


May God greatly increase these aviation squadrons in all our fields. The time has come for the wings of our publishing work to spread for swifter, stronger, further flight.

gelism are fairly startling. They show how swiftly the witness is being given to all nations.


In all lands the Spirit of God is preparing honest hearts to say "yes" as the messengers come with the spoken word or with the silent messengers of the printed page.

Divisional Aviation

ON the wall above me, as I write, is a photo of the pioneers of colportage in this Division. They blazed the trail back in 1890 and from it have sprouted other smaller trails, leading into practically every part of this field, through the years. Truly the literature ministry is giving wings to the gospel in this Division of long distances.

Looking at the record of actual sales from 1916 (as far back as existing records take us) we see a steady rise every five year period since that time. The second five years show an increase of almost £4,000 over the first. The third period tops the second by well over £5,000, while the past three years and ten months maintain the ratio of progress in spite of the three years of financial depression we have recently passed through.

When we reckon in terms of distances the progress is even more encouraging. The northernmost point of our territory, in a "fly-as-the-crow" line, is 2,632 miles distant from Cape Town, while from east to west, at the middle of our field, the distance is 1,880 miles. This vast area is made up of wide plains sprinkled with farm homesteads here and there; dense forests peopled by the most primitive human beings; mountain ranges where caves and holes give habitation to others; vast expanses of inland sea on which Iliputian steamers ply to and fro with merchandise and human freight; mines of gold, of copper, and of coal where thousands upon thousands of white men and black pop in and out of the earth like moles; and huge native reserves where conditions would seem homelike to the tribesmen of Abraham's day. And then there are the cities, the towns, the villages, the hamlets, and the floating homes that call at the harbours dotted over Africa's rocky coast line. In all these places you will find the printed page bearing the gospel message for this time. There is room for more—granted. But the marvel is that it is to be found in these widely separated areas and diverse places. When we consider the rapid work being done here in our own Division by the printed page as a truth carrier we feel that Elder Spicer has aptly termed the literature ministry the Aviation Department of this great world movement.

I know I am expressing the mind of the Southern African Aviation Squadron when I say that we are one and all determined, by God's enabling grace, to spare no effort in keeping the printed page on the wing in this big field until the end. Our readers can help us by holding up the standard of this sacred and important branch of the Lord's work in their homes, their churches,

and their neighbourhood—and by daily invoking the blessings of heaven on the faithful men and women who bear the brunt of the battle bravely and cheerfully.

Make the Contact

WHAT would the advent movement be without its literature? As one looks out across the world-wide field and tries to measure the lines of human endeavour which have contributed toward its progress one cannot but be impressed with the incalculable part that its literature has played. From the very beginning no stone has been left unturned in an endeavour to place before the public in printed form the fundamental principles of our belief. It was not possible to fill the world with preachers, and yet there was a message that demanded immediate and universal publicity. It was to literature that the pioneers turned to find a form of preaching equally as forceful and more far-reaching than anything that could be done by the living preacher. In this they were acting under the direct instruction of the Lord, for in 1848 there came the message through the Spirit of prophecy:

"You must begin to print a little paper and send it out to the people. Let it be small at first; but as the people read, they will send you means with which to print, and it will be a success from the first. From this small beginning it was shown to me to be like streams of light that went clear round the world."—"Life Sketches," page 125.

In literal fulfilment of this prediction, advent literature has since found its way to the remotest corners of the world, and wherever it has gone it has done its work.

The Protestant Reformation owed its ultimate triumph largely to the printing press. The discovery of printing seemed in the Providence of God to coincide with the special need of that time. Of the second advent the Spirit of prophecy records: "The message of truth is to go to all nations, tongues and people; its publications, printed in many different languages, are to be scattered abroad like the leaves of autumn."—"Testimonies," Vol. IV, page 79. The millions of books, tracts, and periodicals dispatched to the remotest corners of the globe from the printing presses of the advent people constitute in no small degree the "loud voice" of the third angel's message.

Surely the dispensing of such a life-giving agency is deserving of the whole-hearted support of every church and company and isolated believer among the advent band. The flow of gospel literature from the printing press to the public must

be by way of the church membership. The presses are doing their work,—spirit filled literature is available in abundance—and people everywhere, in every walk of life, are waiting to receive it; but the medium of contact, the channel through which the literature must flow should be greatly enlarged. The call of the hour is for men and women in every community who will make the contact, and ensure that the life-giving stream shall not be stemmed as it passes their way, but that it may have the same rich, full flow from them to the people that it has from the printing press to the church. The influence of this literature will never be fully known until its work is done.

Die Lugdiens in die Divisie

AAN die muur bokant my, hang 'n prent van die baanbreker kolporteurs van hierdie Divisie. Hulle het die weg al in 1890 gebaan, en sedert daardie tyd het die werk uitgebrei na feitlik alle dele van hierdie veld. Ja waarlik, die leesstofbediening verleen vlerke aan die evangelie in hierdie Divisie van lang afstande.

Waar ons die rekords vanaf 1916 (dis so ver as hulle gaan) nagaan, bespeur ons, sedert daardie tyd, elke vyf jaar 'n gestadige vermeerdering. Die tweede vyf jaar periode toon 'n vermeerdering aan van byna £4,000 oor die eerste. Die derde periode oortref die tweede weer met oor die £5,000, terwyl die laaste drie jaar en tien maande tot dus ver ook 'n vermeerdering aantoon ten spyte van die hewige depressie wat ons deurgemaak het.

As ons die afstande inagneem dan is die vordering wat ons gemaak het nog meer verbasend. Die mees noordelike deel van ons veld, in 'n reguit lyn, is 2,632 myl van Kaapstad af, en die wydte van die veld van oos na wes deur die middel, is 1,880 myl. 'n Groot oppervlakte van uitgestrekte vlaktes met hier en daar 'n plaashuis; ruie bosse, bewoon deur die mees veragterlike wesens; bergreekse, met grotte en skeure,

waar weer ander woon; binnelandse mere, waarop klein stoombote vaar; goudmyne, kopermyne, en steenkoolmyne waar duisen-de naturelle en blankes in- en uitgaan soos molle; groot naturelle reserves, waar toe-stande soos in die dae van Abraham heers; en dan is daar die stede, dorpe, nederset-tings, en die drywende wonings wat ons hawens besoek, langs die rotsagtige kuslyn van Afrika. In al hierdie plekke sal u ons waarheidbevattende blaarie vind met die boodskap vir hierdie dae. Ons kan nog meer uitbrei—dis waar. Maar dis 'n won-derwerk dat ons blaarie wel in hierdie vervaaglië en ver van mekaar verwynde plekke aangetref word. As ons inagneem hoe vinnig die waarheid deur ons blaarie in ons Divisie versprei word, dan voel ons dat Leraar Spicer dit baie raak gesê het, toe hy die leesstofbediening die Lugvaart Afdeling van hierdie groot wêreldbeweging genoem het.

As ek sê dat ons almal gedetermineerd is, deur Gods genade, om ons drukwerk in hierdie groot veld aan die vlieg te hou tot die einde, dan weet ek dat ek die gevoelens van ons Suidelike Afrikaanse Lugvaart Eskader weergee. Ons lezers kan ons help om hierdie belangrike en heilige werk te verhef in hul huise hul kerke, en hul buurt, en ook om daeliks te bid om Gods seën op die getroue manne en vroue wat die stryd so moedig voortsit.



Kom in Aanraking met die Mense

WAT sal die adventbeweging wees sonder sy leesstofbediening? As mens so oor die wêrelvdeld uitkyk en die verskillende werk-saamhede gadeslaan wat bygedra het tot die vooruitgang van die beweging, dan kan mens nie help om die vername rol op te merk wat ons leesstof daarin gespeel het nie. Van die begin af aan was alles gedaan om ons leerstellings onder die aandag van die publiek te bring. Dit was nie moontlik om die wêreld met predikers te vul nie, en nogtans was daar 'n boodskap wat na die hele wêreld moes gaan. Die ou baanbrekers het hul toevlug na die drukpers geneem, en in die vorm van leesstof het hulle predikers gevind wat net so magtig was en net so doeltreffend as lewende predikers. Hierin het hulle onder direkte leiding van die Here gestaan, want in 1848 het die volgende boodskap van die Gees van profesie gekom:

„Julle moet 'n blad begin druk en dit onder die mense versprei. Laat dit maar in die begin klein wees; dog wanneer die mense begin lees, sal hulle vir u geld stuur om dit uit te brei. Dit sal van die begin af 'n sukses wees. Dit was aan my getoond dat van hierdie klein begin daar eindelik strome van lig heeltemal om die aarde sou skyn.”—„*Life Sketches*,” bls. 125.

Hierdie voorspelling is letterlik vervul, want sedert daardie tyd het ons leesstof tot die uithoek van die aarde gegaan, en waar dit gegaan het, het ons die vrug daarvan gesien.

Die uiteindelike oorwinning van die Re-formasie is grotendeels toe te skrywe aan die drukpers. Dit skyn asof die drukkuns deur die voorsienigheid van God gekom het om in die spesiale behoeftes van die tyd te voorsien. Van die adventbeweging sê die Gees van profesie: „Die boodskap moet na alle nasies, tongue, en volke gaan; leesstof in baie verskillende tale, moet rond gestrooi word soos herfsblare.”—„*Testimonies*,” Deel IV, bls. 79. Die miljoene boeke, traktate, en tydskrifte wat van die drukperse van die advent volk gaan na die hele wêreld, maak grotendeels die „luide stem” uit van die derde-engelboodskap.

Die uitgee van so'n lewegewende middel verdien waarlik die heelhartige ondersteuning van elke kerk, groep, en afgeleë gelowige in die adventbeweging. Die verspreiding van die leesstof wat van ons drukperse kom moet deur die kerklede geskied. Die drukperse doen hulle werk,—daar is leesstof in oorvloed en mense orals, in alle stande en beroepe, wag om dit te ontvang; maar die middels om hulle te bereik, die kanale deur wie die kontak moet gemaak word moet grootliks uitgebred word. Die groot behoefte van die uur is aan manne en vroue orals om in aanraking te kom met die mense, om te verseker dat die lewegewende stroom nie opgedam sal word as dit by hulle langs verby vloei nie, maar dat dit deur hulle net so ryk en vol na die mense toe sal vloei, as wat dit van die drukperse na die kerk vloei. Die invloed van hierdie leesstof sal nie ten volle besef word voor dat die werk afgedaan is nie.



Die Vliegbasis

ONS name verskyn nie dikwels in druk nie, maar die vlieglus het ons ook beetge-pak, saam met die res, en vlerke gegee aan ons gedagtes—daarom hierdie boodskap. Die gedreun van die masjinerie in ons ore dag na dag, maak die werk hier maar baie eentonig. Dit is nie eintlik besielend om te staan en kyk hoedat die gedrukte blaarie met eentonge reëlmatriegheid van die perse val nie. “Now thanks be unto God, which al-


ways causeth us to triumph in Christ, and maketh manifest the savour of his knowledge by us in every place.” 2 Cor. 2:14.

Our "Force" In The Mission Fields

OUR native colporteurs in the Zambesi Union take their books and literally go out in the "mountains," the "holes of the rocks," and the bush, sometimes remaining away for weeks, and even months, before they are heard of again. When they return to the office, they have inspiring tales to tell of the way the Lord is blessing them in their work; of souls they have interested, and of others who plead for someone to stay with them and tell them about the last message for the world; and of yet others who wish us to send them a teacher.

William is a faithful colporter evangelist, who teaches the people whenever he gets an opportunity. One day he returned from the bush and told of an old chief and his people who eagerly listened to the truth as he told them of it, and were glad to buy as many books as their meagre supply of money would allow. They asked why we had not sent someone to tell them of these things before. They begged him to stay and teach them more. He could stay a couple of days at most, and when he left it was with the promise that he would bring more books, and tell them more of the old, old story.

Johannes, another faithful colporter, met a man who, in his eagerness to know of the truth, kept our colporter awake half the night telling him things he had never heard before, and pleaded that he be visited again.

These faithful men of the literature ministry go out with no more than the disciples had of old when they went out on their missionary tours, except their bicycles, on which they have to travel in the heat of the African sun for miles at a stretch through sand and bush until they strike a native village or reserve.

I believe there is a glorious crown awaiting these self-sacrificing, faithful men of the literature ministry. Will you not, dear brother and sister, uphold their hands as they labour on, and pray that the God of all mercies may bless these loyal servants, who labour for Him?

South African Mission Field

THE sale of native literature in the various languages in this field is very encouraging. Since the Transvaal-Delagoa and the Kaffirland Fields have been amalgamated, the total value of books sold for one year and nine months is £2,375-16-3 while the total for the native *Signs of the Times* is £405-6-2, making a grand total of £2781-2-5. When we consider that the highest priced books sell at 6/6, we get some idea of the many thousands of truth-laden books and papers which have been placed in the hands of the people during this brief period.

While a large proportion of the sales are made in the thickly populated area of the Rand, many of these books are carried to various parts of South Africa and the adjacent countries, when natives return to

their homes periodically—this is the common practice.

Surely a rich harvest of souls will be reaped as a result of this seed sowing.

We have had some difficulty in securing regular colporteurs, although we are glad to say that we now have some good men in the field.

At the close of the Spion Kop Institute in November, eight students are going out to canvass for scholarships and five graduates are entering the canvassing work. Last year two students gained full scholarships.

We look forward to finishing the year strongly in the literature ministry of this field. The Lord has greatly blessed this important branch of His work.

THE winds of fortune are not too favourably set for the progress of the printed page in Nyasaland at present. While the men of the literature ministry have winged the gospel on in a most commendable way in this field, by means of booklets and tracts, the big obstacle to greater progress is the very limited purchasing power of the native population. The purchase of even a shilling book to them is an anxious problem and one not always readily solved.

Another difficulty is the illiteracy of a large proportion of the natives off the beaten track. We have a splendid body of conscientious colporter-evangelists, however, and when circumstances prevent them from making a sale they will often spend considerable time in telling the old, old story by word of mouth. In this way they have raised up a wonderful interest in the "hedges" as well as the "highways." Sometimes, after having persuaded a native who has a smattering of education to purchase a book, they will stay with him for a while to coach him in his study of the book so that he can later teach it to his fellow villagers.

This brave little band of self-sacrificing men can earn but a bare pittance from the sale of our literature but, notwithstanding the privation they experience, they go cheerily on with their work.

It is truly a labour of love with them, and it inspires one's heart to hear them testify to the precious blessings they enjoy in their ministry.

No human author will ever be able to print an accurate account of the wonderful trophies being won daily for the coming kingdom by the men of the literature ministry. Only the annals of heaven will reveal the magnitude of their labours and its fruitage. And only heavenly beings are able to make a true reckoning of the self-denial, the fortitude, and the patient forbearance, of a body of men whose ministry is beyond the ken of our laity, and many of our workers too.

If ever any body of workers should have the prayers, the love, and the whole-hearted support of our people the world around, it is the men and women who have given their lives to the ministry of the printed page.

Elke dag bring die pos vir ons werk,—bestellings, navrae, rapporte, ens., wat ons aandag geniet. Maar daar kom ook boodskappe wat ons bemoedig en verbly, b.v. rapporte van Bybelstudie wat gegee is, van persone wat belangstel in die waarheid, en van persone wat gereed is vir die doop. Langs alle weë sien ons die gesante van die Koning gaan; hul'e trotseer alle teenstand en ongeriewe. 

Op hierdie wyse het hulle groot belangstelling o p e - week langs die „paais en die lanings.“ Partykeer, na hulle daar-in geslaag het om 'n rasgenoot wat kwalik kan lees, oor te haal om 'n boek te koop, sal hulle 'n tyd by hom bly om hom te help om die boek te lees sodat hy weer later Sy bure kan onderrig.

Hierdie klompie selfopofferende manne maak maar baie min uit die leesstof wat hulle verkoop, maar

nieteenstaande die onberings, gaan hulle blymoedig aan met hul werk. Dis waarlik liefdediens wat hulle betref, en dit doen 'n mens se hart goed as mens hulle hoor getuig van die seënning wat hulle geniet in hul werk. THE College Prospectus for 1935 is now off the press. These will gladly be supplied to any who may be interested.

At a recent baptismal service held on Sabbath, October 20, eleven students followed their Lord in this solemn step to walk in newness of life.

THE Spartan and Stellar Clubs, the two physical culture organisations, gave a very interesting exhibition of gymnastic exercises and drills on a recent Sunday evening.

GRADUATION exercises will be held from November 1-3. The Class will present a programme on the evening of the 1st. A class consecration service will be held on the evening of the 2nd, followed by a special sermon by Elder J. H. Raubenheimer on Sabbath, November 3. The same evening Elder Milton Robison will deliver the Commencement Address.

PLANS for the new dining room and kitchen have now been approved, and construction will begin immediately. The building will be 85 x 47. The lower floor will contain kitchen, college store, post office, domestic science room, and dressmaking room.

The entire upper room will be utilised as dining room, except for a serving room on one side. The dining room will seat about 250 people. A double lift will be installed to convey the food from the kitchen to the serving room above.

Three Year College Course

BEGINNING with 1935, a three year course leading to graduation will displace the present two year course.

It has been felt for some time that a Normal Course or Theological Course alone, does not prepare the student to meet the varied demands upon him as he enters active service as a graduate.

At a recent meeting the decision was reached to expand the present course to a

three year course. Those who have completed the first year of College work in 1934, may finish the regular two year course if they choose, either Normal or Theological.

The new course will include both Normal and Theological work, as well as Vocational. Further vocational subjects will be added in 1935. Beginning with Standard VII, the boys will be given two years of woodwork, and two of agriculture, up to Standard X. The girls will study sewing and dressmaking for four years, Standards VII to X. In College the young men will be given a course in agriculture, and one in building construction; the young women receiving two courses in dietetics and domestic science.
