby He is able even to subdue all things unto Himseli."

Then repeat:

. Scripture Passage.

"I heard a great voice out of heaven saying, Behold, the tabernacle of God is with men, and He will dwell with them, and they shall be His people, and God Himself shall be with them, and be their God.

"And God shall wipe away all tears from their eyes; and there shall be no more death, neither sorrow, nor crying, neither shall there be any more pain: for the former things are passed away."

If a hymn is sung at the grave, let it be sung at this point. Close with prayer and the benediction.

OUR STATISTICAL REPORT.

Another year has passed and the record for 1927 is complete. We present herewith the detailed report for the fourth quarter and also a summary for each union for the year 1927.

During the fourth quarter 55 more souls were added to the church than in the corresponding quarter of the previous year (2269). The net gain also is higher than in the fourth quarter of 1926 (941 against 528) although not as high as two or four years ago. Our total membership at the end of the year stands at 88,189.

Instead of comparing the results of one quarter only, let us rather take a retrospective view of the past year as a whole 9449 souls were baptized, which is not quite as many as in previous years. Our net gain in membership amounts to 3846 as against 3874 in 1926. In regard to growth in membership the missions (in Africa and elsewhere) rank highest: the gain is almost 21% of the membership. Next to the missions comes Jugoslavia with about 17 to every 100 members. Poland with 14,7%, Rumania with 10,6%, and Hungary, 12,5%.

But we must speak not of gains only, there are losses also to be recorded. Almost 1000 members (995) have been laid to rest during 1927.

Then there are others that have left us, although we rejoice to state that this loss has been less than in the previous year.

Mention should be made of an additional conference in the Polish Union, where the former Warsaw Mission and some parts of the Silesia-Galician Conference are organized into the East and Central Polish Conferences.

For the first time we present a special statement on the native schools in heathen Africa. We hope to have it more complete next time. It is evident from this statement that we have more than 1000 candidates for baptism in Africa and an enrolment of over 13,000 natives in our Out-, Station-, Training-, and Girls' Schools.

Finances.

In spite of economical and financial difficulties in different countries the statement on tithes reveals an increase in every union over 1926, or, in other words: never before has as much tithe been raised in any union as this year.

Again in 1927, — as was done in 1926 — we have included the institutional tithe in some of the unions (where it was paid not to a conference but to the union direct), in the fourth quarters report, as follows:

Probably the most encouraging increase will be noticed in the Harvest Ingathering Receipts, which have steadily grown (see specification of offerings on page 9). This cannot be said of our Annual Offerings, which fall short when compared with 1926. The Sabbath School Offerings make more than one third of the total offerings, or 35.3%. Our faithful members in the mission fields are beginning to have a good share in the Harvest Ingathering Campaign:

Even the colportage is developing in the mission fields. We have colporteurs in Iccland, Egypt, Syria, Greece, Madagascar, Mauritius, Turkey and Persia. The sales in these countries amounted to

In Iceland especially our colporteurs have had excellent success. Taking into consideration that the literature in the other missions consists mainly of tracts and small pamphlets, these sales mean a step forward in those dark and Mohammedan countries.

We are thankful to God for the progress the report shows. Let us try to do our part better in the newly started year, and the Lord will bless every effort in His service, for

"God's love perceives not what we did, but what we tried to do."

MISCELLANEOUS.

The workers at the Division Office were very pleased to have a visit from Brother Raspal, the leader of our work in Madagascar, who is now taking his furlough. He spoke in the Division chapel on the evening of December 19 in French, his mother tongue, and Otto Schuberth, the leader of our school at Marienhöhe, who was also with us, translated into the German, Madagascar is the third largest island in the world. It is 10,000 km from Marseille, France, and it takes from 28-30 days travel from Marseille to reach the capital of Madagascar. Topographically the country is divided into two zones, the high plateau and the coast regions. The island is inhabited by 16 or 17 different races, but the most progressive live on the plateaus. It is here that the London Mission Society have won most of its members. Christianity came to Madagascar a hundred years ago and the London Mission Society and other organizations have sent many missionaries into the field, but there are still many parts which have not been reached. The time has now come for us to take this last message to the people of this large island. After spending 4½ years in Mauritius Brother Raspal moved to Madagascar, where he has now been working two vears. God has providentially opened the way for our message by stirring up the interest among some of the Protestant native ministers. One man asked the privilege of selling our books. The book store he established did much to prepare the way for Brother Raspal when he came. As far back as 1890 there was a great revival in Madagascar among the Protestant people; sick were healed and a great work was done. Many of those affected by this revival are still in the Protestant church but with the conviction that Jesus will come soon. Brother Raspal hopes that many of these will receive our message.

We already have several hundred believers who are keeping the Sabbath though they have not been baptized. The Sabbath school lessons are translated into the native language, Malagasy, and there are groups in various parts of the island asking us to come to instruct them. Truly God has gone before the missionary and the field will see a quick work done Brother Raspal gave some wooden dishes with pictures on them to the Division and also a picture showing Brother Raspal with the believers in Madagascar. He sang to us also one of the Malagasy songs.

We are always glad to receive news from our missionaries in other Divisions. Recent letters from Geo. Dietrich in Japan tell of the blessing of God that has attended his efforts in the Harvest Ingathering work. He says: — "As in the homeland we also have the Harvest Ingathering Campaign here. In order to reach our goal we had to exert ourselves to the outmost. The goal of the conference of about hundred members was 1280 Yen or about 2560 Goldmarks. Of this the church at Kobe of 50 members took 500 Yen or 1000 Goldmarks as their share. I myself worked in three cities in order to help the churches reach their goals as far as possible. The Harvest Ingathering work for the Japanese is very difficult. They can hardly obtain entrance to the larger firms or better circles, therefore it is well for them to go with a foreigner and to be able to use his card. Here in Kobe I worked three days with Brother Armstrong, the superintendent of the Japanese Mission. We visited Chinese firms. Already on the first day we reached the goal of the local church and exceeded by two Yen, in other words 502 Yen or 1004 Goldmarks. I had hoped this year to receive one hundred Yen from a firm. The first day brought me the fulfilment of this wish. From three firms we received each 100 Yen and that not after a long talk concerning our world-wide work, but with a few explanations they were willing to help."

In a later letter he tells of having received 500 Yen or 1000 Goldmarks from one firm.

Our readers will be interested in the following extract from a recent letter from Brother J. L. Shaw, telling of the conditions in the Far East: —

"We were glad to have with us at this meeting Elder Evans and Brother Barrows, who brought to us from the Far East fresh details of the situation in China. Our missionaries have been thrown into great perplexity owing to the war. Practically all of them have had to leave their mission stations while some nearing furloughs returned to the homeland, and a large number are in Shanghai awaiting further developments. Many of them have lost their furniture and personal belongings, mission homes have been ransacked and pillaged, and in some instances only a skeleton of the home remains. The college near Nanking is now in the hands of soldiers and great loss is expected as a result. The situation was so serious that it seemed necessary to draw on our reserve funds to the amount of \$50,000 to meet the losses of our missionaries and to assist in the restoration of mission homes and the college."

Brother Max Fuss who went to Mexico last year to help in the colporteur work writes us telling of good success. He had finished canvassing the Germans in the state of Chiapas and had many interesting experiences. At the time of writing he was in Tacubaya, a suburb of Mexico City, but was preparing to go south to the state of Vera Cruz. In a later letter written from Vera Cruz he says that he has made sufficient advancement in the Spanish language so that he can do colporteur work also in Spanish. He was selling "Patriarchs and Prophets" in Spanish at the time he wrote.

Another of our German brethren, Adolf Fanselau, went out last year to Honduras where he has taken charge of the colporteur work. In a recent letter from him he tells of a baptism of a Honduras general who in his polite way, when Brother Fanselau was visiting with him, told him in case he came to the town where he lived he should

consider, as Brother Fanselau expressed it, "his house as mine". In La Ceiba two lawyers have joined our Spanish church and one the English church; thus the message is going to the better class of people in that interesting mission field.

Brother Fanselau says: — "Many books had been sold here by former colporteurs, so my chief task consists in getting books into the more difficult hinterland where the only means of transportation is the mule. In the last three weeks I have been training a brother, so I am not alone now in the colporteur work. We had excellent experiences. I have sent a report of our experiences to Brother Banas as an article for the "Büchersendbote"."

Encouraging news has come to us from our youngest mission field, the Liberian Mission. Brother Helbig, the leader of that field, in spite of his recent bereavement, is going forward with courage in the Lord. He has had to give many treatments to sick persons and in his letter he gives the following figures concerning treatments given:—
