

What is the Future of Your Child?

As we review the blessings of the year at the college we are led to believe that now as never before is the time for the youth of this denomination to avail themselves of the priceless heritage of an education under the influences to be found here. Many have testified that their coming here has meant eternal life to them. After all, to become heirs of eternal life is paramount to all other considerations. The appeal of the Spirit of Prophecy is that the most important consideration in all educational effort should now be to prepare students for the crisis that lies just ahead.

No school or system of education can prepare one for all the eventualities of the hour to which we have come. No school can guarantee a position to its graduates. The schools of today are producing thousands of professionally well qualified men and women. The educational gazettes contain the names of hundreds of such who look vainly for employment. That is all a part of the days of uncertainty to which we have come. So far every consecrated graduate of our college has been offered

a place in the organised work of God. Even as I write, all except two of this year's graduates have already been called. One has voluntarily chosen to go into self-supporting work. At the same time he expresses himself as having been richly repaid for the years spent here.

While it is to be expected that those who finish a college course should hold themselves in readiness to go into the organised work, some may prefer to enter private life. The greatest consideration is the question of what has been wrought in the character and life. Over 94% of the more than 120 graduates of the college, extending over a period of almost thirty-five years, have remained true to the message. I venture to say that given a group of 100 of our young people over a similar period of time, who have not attended the college, the percentage of those who lose their hope would run into high figures, possibly 85 to 90 per cent.

As we plan for the future of our children, let us weigh the question, and put first things first. Primarily let us establish them in the Word and in the message, then let us give them as wide and as thorough a preparation for life as it is possible to give. Helderberg College—your school, is designed to do this very work.

Tekens Veldtogg 1-8 Desember

Nog 'n Geleentheid

DESEMBER 1-8,— weer 'n gulde geleentheid! 'n Geleentheid om Suid-Afrika, deur middel van die *Signs of the Times*, en *Tekens van die Tye*, te bestraal met die kosbare lig van teenwoordige waarheid!

Die konferensie het dit weer so gereal dat die werkers, soos gewoonlik, die voorou sal neem in hierdie werk om siele te wen, n.l., die *Tekens* veldtogg gedurende die eerste week in Desember.

Maar dis ook 'n geleentheid vir al die leke om die werk van die Here op 'n baie bepaalde en praktiese wyse uit te brei. Die waarheid, in sy verskillende fases sal vir twaalf maande na die huis van elke intekenaar gaan. Hoe meer subskripsies, hoe meer sal die verspreiding uitbrei en hoe meer mense sal die seën ontvang.

Dis weer 'n ander geleentheid vir ons ouderlinge en sendingwerkers van die kerke om die kerklede aan te spoor tot hernude inspanning op sendinggebied. Die prikkeling van 'n spesiale program blyk baie keer 'n seën te wees in die kerk se sendingprogram. Oms hoop dat al ons kerke die meeste sal maak van hierdie geleentheid.

Dit is 'n geleentheid vir die Suid-Afrikaanse Konferensie om sy prestasies van laas jaar ver te oortref. Ons spreek dus die hartlike saamewerking van elke werker en kerklid om die 1934 *Tekens* veldtogg 'n skitterende sukses te maak.

As gevolg van die poging wat Leraar Le Butt op Ladysmith gehou het, is op 17 November aldaar 'n doopdienst gehou. Leraar G. W. Shone en Mej. C. A. Dixie, bly op Ladysmith agter om die werk daar te behartig.

LERAAR S. G. HITEN het onlangs, na aflat van sy karavaanpoging op Miller, K.P., drie nuwe lede gedoop. Leraar Hiton hou nou dienste op Klipplaat. Een van die lede op Miller het aan Broeder Hiton 'n pragtige markeetent present gegee om te gebruik in sy karavaanpoggings.

LERAARS L. L. Moffitt, A. W. Staples, en John van der Merwe, superintendent van die Betsjoeanalandse Sendingveld, het onlangs teruggekeer, na 'n rondreis van vyf weke in Betsjoeanaland en noordelike Kaapland waar hulle die kerke, groepe, en afgelê lede besoek het. Hulle het sewe nuwe lede onder die afgelê gesinne gedoop.

'n Spesiale Opdrag

Toé die Here in die jaar 1885 die Sabatwaarheid aan die familie Wessels openbaar het, en hulle in verbintenis gestel het met die organisasie wat alreeds in Amerika bestaan het, was dit ongetwyfeld 'n spesiale opdrag aan die Afrikaanse volk; want as die Here lig gee dan is dit Sy bedoeling dat ons daardie lig sal laat skyn. Ons het dié saak miskien nog nie so opgeneem nie, maar as ons 'n oomblik daaroor nadink, sal ons sien watter heilige verantwoordelikheid daar op ons rus.

Die Here gee nooit 'n bevel sonder dat Hy ook die krag en die middels daartoe verskaf nie. Almal wat vandag deur die Gees van die Here besiel is om die genadeboodskap aan alle volke, stamme, en tonge te bring, besef dat die drukpers van God daargestel is om die reusestaak te volbring.

Die Here het aan ons in Suid-Afrika 'n moderne drukpers gegee, en elke maand verskyn daar 'n blad wat die laaste genadeboodskap aan ons volk bevat. Kan die Here meer doen as wat Hy alreeds gedaan het? Al wat ons moet doen is net om die blad met sy boodskap, te versprei.

As mens die lys van kerke nagaan, en opmerk wat gedoen word in die verspreiding van die *Tekens*, dan word jou hart seer om te sien dat daar uitsluitlik Afrikaanse kerke is wat nie eens één eksemplaar van die *Tekens* versprei nie. Vriende,

laat ons nie wag totdat die sendingsekretaris ons moet smeek om iets te doen nie, maar laat ons intekenaars werf en ook almal, persoonlik 'n klub *Tekens* neem en toesien dat dit aan familieldele, vriende, en andere gestuur word.

Laat ons die saad saai, die Here sal die wasdom gee. So baiemaal is ons te haastig om die vrugte te wil sien. Dis die werk van die Heilige Gees om harte te oortuig, maar dis ons werk om die boodskap te verkondig. Laat ons getrou wees in ons pligte; die Here sal self Sy deel van die werk doen.

'n Paar maande gelede het ek een more vroeg op Bloemfonteiniasie 'n skrander jong man ontmoet wat toe net sy diplomakursus aan die Glen Landbouskool voltooi het. Hy het met my gesels, en ek was verbaas oor sy algemene kennis van wêreldstoestande en hul verband met die profesieë van die Bybel. Dit was egter nie lank nie of hy het my vertel hoedat hy al hierdie dinge in so'n uitstekende tydskrif, *Die Tekens van die Tye*, lees. Hy het verder gesê, „Ek kry altyd die blad in die boekrak hier op die stasie, maar vanmore is daar niks.“ Ek het gedink, „As die broeder of suster wat die blaais daar kom insit maar net kon weet, dat die saadjies, feitlik op die water gestrooi, nie tevergeefs is nie.“

Wat is U Kind se Toekoms?

WAAR ons nadink oor die seënninge van die afgelope jaar by die kollege, kan ons nie help om te glo dat dit nou die tyd is, soos nog nooit tevore nie, dat die jongmense van hierdie genootskap sal gebruik maak van die onskatbare erfenis van 'n opvoeding onder sulke heilsame invloede. Baie het getuenis afgelê dat hulle verblif hier vir hulle die ewige lewe beteken het. Per slot van rekening is die saak van alle grootste belang om die ewige lewe te beérwe. Wat opvoeding betref, lê die Gees van professie nadruk daarop dat dit van die grootste gewig is om die studente voor te berei vir die krisis wat net voor lê.

Geen skool of stelsel van opvoeding kan mens voorberei vir alles wat in hierdie dae mag gebeur nie. Geen skool kan 'n betrekking vir sy studente waarborg nie. Dusende bevoegde manne in die verskilende beroepe verlaat vandag die opvoedingsinrigtings. Die onderwysblaais bevat honderde name van diegenne wat tevergeefs op betrekking wag. Dis maar net 'n deel van die onsekerheid van ons dae. Tot dusver het nog elke toegewyde gegradeerde van ons kollege 'n betrekking in die werk

geky. Selfs almal behalwe twee van hierdie jaar se graderdes het al beroepe ontvang. Een het verkieks om selfonderhoudende werk te begin, en hy verklaar ook dat hy ryklik beloon is vir die jare wat hy hier vernoef het.

Terwyl dit verwag word dat diegene wat die kollegekursus deurgemaak het, gereed sal wees om in die werk in te gaan, mag daar diegene wees wat private betrekkinge sal aanvaar. Die saak van oorheersende belang is wat in die lewe en karakter uitgerig is. Oor die 94% van die meer as 120 gegradeerde van die kollege oor die afgelope vyf-en-dertig jaar het getrou gebly aan die waarheid. Ek verstout my om te sê dat daar onder 'n 100 van ons jongmense, wat nie ons kollege bygewoon het nie, oor dieselfde tydperk 'n baie groot persentasie sal wees wat hulle hoop verloor het — moontlik 85 tot 95 persent.

Waar ons, as ouers, planne maak vir die toekoms van ons kinders, laat ons die vraag deeglik oorweeg, en die belangrikste dinge die eerste plek gee. Laat ons hulle hoofsaaklik in die Woord en in die Boodskap bevestig, en laat ons hulle dan 'n grondige en veelsydige voorbereiding vir die lewe gee. Helderberg Kollege—u skool, is daargestel juis vir hierdie doel.

They report that seven new members from isolated families were baptised.
