Mwami Mission, North-east Rhodesia

G. PEARSON

WHILE we have nothing spectacular to report about the progress of the work at Mwami, yet we are making steady advance in all lines of our mission endeavour. Two separate evangelistic efforts were held in the month of April about forty miles apart and twenty new converts were gained, while several thousand tracts in the vernacular were distributed which will bear fruit some time. Seventy-five per cent of these converts were gained from the ranks of the Roman Catholic and Dutch Reformed Churches. There are no villages of any size in this district without a school, a church, or a prayer house of one or other of these denominations. This makes the work more difficult here than it is in purely heathen villages. After our camp-meetings in July we shall do follow-up work again during the months of August and September. Unfortunately we are understaffed at the mission where we have only two teachers. We have gained a few Mohammedans this year of which there are great numbers in the near vicinity of the mission. One of these was the leader and teacher and the only one who could read the Koran and write Arabic. These people, when they do turn to Christianity, make real strong believers.

Our promised share of the 13th Sabbath overflow will supply a long-felt need, that of a church building. Some of our European neighbours have promised to attend the Sabbath services as soon as we have a building. The foundation is ready and waiting on the promised overflow. We shall we able to get a certain amount of donated labour from our believers. For the past year we have been reconstructing the layout of the mission and when our plans are completed we shall have a place which will be a credit to our work and which will compare favourably with the other missions in the district. An attractive and orderly-looking place helps to draw the people.

When the Government native school was closed down in Fort Jameson last term the students were advised to come here in spite of the fact that there is quite a good mission school right in the town and several much nearer than Mwami.

The last two Sundays we have had visits from the District Commissioners of two of the districts in which we are working, not official visits but friendly visits. Next Sunday we expect the Provincial Commissioner.

We are glad to have these gentlemen come, not only for our own sake but for the influence it has upon the native mind.

I have before me a letter from Elder Giddings of the Belgian Congo in which he states that a man who has been a teacher on one of our stations there is returning to his home about fifty miles from Mwami to become the chief of his village, and that this man is already planning on having a little church and school house in his village and is going to ask us to send him a teacher so that he himself can give his spare time to evangelistic work. (Alas, we cannot get workers to fill calls that have been coming in for the past two years.) We thank God for these earnest native believers. Lights are breaking forth in the darkness here and there and soon the "whole earth will be lighted with His glory." We work and pray with you that that day may be soon.

Inyazura Mission Camp-meeting

FIGURES show that in the five companies of believers in our area we have 424 names on the church books and 383 in classes preparing for baptism, making a total of 807. Our total Sabbath keepers would be shown better by the membership of the Sabbath schools which is 887

We counted 1,016 at our camp-meeting this year, and 137 people were baptised. The largest number of Europeans present at one time was thirty-seven, but thirty-three of these were present practically the entire time of the camp-meeting. We are glad to have this little European constituency.

The early morning workers' meetings were well attended. Besides the general preaching services which the Europeans attended, a special meeting for the Europeans was held every day at 10:00 A.M. This was especially enjoyed by the many of us who seldom have the privilege of such a service. The European children had their two special services each day contucted in a very interesting manner by Mrs. R. V. Gorle of Salisbury. Fathers' meetings, mothers' meetings, and children's meetings for the native believers were well attended.

Mwami Sending

HOEWEL ons nie iets buitengewoons het om mee te deel aangaande ons werk op Mwami nie, gaan die werk nogtans in alle opsigte vooruit. Gedurende Aprilmaand het ons twee pogings gehou, omtrent veertig myl van mekaar verwyder, en ons het twintig nuwe bekeerlinge gewin. Ons het ook etlike duisende traktate in die kaffertaal uitgegee wat seker vrugte in die toekoms sal afwerp. Vyf-en-sewentig persent van die bekeerlinge het gekom uit die Rooms-Katolieke en Nederduits Gereformeerde Kerke. In hierdie streek is daar in al die groter statte 'n kerk, of skool, of huis van gebed, van die een of ander van hierdie denominasies. Dit maak die werk hier moeiliker as in uitsluitlik heidense statte. Na ons kampdienste in Juliemaand, sal ons vir die volgende twee maande opvolgingswerk doen. Ongelukkig het ons nie voldoende werkkragte op hierdie stasie nie, ons het slegs twee onderwysers. Ons het hierdie jaar ook 'n paar bekeerlinge gemaak onder die Mohammedane, waarvan daar groot getalle naby die sending woon. Een van die bekeerlinge is 'n onderwyser en 'n leier - hy kan die Koran in die Arabiese taal lees. As hierdie mense Christene word dan is hulle baie getrou.

As ons ons deel van die Dertiende Sabbat Offerande ontvang, sal ons in 'n groot behoefte kan voorsien, n.l. 'n kerkgebou. Sommige van die witmense wat hier woon het belowe om die dienste by te woon net sodra as ons 'n kerkgebou het. Die fondament is al gegrawe; ons wag net op die geld. Hier op die stasie kan ons kosteloos hulp kry met die oprigting van die gebou. Vir die afgelope jaar al is ons besig om die gronde beter uit te lê, en as dit klaar is sal ons stasie goed afsteek by enige van die ander stasies in die distrik en tot eer van ons werk strek. As mens 'n mooi stasie het dan trek dit die mense.

Toe die Goewermentskool op Fort Jameson laas kwartaal gesluit was, het hulle die studente aangeraai om na ons toe te kom, ten spyte van die feit dat daar 'n goeie sendingskool in die dorp is, asook etlike ander skole nader as ons s'n op Mwami.

Die afgelope twee Sondae het ons besoeke gehad van die Distrik-kommissarisse uit die twee distrikte waar ons besig is—nie amptelike besoeke nie, maar vriendelike besoeke. Aanstaande Sondag verwag ons die Provinsiale kommissaris. Ons is bly dat hierdie here ons besoek, nie alleen om ons eie ontwil nie, maar veral om die invloed wat dit op die naturelle het.



Ek het Hom aangeroep met my mond, en lofgesang was onder my tong. As ek ongeregtigheid bedoel het in my hart, dan sou die Here nie gehoor het nie. Waarlik, God het gehoor; Hy het geluister na die stem van my gebed. Geloof sy God wat my gebed nie afgewys en sy goedertierenheid aan my nie onttrek het nie!"

Die Here sê, "Roep My aan in die dag van benoudheid: Ek sal jou uithelp en jy moet My eer." En nou wil ek lof en eer bring aan die God van Israel vir wat Hy gedoen het vir my en my liewe vrou.

Sy het vir meer as twee jaar gely aan haar rug. Na behoorlike ondersoek, het die dokter gesê dat daar 'n sweer aan die rug was en dat sy dadelik 'n operasie moes ondergaan. Toe die donker wolke oor ons begin opkom, het ons in geloof alles gelê aan die deurboorde voete van Hom wat magtig is om te help.

Aan die begin van 1934 is sy na die Nuwe Somerset Hospitaal. Ná verdere grondige ondersoek met die X-strale is die operasie gedoen op 20 Februarie. Daarna het die geneeshere my meegedeel dat my vrou beentering in haar rug het.

Ek sal nooit die liefde en innige medegevoel van die broeders en susters in daardie donker dae vergeet, en hoe hulle voor die genadetroon gepleit het nie. Op Sabbatmore, 24 Februarie, na die oggenddiens, het Leraar Staples ernstig gebid dat die Here my vrou moes spaar en genees indien dit Sv wil was. Die volgende dag het Leraar Robison haar gesalf ooreenkomstig die vyfde hoofstuk van Jakobus. Hoewel sy na die operasie vir 'n jaar op haar rug moes lê, was ons oortuig van haar volkome herstelling. En Goddank, ons het nie tevergeefs uitgesien na die Here en gewag op die God van ons heil nie, want onse God het ons verhoor. Nadat die dienskneg van die Here haar gesalf het, was my liewe vrou wonderlik vertroos en verseker dat sy weer sou opstaan.

Op 6 Maart 1935 is ons weer na die hospitaal waar sy nogeens onder die ligte moes kom. Maar hierdie keer het die X-strale openbaar dat sy volkome gesond was. Almal was verwonderd. O, prys die Here, Jesus van Nåsaret het haar genees!
