So, while I was in attendance at the recent Autumn Council, an earnest request was directed to the General Conference Committee asking that Brother Evans be permitted to come to our field during this year. After very careful consideration was given to the appeal, it was voted for him to visit Africa following his trip to the South American Division. He is in South America at the present time and will sail from there on March 13. This should bring him to Cape Town on March 23.

Elder Evans is at present the senior Vice-President of the General Conference. For eighteen years he was in charge of our work in the old Far Eastern Division where he helped to pioneer the way in China. His ministry for over a half century in this cause has been richly blessed of Heaven and, therefore, we feel we are very fortunate indeed to have him, with his large and ripe experience in the things of God, visit Africa at this time.

He is due to arrive in Africa in time to attend the European

camp-meeting which will convene in Bloemfontein, March 29 to April 7. We are also hopeful that he will reach us in time to enjoy a part of the Cape Field camp-meeting to be held March 22-25.

Then, too, it is a pleasure to announce in this connection the coming visit of Elder S. A. Wellman of the General Conference Sabbath School Department. Ever since the last General Conference session we have had our invitation placed with the home officers for a visit from Elder Wellman. Our request has finally been granted and he will reach Africa on March 21. Thus he will be here in time for our first camp-meetings.

Well, dear brethren and sisters, the General Conference has been very considerate once more of the Southern African Division in providing such splendid help during our 1935 camp-meeting season. We know these visitors from overseas will bring much spiritual help and counsel to us. Hence we believe that all our workers and laity will join us in extending to these brethren a most cordial and warm-hearted welcome as they come to spend a few months in our midst.

### Change in Presidents for the South African Union

It is with deep regret that the Southern African Division has been called upon to release Elder N. C. Wilson from its limited staff of workers in this field. After giving careful and prayerful study to the invitation of the recent Autumn Council, however, Brother Wilson deemed it best to accept the appointment which elects him as the new president of the Southern Asia Division.

The ten years our beloved brother and fellow-labourer, together with his family, spent in Africa have been fruitful ones indeed. He endeared himself to both laity and workers in every section of the field where it was his pleasure to serve the cause of truth. Thus, as he goes from us, he leaves behind him a host of friends who will always fondly cherish his helpful associations.

At the present writing the family is greatly benefiting by a well-earned furlough in the United States of America. It is planned that they will reach their new field of labour about August of this year.

Upon my return to Africa following the recent Autumn Council, the South African Union committee gave study to electing a successor to Elder Wilson. Several names were submitted for consideration. The brethren took ample time to pray and counsel together before any definite decision was reached. Then it was voted unanimously to request the Division to secure from the General Conference the release of Elder A. F. Tarr, the Division secretary, so that he might fill the vacancy created by the release of Elder Wilson. After due

study was given by the Division committee to the union's request, it was voted to pass on to the General Conference committee the desire of the South African Union committee for favourable action.

It is well, however, to state in this connection that we were indeed reluctant to take an action which would mean separating Elder Tarr from his office as Division secretary. On the other hand, we felt it wise to extend to him the privilege of deciding upon the call as he and his wife would deem best.

Now that Brother Tarr has accepted and is willing to serve the union in this capacity if released from his present office by the General Conference, we can but wish him God-speed and the abundant blessing of the Lord as he assumes his new responsibility.

Elder Tarr needs no introduction to our believers within the Union of South Africa. He is well known and holds the confidence of the field. His years of experience qualify him to grapple with the task that awaits him. Thus we shall ever pray the Lord to make his ministry and leadership throughout the union fruitful. And as he enters upon his new duties as from March 1, 1935, we bespeak for him the same cordial co-operation which was so definitely given his predecessor.

### Quiet Talks with the Medical Secretary

"REFORM, continual reform, must be kept before the people, and by our example we must enforce our teaching. True religion and the laws of health go hand in hand. It is impossible to work for the salvation of men and women without presenting to them the need of breaking away from sinful gratifications, which destroy the health, debase the soul, and prevent divine truth from impressing the mind. . . . Let the poor have the gospel of health preached unto them from a practical point of view, that they may know how to care properly for the body, which is the temple of the Holy Ghost."—"Counsels on Health," page 480.

And don't you see that true religion and proper eating go hand in hand? What further apology need I make for spending so much time on the food question?

We had a nice dinner, in our last talk. And now it is well past supper time. So let us get busy. What shall we have? Shall we eat supper at all? This is a matter for personal decision. The man who is busily employed all day at manual labour, on the farm or in the shop needs a substantial evening meal. The brain worker, who has been sitting at his desk all day, may choose to have nothing in the evening. I know it cannot always be arranged that way, but when it can, the big meal should be at noon rather than at night, so that the stomach will not have to work while we are trying to sleep.

The ideal evening meal is a light, easily-digested one, consisting of bread and butter, milk and cottage cheese, fruit (some of it raw and served plain, in salad, or in dessert), or tomatoes, or corn. Beverages are permissible during meals provided they are not used to wash the food down and save chewing. If there is any tendency to this, it might be as well to do no drinking till the eating is finished. For cold weather postum, vi-tone, ovaltine or rooi-bos tea are good. Rooi-bos tea does not contain caffeine, and for that reason is not subject to the same objections as ordinary tea. Cocoa has good food value, and while some folk find that it causes biliousness, it is quite a good beverage, especially when made with milk. For hot weather a fruit drink is more suitable and refreshing. Water may be put on the table, provided it is used in moderation, and not to wash the food down. If it is cold, as ice water, it should not be gulped down. It is better to sip it. Digestion can only go forward at body heat. So if a lot of ice water is taken, the stomach cannot continue its

**The Annual Meeting of the

At the appointed time the Division Committee assembled at Claremont for its regular annual meeting. All the union superintendents were present and we were kept exceedingly busy with the numerous items of business that were presented for consideration. While we were cheered with the reports of progress in each section of the field, yet we were gravely concerned as to how to take advance steps with so many difficulties to be faced. It was hard to know how to make our men and means stretch far enough to care for many of the unanswered calls that pressed in upon us. However, we were greatly encouraged from the opening of our meeting to its close with the following statement from the Spirit of prophecy:

"Often men are tempted to falter before the perplexities and obstacles that confront them. But if they will hold the beginning of their confidence steadfast unto the end, God will make the way clear. Success will come to them as they struggle against difficulties. Before the intrepid spirit and unwavering faith of a Zerubbabel, great mountains of difficulty will become a plain; and He whose hands have laid the foundation, even His hands shall also finish it.

"Human power and human might did not establish the church of God, and neither can they destroy it. Not on the rock of human strength, but on Christ Jesus, the Rock of Ages, was the church founded, 'and the gates of hell shall not prevail against it.'

After the reading of this quotation and a season of earnest prayer the committee took up its work. **Appreciation to General Conference**

On behalf of our 44,557 Sabbath keepers, of whom 23,531 are baptised believers, as well as on behalf of our 1,048 workers in the Southern African Division, we fervently desire to express our heartfelt thanks and gratitude to the General Conference for the appropriations granted to us by the Autumn Council of 1934. We are deeply grateful that no large cut was made in the funds granted, and that the brethren found it possible to give \$5,000 (£1,000) as a special toward the opening of the new medical station in the Bechuanaland Protectorate. And now, as we accept these gifts, we are solemnly reminded once more of the liberal sacrifice and the loyal devotion of our dear people which have made possible these funds, therefore,

*Resolved*, That we, as a committee, pledge ourselves as never before to a careful and judicious use of these appropriations to the end that an abundant harvest of souls may be garnered for the kingdom during 1935.

**Transportation of Workers' Children  
to Helderberg**

A request was presented from the South African Union Conference for an interpretation of the policy regarding the transportation of workers' children to Helderberg. The present reading of the policy places the responsibility of that portion of the fare above £4 upon the union or-

ganisation. After carefully considering the matter the committee

*Voted*, That in case of the children of conference workers, the responsibility be placed upon the conference rather than the union organisation. The first paragraph of the policy, page 110 would then read as follows:

The union organisation (or, in the case of a conference, the conference organisation) in which the worker is labouring, will pay the transportation expenses of the children of workers attending Helderberg College on the following basis:

To first child attending school, the cost of scholar's concession return fare above £4; to the second child the amount above £2; the full transportation expenses of the third child.

#### Students Proceeding Overseas for Study

WHEREAS, the economic condition in America makes very uncertain the securing of employment by students who wish to work part of their way through school; and

WHEREAS, Some having gone overseas independently of the counsel of the Division committee, have found themselves in financial distress before finishing their course and have requested financial assistance from this field; and

WHEREAS, Some who have gone overseas independently to do advanced work without any definite prospect, or promise from the Division committee of being called back for service have been disappointed in not receiving a call;

*Be it resolved*, That any person who proceeds overseas independently for educational work including medical training without a definite understanding with the Division committee, shall not look to the organisations of the Division for any financial aid; nor shall he consider that he has any guarantee whatever of receiving a call for service in this field.

#### Increase in Tithe and Offerings

*Voted*, That we accept the General Conference recommendation and urge the union fields to do everything possible toward increasing their 1935 tithe and offerings by an amount equivalent to from fifteen per cent to twenty-five per cent over and above the offerings for 1933.

In order to encourage more liberal giving on the part of our native believers in the matter of camp-meeting, Week of Sacrifice and Annual Offering appeals particularly,

*We recommend*, The using of individual envelopes on which shall be printed such short quotations from the Spirit of prophecy as the following: "He gave His blood, He asks our silver," and others that may be appropriate. These envelopes shall be distributed by the native workers in good time before the date set for the offering and the members should be urged to place in their envelopes as large a silver offering as possible, bringing the envelopes with them to the camp-meeting, or in the case of the other offerings, handing same to

responsible native workers, or, in their absence, forwarding to the mission station or mission field office.

*Recommended*, That in all our mission fields, the first Sabbath in each month throughout the year, be recognised as Tithe Sabbath, and that from time to time articles and sermon notes on the subject of tithe-paying be prepared and published in the union papers. That as a continual reminder to our native people of the importance of faithfulness in tithe paying, printed placards, suitably worded, be hung on the inside walls of the church building, also that use be made of the pledge card recommended by the General Conference, printed in the vernacular. In addition to these, that there be obtained for publication a number of experiences of our native believers in tithe paying and that the union and local field offices do everything possible to promote the payment of a faithful tithe.

In order to encourage more faithfulness on the part of our European members in the matter of tithe paying,

*We recommend*, 1. The use of the pledge card recommended by the General Conference.

2. A Tithe month.

3. A special issue of the OUTLOOK dealing with the importance of faithful tithe paying.

4. Publishing throughout the year experiences of individuals who have been faithful in the payment of tithe.

#### Big Week Extension

*Voted*, That the project to benefit under the 1935 Big Week Extension be the erection of a home for the Davies family on the new site to take the place of Buganda Mission. A goal of £400 was set.

#### Thirteenth Sabbath Overflow

*Voted*, That the overflow from the coming Thirteenth Sabbath offering be appropriated as follows:

*One-third* to the South East African

Union for a church at Mwami Mission.

*Two-thirds* for the first hospital unit at the Barotseland Mission.

#### Report of Helderberg Commission

The following report presented by the Chairman of the Helderberg Commission was adopted by the committee:

Your committee appointed to study the problem of preparation of Helderberg College students for Government examinations met at Johannesburg, November 24-28, 1934, and spent the time in careful and prayerful study of the important question assigned to them. Great effort was made to study every phase of the question, and to carefully weigh the matter from every viewpoint. The committee fully sense the seriousness of this problem and their obligation to safeguard the objectives and tone of the college.

We therefore wish to offer the following recommendations:

WHEREAS, Students in South Africa who wish to enter professional life are required to possess a Matriculation Certificate in order to enter university, and

WHEREAS, There are certain of our Seventh-day Adventist youth who wish to enter professional life, and

WHEREAS, In some divided homes one parent may hesitate sending the children to an institution that does not prepare students for public examinations, thereby depriving the student of the privilege of Christian education, and

WHEREAS, Certain graduates who for some reason may not enter denominational employ might experience difficulty in securing private employment without the Matriculation Certificate, and

WHEREAS, Owing to the preponderance of the native and coloured population, peculiar conditions exist in South Africa regarding employment, and

WHEREAS, Over a period of years there has been an urgent appeal from the field that Helderberg make provision for students to write Matriculation examination, and

WHEREAS, The committee has found it possible to make certain changes in the regular secondary course along the line of the Matriculation syllabus which we feel will still preserve the denominational viewpoint and mould, and

WHEREAS, These changes with additional coaching will make it possible for students to sit for Matriculation examinations,

*Voted*, That we adopt the recommendations made to us by the Helderberg Commission, viz.:

1. That modifications be made to the present secondary course of study which will help such students as may desire to sit for Matriculation.

2. That the modification be only such as will keep the secondary course at the college within the denominational system and mould.

3. That in the two vacation courses which we recommend to be given at the college, provision be made for the extra preparation which will be necessary to enable students to cover the work not included in the regular course.

#### Recommendation re Commercial Course

WHEREAS, Some of our Seventh-day Adventist youth will have completed their formal education upon the termination of the secondary course, and will desire to go directly into some occupation for the purpose of earning a living, and

WHEREAS, It seems desirable that electives should be offered in the secondary course in order to enable such pupils to pursue an education more in harmony with their talents and needs,

*We therefore recommend*, That the Commercial Course at the college be modified along the lines of the Union Education Department syllabus so that students who may choose to write the Union Education Department examinations in Commerce may do so under the same safeguards and

conditions as are included in the recommendation on Matriculation.

#### Recommendation re Vocational Guidance

*We recommend,* That the College Board give study to systematic vocational guidance along the lines suggested, namely, that students be definitely advised and counselled as to life work.

#### Recommendation re Three-Year Course

*We recommend,* To the Board the introduction of additional elective subjects in the three-year course as may be feasible, looking forward to the time when these electives might be incorporated in additional courses.

#### Recommendation re Inspection

WHEREAS, It is desirable that a high standard of work be maintained at our college, and

WHEREAS, External inspection should be a great help in this direction, we

*Recommend,* That the Division committee develop a policy for regular external inspection of Helderberg College.

#### Recommendation re Manual Training

*We recommend,* That the College Board give study to offering further manual training electives with Agriculture in Standards IX and X.

#### Inspection Committee

*Voted,* That the following persons form an Inspection Committee to inspect Helderberg College:

Milton Robison, E. M. Cadwallader, F. T. Milne.

#### Medical Work

The committee gave considerable study to the upbuilding of the medical work in various sections of the field. We have placed with the General Conference our call for a number of doctors to come to Africa during this year and the early part of 1936. According to present arrangements one doctor will be sent to Portuguese East Africa; one to Barotseland; two to the new medical station to be erected in the Lake Ngamiland region of the Bechuanaland Protectorate, and one to either the Kirundi or Bikobo Hill Missions in the Congo. It is also planned to assist Dr. Wesley Herbert in opening up a self-supporting practice in Johannesburg during the latter part of 1935. Dr. Herbert will also unite with Dr. Tonge in the endeavour to lay a strong foundation for the opening of a European medical institution in this Division at a later date. Thus the future prospects for aggressive medical work within the Southern African Division loom up very brightly before us at this writing.

A number of new appointments were considered for Helderberg College, but we are not prepared to give information concerning these at present. This will be given in a later issue of the OUTLOOK.

#### Institute on Church Activities and Organisation—Helderberg

*Voted,* That we look with favour upon the plan of conducting an institute at Helderberg College for the purpose of giving instruction to the senior students and others along the lines of church activities, conference and mission field organisation, etc., and that we work with the South African Union in planning for this institute.

#### Camp-Meeting Dates

*Voted,* That the camp-meetings in the various unions be on the following dates:

South African Union, March to May.

Zambesi Union, July to September.

So. East African Union, May and July.

Angola Union, June 15 to August 1.

Congo Union, July and August.

These are but a few of the many actions passed by the committee. Space forbids our giving a detailed report. We feel well devised plans have been laid for the year and as we take up the work for 1935, we would earnestly request our workers and laity to supplicate the throne of Grace daily to the end that the present year will be one of advance and fruitage in all lines of missionary endeavour throughout the Division.

work until it has had a chance to warm up again.

It is very unwise to eat food between meals. It keeps the stomach working continuously without giving it proper periods of rest. And it spoils the appetite for the regular meals. Sweets contain good food value, especially when made of glucose instead of cane sugar, and, if taken in moderation and as a dessert at the end of an ordinary meal, they are wholesome.

The child who will not eat is sometimes quite a problem. His lack of appetite is due, in most cases, to too many cakes or sweets between meals. If a child will not eat, it is better not to coax. Place the food before him, and leave it there. If he will not eat, excuse him from the table. But let it be clearly understood that there will be nothing more for him till the next meal. A normal child who is having proper exercise will soon develop an appetite, if this rule is followed. If he does not, then it is advisable to consult your family doctor, and let him examine the child. Loss of appetite may be a symptom of many different diseases.

Lekkers het goeie voedingswaarde, veral as hulle van druiewesuiker in plaas van rietsuiker gemaak is, en as hulle in klein hoeveelhede as 'n nagereg aan die einde van 'n gewone maaltyd geëet word, is hulle gesond.

Dit is soms moeilik om te weet wat om met kinders te maak wat nie wil eet nie. Die oorsaak is gewoonlik te veel koek en lekkers tussen maaltye. As 'n kind nie wil eet nie is dit beste om nie aan te hou nie. Sit die kos voor hom neer en laat dit daarby bly. As hy nie wil eet nie, laat hom toe om die tafel te verlaat. Maar laat hom goed verstaan dat hy niks sal kry voor die volgende maaltyd nie. 'n Normale kind wat genoeg oefening kry, sal gou 'n goeie eetlus hê as ons hierdie reël volg. Indien nie, moet u u huisdokter raadpleeg in die kind deeglik laat ondersoek. Gebrek aan eetlus is 'n simptoom van verskeie siektes.

### New Headquarters for the South East African Union Mission Field

For many years our brethren in Nyasaland have felt the need of a headquarters' home and office for their growing work in that union. In fact, such quarters should have been provided a long time ago. The rent which has been expended over a long period of years would have been saved to our own cause if steps had been taken to purchase such a property.

Then, too, the brethren have felt the need of some permanent headquarters because of the fact that a number of reports have been noised abroad the last few years to the effect that we, as a society, were not really established in Nyasaland because we did not have any headquarters' office. This, together with the needs of the work, made the brethren feel we should have a property of our own as soon as it could be secured.

Thus, during the visit of Elder C. H. Watson to Nyasaland last April, the matter came up for renewed consideration. We looked at several properties. We very deeply appreciated Elder Watson's counsel concerning each of these. After taking time to look over the various properties it was voted to advise the union to purchase one on the edge of Blantyre.

Now, in this issue of the OUTLOOK we are pleased to show a recent picture of the property. It shows the home, with the surroundings as well as the new modest office building that has just been completed. We are pleased that the brethren have been able to provide in this long-felt need, and we feel that this step will greatly strengthen our work in the South East African Union Mission Field.

Verder verskaf dit ons genot om te kan aankondig dat Leraar S. A. Wellman van die Wêreldkonferensie Sabbatskooldepartement ons ook sal besoek. Tydens die jongste sessie van die Wêreldkonferensie is ons versoek al ingedien dat Leraar Wellman na ons sal oorkom. Nou is ons versoek eindelik toegestaan en hy sal op 21 Maart hier aankom. ## 'n Onderhoud met die Mediese Sekretaris

„HERVORMING, voortdurende hervorming, moet onder die aandag van die mense gehou word, en ons voorbeeld moet bekragtig wat ons leer. Dit is onmoontlik om te werk vir die verlossing van manne en vroue sonder om hulle te wys op die noodsaklikheid dat hulle moet ophou om hul sondige neigings te bevredig, wat die gesondheid vernietig, die siel verlaag en goddelike waarheid verbinder om 'n indruk op die verstand te maak. . . Laat die evangelië van gesondheid op 'n praktiese manier aan die armes verkondig word, sodat hulle kan weet hoe om die liggaam, wat die tempel van die Heilige Gees is, te versorg.”—„Counsels on eHealth,” bls. 480.

En kan u nie sien dat ware godsrug en reg eet hand aan hand gaan nie. Waarom moet ek dus verder om verskoning vra dat ek soveel tyd aan die kwessie van voedsel bestee?

In ons vorige onderhoud het ons 'n smaaklike middagete bespreek. En nou word dit tyd vir die aandete. Ons moet aanstalte maak. Wat sal ons klaarmaak? Is die aandete nodig? U moet vir self besluit. Die man wat heeldag besig is met handearbeid op die plaas of in die werkwinkel het behoefté aan 'n voedsame aandete. Die een wat kopwerk doen en die hele dag aan sy lessenaar sit, mag verkieks om niks in die aand te eet nie. Ek weet dit kan nie altyd so gereël word nie, maar waar dit enigsins moontlik is, moet die grootste maal van die dag op die middag liewer as in die aand bedien word, sodat die maag nie hoef te werk terwyl ons probeer om te slaap nie.

Die ideale aandete is lig en verteerbaar en bestaan uit brood en botter, melk en suurmelkkaas, vrugte (sommige rou en bedien net soos dit is of in die vorm van 'n slai of 'n nagereg) of tamaties of groen mielies. Dranke kan bedien word met die maaltye mits hulle nie gebruik word om die voedsel ongekou na die maag te voer nie. As daar 'n neiging is om dit te doen, is dit beter om niks te drink voor die ete verby is nie. Met koue weer kan ons postum, vi-tone, ovaltine, of rooibostee bedien. Rooibostee bevat nie kaffeïen nie en is dus nie onderhewig aan dieselfde beware as gewone tee nie. Kakao het goeie voedingswaarde en hoewel sommige mense klaw dat dit hulle galagtig maak, is dit 'n goeie drank veral met melk gemaak. Vir warm dae is 'n vrugtedrank heerlik en verkwikkend. Water mag op die tafel kom as dit matig gebruik word en nie om die kos ongekou af te sluk nie. Yswater moet nie in groot mondevol gedrink word nie maar langsaam. Die verteringsproses vereis liggaamtemperatuur. As 'n groot hoeveelheid yswater dus gedrink word kan die maag sy werk nie doen voordat hy eers sy inhoud warm gemaak het nie.

## Jaarvergadering van die Divisie Komitee

26-31 DESEMBER 1934

Op die bepaalde datum het die Divisie hul gewone jaarvergadering te Claremont gehou. Al die unie superintendente was teenwoordig, en ons was baie besig gehou met die verskillende items wat ons moes afhandel. Hoewel ons verbly was oor die vooruitgang in alle dele van die veld, het die vraag hoe ons voorwaarts kon gaan temidde van die vele moeilikhede in die weg, ons groot bekommernis veroorsaak. Dit was 'n probleem om te weet hoe om ons manne en middele te verdeel sodat ons aan die vele versoek wat aan ons gerig was, kon voldoen. Nogtans was ons baie bemoedig deur die volgende woorde uit die Gees van profesie:

„Die moeilikhede en struikelblokke waarvoor mense te staan kom maak hulle dikwels wankelmoedig. Maar as ons die beginsel van ons vertroue vashou tot die einde toe, sal God die pad vir ons skoonmaak. Diegene wat teen die moeilikhedestry, sal die oorwinning behaal. Voor die onverskrokke gees en onwankelbare geloof van Serubbabel het die groot berge van moeilikhede, gelyktes geword; en die hande wat die fondament gele het, ja, sy hande sal dit voltooi.

„Menslike krag en menslike mag het nie die kerk van God daargestel nie, en hulle kan dit ook nie vernietig nie. Die kerk was nie op die rots van menslike krag, maar op Jesus Christus die Rots van die Eeu, gebou, „en die poorte van die hel sal dit nie oorweldig nie.”

Na ons hierdie aanhaling gelees het en 'n tyd in gebed deurgebring het, het die komitee met sy werk begin. Ons het die teenwoordigheid van die Here gevoel, en vertrou dat ons goeie planne gemaak het vir die werk in die Divisie gedurende 1935. Omdat ons dink dat ons broeders en susters sal belangstel in sommige van die resolusies van die komitee, publiseer ons die volgende uittreksel uit die notule:

**Besluit**, Dat ons as individue, as leiers op wie groot verantwoordelikheid rus, en as 'n Divisie komitee, hiermee ons nederige en hartlike dank betuig aan God vir Sy oorvoerde seëninge en gunsbewyse aan ons. Ook wy ons onself weer by verwuwing aan Hom toe om Sy groot saak in die Suidelike Afrikaanse Divisie te bevorder.

### Erkenning aan Wêreldkonferensie

Die Suid-Afrikaanse Unie het versoek dat ons 'n uiteenstelling gee van ons beleid ten opsigte van die vervoer van kinders van werkers na Helderberg. Volgens die huidige vertolking is die Unie aanspreeklik vir alle reiskoste bokant £4. Na deeglike oorweging het die komitee

**Besluit**, Dat die verantwoordelikheid in die geval van kinders van konferensiewerkers, op die konferensie liewer as op die unie moet rus. Die eerste paragraaf van

ons beleid op bladsy 110, sal dus as volg lees:

„Die unie organisasie (of, in geval van 'n konferensie, die konferensie organisasie) waarin die werker werkzaam is, sal die reisokoste na Helderberg Kollege, van kinders van werkers betaal op die volgende basis: Alle reiskoste bokant £4 vir die eerste kind se retoer konsessie kaartjie; vir die tweede kind, alle reiskoste bokant £2; en die volle reiskoste vir die derde kind.”

### Studente wat Oorsee Gaan vir Studie

AANGESIEN die ekonomiese toestande in Amerika die verskaffing van werk aan studente wat hulle studiegeld wil verdien, baie wisselvallig maak; en

AANGESIEN, Sommige op eie rekening sonder raadpleging met die Divisie komitee oorsee gegaan het en daar in geldelike moeilikhede geraak het voordat hulle hul kursus voltooi het, en by die Divisie kom aanklop het om geldelike steun; en

AANGESIEN, Sommige op eie rekening oorsee gegaan het vir verdere studie, sonder definitiewe vooruitsigte of beloftes van die Divisie komitee om hulle te beroep, teleurgestel was omdat hulle geen beroep ontvang het nie;

**Besluit ons**, Dat enige persoon wat op eie rekening oorsee gaan vir opvoedkundige of mediese studies, sonder 'n definitiewe verstandhouding met die Divisie komitee, hom nie kan beroep op enige van die organisasies van die Divisie vir geldelike steun nie; ook moet hy nie reken dat hy enige waarborg het dat hy beroep sal word vir werk in hierdie veld nie.

### Vermeerdering van Tiendes en Offerandes

**Besluit**, Dat ons die voorstel van die Wêreldkonferensie aanvaar en die unie velde versoek om alles in hul vermoë te doen om die tiendes en offerandes gedurende 1935 met tenminste vyftien tot vyf-en-twintig persent te vermeerder bo dié van 1933.

Ten einde 'n meer vrygewige gees aan te kweek by ons inboorlinge gelowiges ten opsigte van kampdiensofferandes, Week van Opoffering gifte, en Jaarlike Offerandesveral,

**Beveel ons aan**, Dat daar koevertjies gedruk word met korte aanhalings uit die Gees van profesie daarop, as volg: „Hy het Sy bloed gegee, Hy vira ons silwer,” of ander wat paslik is. Hierdie koevertjies moet deur inboorlingwerkers, voor die tyd uitgegee word, en daar moet by die lede aangedring word om so'n milde silwer offerande as moontlik daarin te plaas, en die koevertjie met hulle saam te bring na die kampdiens, of in die geval van ander offerandes, om dit aan verantwoordelike inboorlingwerkers te gee, of in geval van hul afwesigheid, dit aan die sendingstasie te stuur, of aan die sendingkantoor.

**Ons beveel aan**, Dat die eerste Sabbat van elke maand, in alle sendingvelde sal beskou word as Tiende Sabbat, en dat daar van tyd tot tyd in ons blaarie, artikels en preke oor die betaling van tiendes, verskyn. Om ons inboorlingede gedurig te herinner

aan die belangrikheid van getroue tiendedbetaling, stel ons voor dat daar 'n gedrukte plakaat, behoorlik opgestel, binne elke kerkgebou opgehang word, en ook dat die beloftekaartjies soos deur die Wêreldkonferensie aan die hand gegee, in die kaffertale gedruk en gebruik sal word. En benewens dit nog, dat daar van 'n aantal van ons inboorlinggelowiges, hul ervarings in verband met die betaling van tiendes, sal verneem en gedruk word, en dat die unie en plaaslike kantore alles in hul vermoë sal doen met die doel om die getroue betaling van tiendes te bevorder.



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## Die Een Noodsaaklike Ding

ONS leef in 'n besige eeu. Mense haas herwaarts en derwaarts. Hulle het nie tyd om te wag nie. Dis net haas en woel. Die wêreld is besig. Daar is 'n intense gejaagdheid. Die spoedmanie het besit geneem van die mense en dryf hulle aan met onweerstaanbare mag. Die „blits-snelstrein“ is nou te stadig. Ons moet vinniger gaan; dus „gee ons petrol“ en trag ons om afstand te vernietig, of ons jaag deur die lug in 'n wedloop met die son. Ons dring aan op meer spoed, en „gou maak“ is ons wagwoord.

Maar wat beteken al die haas en spoed? —A, dis die gees van die eeu. Ons lewe in die laaste dae. Die tyd is kort en die einde van alle dinge is voor die deur. Mense mag dit nie glo nie maar Satan glo dit wel. Hy studeer die profesieë en hy weet dat die laaste dae aangebreek het. Hy weet dat die tyd kort is en dit maak hom kwaad. Hy gaan voort "met groot woede, omdat hy weet dat hy min tyd het." Hy is haastig want hy wil sy vernielingswerk voltooi voor die einde. Dieselfde gees het besit geneem van die mense totdat dit skyn of selfs die lug verpes is van die manie vir waaghalsige spoed. Dit het besit geneem van die wêreld.

Daar ons so besig is en in so 'n gejaagde eeu lewe, verkeer ons in die grootste gevaar om oorrompel te word deur die gees van gejaagdheid en om *die één ding wat noodsaaklik is te vergeet*—ONS DAE-LIKSE, GEDURIGE GEMEENSKAP MET GOD. As 'n volk, is ons ook baie besig met ons werksaamhede, en dit is goed. Ons het baie veldtoge om die werk te bevorder, en dit moet so wees. Ons het spesiale dae en programmas en kennisgewings vir ons mense, en dit is reg. Voorwaar die tyd is kort en die werk moet klaargemaak word.

„O, as u my gaan aan die slaap maak,“ sê die dogtertjie, „moet ek eers my gebedjie opse.“ Sy het geknield en die gebedjie opgesê wat sy geken het. Later het die arts vertel dat hyself daar die aand gebid het vir die eerste keer in dertig jaar.

In tye van moeilikheid soos dié waarin

ons nou is, het ons behoefté aan ernstige gebed. Ons kan nooit die taak voltooi, wat God ons opgelê het sonder goddelike krag nie. Maar om hierdie krag te ontvang moet ons in aanraking wees met die bron van alle krag. Ja, 'n stroom van krag moet voortdurend deur ons vloei. We are living in a busy age. Men rush hither and thither. They have no time to wait. All is hurry and bustle. The world is busy. Intensity is taking hold of everything. The speed mania is taking possession of the people and is irresistibly rushing them along. The "lightning express" has become too slow. We must find other means of speed; so we "step on the gas," and seek to annihilate distance, or we rush through the air and attempt to race with the sun. More speed is the urge, and "step lively" is the daily word.

But why this haste? Why this speed in our day?—Ah, it is the spirit of the age. We are living in the last days. Time is short, and the end of all things is at hand. Men may not believe it, but the devil does. He, too, is busy. He is a student of prophecy, and he knows that we are in the last days. He knows that time is short; and this makes him angry. He rushes forth, "having great wrath, because he knoweth that he hath but a short time." He is in a hurry. He wants to accomplish his work of destruction before the end. This same spirit is instilled into the hearts of the people today until the very atmosphere seems surcharged with the mania of rush and break-neck speed. It has taken possession of the world.
