Consecration Day in the Johannesburg Sabbath School

THE Sabbath school is the medium of spiritual blessings and here it is that teachers come into a personal and spiritual contact with their pupils. Our superintendent, Mrs. A. E. Cameron, decided, therefore, to hold a consecration service in the Sabbath school on August 17.

A service such as this requires the full measure of God's Holy Spirit. A work of preparation had to be done. A month before, every teacher and officer was asked to offer up a prayer every day at eleven o'clock for that day.

Teachers' meetings on Sabbath mornings were well attended by the teachers who felt the responsibility of leading souls to Christ. Some weeks before, Pastor Staples, in the church service spoke on Consecration, and invited all present to attend the special Sabbath school service to be held later.

The day proved to be the coldest and windiest day Johannesburg had seen for years. Satan was working against us. In spite of this 177 were present that morning.

A welcome was given to all present, especially visitors, and then we rose to sing that hymn of trust "He Careth for You." Elder Ingle offered the opening prayer.

The lesson was of special significance. It dealt with that part of the Sermon on the Mount which emphasises the impossibility of serving two masters. An appeal was made to each individual to stand firmly for the one true Master.

As we again gathered together, a deep and holy silence was felt in the church broken only by the beautiful words of a song:

"Come unto Me all ye that sorrow and are heavy laden
And I will give you rest,
All ye that are hungry,
And I will feed you with the bread of life.
All ye that are thirsty,
And I will give you living waters."

The pastor spoke of the beautiful precepts which Jesus had given us in the Sermon on the Mount, and read from 2 Cor. 13:5, causing each one to think deeply upon his own life. "Examine yourselves whether ye be in the faith" he read. "Is your all in the faith or is there part of you that leans to the world?" he added.

A Message From a College Professor

As an educative influence in building into the lives of young people the distinctive ideals which we as a people hold most dear, there is perhaps no more potent influence than the *Review and Herald*. But somehow the missionary ideal planted then has always remained, and is no doubt responsible for my being in Africa today. Yes, there is much that might be said from personal experience.

I feel very sure that if all our people could be led to a regular reading of the *Review* that half our spiritual problems would solve themselves. The number of apostasies would be vastly reduced, and a new spirit of devotion to a great unfinished work would be born in the ranks of the remnant church.

The Christian world in Paul's day was small. It was necessary to write letters in order to communicate with all the Christians. Some One Wrote a Letter

Some loyal soul wrote a good letter about the zeal of the Roman church. Paul either received that letter or heard about it, and because he loved the church of God he in turn passed on the good news. Later, mention was made of it in the book of Romans; and this book has been sent all around the world and translated into nearly every language used by living men. That book of Romans was one of the church papers in Paul's day, and Paul was the writer. And what a blessing to the church it was and is!

But the zeal of the Roman church is not enough to know about. God has many loyal, faithful children in every church. The world ought to know about these. Some one ought to write a letter about the zeal and results of every successful Christian worker, and send it to some modern Paul who loves the church of God, and will publish this material, spreading the good news to others.

Good News in Our Church Paper

We must gather all this good news and print it. Where should we print all this good news? In a book? Perhaps, but print it first in our church paper. Some cannot afford to buy a book—at least all the books that are printed about the stirring things happening in the world. But we can afford to take our church paper at the low cost by the year. 

Na die klasse weer blykbaar gekom het, het daar 'n heilige stilte geheers, wat eindelik verbreek was deur die woorde van daar die mooi lied: „Come Unto Me.“

Die leraar het gepraat oor die geboorte van Jesus wat in die Bergpredikasie voorkom, „Onderzoek julle self of julle in die geloof is,“ het hy gesê.

Toe was daar aan almal geleentheid gegeve vir algemene toewyding aan God. Die volwassenes het getuig van hul verlange om hoë grond te bereik. Die Gees van die Here was kenlik teenwoordig. Die jongmense en sommige van die Juniors het getuig van hul begeertes en verlangens. Mens kon diestryd merk wat in die harte gevwoed het van die Juniors wat nie openlik vir die Here getuig het nie — hulle wou graag maar het nie die krag en moed gehad nie. Eindelik het die onderwysers die een na die ander opgestaan, en die Juniors wat hulleself graag aan die Here wou toewy, gevra om saam met hulle te staan. Hulle het dit sonder arseling gedoen. Daar was toe gebid dat God die toewyding sal aanneem, en almal Sy ewebeeld gelykvoermig sal maak.

In die primêre en kindertuin afdelings het almal hulleself eenparig toegewy. Dit was aandoenlik om die outjies van die kindertuin afdeling te sien. Mev. Staples het met hulle oor die hart gepraat. Sy het hulle 'n tekening van 'n hart gewys, met die deure wyd oop om Jesus binne te laat. Sy het toe aan elkeen gevra waarom hy of sy Jesus liefhet.

Daphne het gesê dat sy Jesus liefhet omdat hy goed is en ons help om goed te wees. Budjie het gesê dat hy Jesus liefhet omdat Jesus ons kos gee en ons sondes op Hom neem. Hy het besluit om die deur van sy hart oop te maak en Jesus in te laat. Een dogtertjie het gesê dat sy Jesus liefhet omdat Hy haar mammie help.

Ons voel seker dat die Here, toe Hy so op almal daardie Sabbatmore neergekyk het, gesê het: „En hulle sal My tot 'n eindom wees, sé die Here van die leerstake, op die dag wat Ek skep, en Ek sal met hulle medelye hê soos 'n man met sy seun wat hom dien, medelye het.“

Die Grootste Kampdiens wat nog Ooit Gehou was

SABBAT, 3 Augustus sal nooit vergeet word deur diegene wat die voorreg gehad het om die kampdienste op Rwankeri in noordelike Ruanda by te woon nie. Dit was die dag der dae in die geskiedenis van hierdie stasie. Ja, dit was 'n feesdag, 'n dag wat ons baie stof tot dankseggeling aan ons hemelse Vader gegee het.

By agtuur daardie Sabbathmore was daar alreeds baie mense vir die Sabbatskool wat stip om half tien sou begin. Na ontbyt het Leraar Evans en ek voor die sendingdirekteur he huis gestaan en gesien hoedat die mense van die berge en dale kom om die dienste van die dag by te woon. Deur die verkyker kon ons hulle uit alle rigtings sien kom. Hulle het letterlik by die honderde gekom, en in een groep moes daar oor die duisend gewees het. Dit was waarskyn 'n belangwekkende en aangrypende skouspel.

Broeder H. J. Moolman, wat in bevel van die stasie is terwyl Leraar Monnier in Europa op vakansie is, het alles uitstekend georganiseer. Gedurende die Sabbatskool het die mense in groepe, volgens hul distrikte bymekaargekom. Hierdie groepe was weer in klasse verdeel, onder toesig van die verskillende statskool-onderwysers. Op hierdie wyse kon die mense beter versorg word, en ook sekuur getel word. Toe ons die mense so op die sendingterrein gadegeslaan het — hulle was orals versprei — kon ons sien dat dit 'n ontsaglike menigte sou wees as hulle almal op een plek sou vergader vir die elfuur diens. Maar ons was nie gereed om te glo dat daar werklik soveel was toe ons die getal gehoor het nie. U kan self voorstel hoe verbaas ons was toe ons verneem het dat 17,261 die Sabbatskooldiens daardie more bygewoon het. As ek dit nie self met my eie oë aanskou het nie dan sou ek dit nie geglo het nie.

Na die Sabbatskool het die mense op die plek vergader wat voorberei was vir die algemene diens. Daar was nie 'n wanordelike toestroming soos mens sou verwag het nie — gladnie! Alles het ordelik toegegaan. Soos ek alreeds gesê het, het Broe-

der Moolman alles goed gereël en onder beheer gehad. Eers het die mense van die sendingstasie hul plek ingeneem voor die sprekersverhoog. Daarna was die ander in ses groot groepe, volgens hul distrikte verdeel, en een vir een het hulle hul aangewese plekke ingeneem. Op hierdie wyse was die hele skare op 'n ordelike manier gereger.

Wel, broders en sisters, dit is vir my moeilik om die skouspel vir u in woorde te skilder. Dit was, om die minste te sê, 'n indrukwekkende toneel om so 'n reuseskare voor die verhoog te sien. Ek twyfel gladnie daaraan dat Leraar Evans daardie more ten minste 18,000 mense toespreek het, want daar het nog baie bygekom wat laat was vir die telling by die Sabbatskool. Broeder Evans het gesê dat hy nog nooit in sy lewe voor so 'n groot mensekaar gestaan het — selfs nie by die laaste wêrldkonferensie nie. Ek glo dat daar in die geskiedenis van ons werk nog nooit so 'n groot byeenkoms was nie. Natuurlik moet u verstaan dat helfte van hierdie mense heidene is; maar dit bewys dat daar 'n groot ontwaking onder die heidene in die omtrek van hierdie sendingstasie is, en honderde van hulle stel groot belang in ons werk. Ons was bly om ook 'n aantal van die kapteins daar te sien, wat voorheen baie teen ons werk was. Sommige van hulle is baie vriendelik en wil graag hê dat ons skole in hul distrikte moet stig. Hierdie houding is 'n groot oorwinning vir die waarheid.

Hoewel al die dienste nie so groot was as die een op Sabbathmore nie, het daar deurgaans 'n baie goeie gees geheers, en ons voel dat die mense groot seën ontvang het by die dienste. Sondagmore het ons, na deeglike ondersoek, 145 siele gedoop. Met ons vertrek van die sendingstasie het ons ons harte in ernstige gebed tot God opgehef dat Hy Broeder en Suster Moolman, asook die naturelle arbeiders, ryklik sal sien met wysheid en geestelike insig sodat hulle mag weet hie om hierdie groot werk rondom Rwankeri te behartig.

Summer Training Camp

JANUARY 6 to 16, 1936

THE CAMP SITE

The site for the Summer Camp is on the banks of the Zwartkops River as it bends to the foot of the wooded hills overlooking the Zwartkops valley. It is about twelve miles from Port Elizabeth along the railway toward Uitenhage. The nearest railway station is Redhouse which is within two miles of the camp.

REQUIREMENTS

AGE.—Must not be younger than ten, nor older than fifteen.

HEALTH.—A trained nurse will be in attendance and on duty throughout the camp. No one with communicable disease will be admitted.

DISCIPLINE.—All must agree to unquestioning and prompt obedience to camp discipline, on pain of dismissal without refund of fees paid.

COST.—The fee for the ten days of the camp will be £1.15.0. This will cover meals, tent and equipment, and care. This will not include train fare and pocket money. Little or no pocket money is needed.

DEPOSIT.—A deposit of 10/- must accompany the application for attendance and the balance paid on registration at the camp.
