



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A Call to Prayer

We are nearing the end of the great conflict between good and evil. "Intensity is taking possession of every earthly element." There is "distress of nations, with perplexity."

In the midst of the last-day confusion and distress, God is sending a message of love and warning to the whole world. Thousands of souls in all parts of the world are being rescued from the hopelessness of atheism and unbelief. Multitudes are being delivered from the terrors of superstition and fear. Many mere formal Christians are finding in the message of Christ's righteousness a new power of victorious living. There has been such an ingathering of souls during these recent distressful years as we have never seen before.

The conflict between the forces of light and darkness is more intense as we near the end. Great issues are at stake. From without and within, Satan seeks to destroy the church or devitalize the message. Persecution is the lot of God's people in many places. Religious liberty is denied in many lands. Fanaticism and bigotry would snuff out the light of truth. Heretical teachings endeavour to confuse and destroy. Worldliness knocks for entrance to our churches and institutions. Self-sufficiency and sin seek to blind the eyes of the workers to their own great needs.

Responsible leaders, representatives of the churches from all parts of the world, are soon to meet in San Francisco for the forty-third session of the General Conference. Reports of our world work will be given. Plans and policies will be discussed. Leaders for our world work will be selected. If there ever was a time when the leaders needed to understand the times and know what Israel ought to do, it is now. If there ever was a time when we needed to humble our hearts, confess and put away our sins, that time is now. The church must have wisdom, courage, and power for its spiritual warfare; and this comes from God through the

operation of the Holy Spirit. Mighty miracles can be wrought and great victories achieved only through faith in Jesus, our divine Leader.

The General Conference Committee is constrained to send out this appeal to the delegates to the General Conference session, and to all our people, to pray earnestly for this great gathering. Let us seek the Lord with all our hearts. "The triumph of the church is very near, the reward to be bestowed is almost within our reach, and yet iniquity is found among those who claim to have the full blaze of heaven's light." Pride, self-esteem, love for the supremacy, vainglory, unholy ambition, murmuring, discontent, bitterness, evil-speaking, lying, deception, slandering, and every evil thing must be eliminated from the lives of those who would be used of God for the finishing of this sacred work.

"It is time we were more intense in our devotion. To us is committed the arduous, but happy, glorious work of revealing Christ to those who are in darkness. We are called to proclaim the special truths for this time. For all this, the outpouring of the Spirit is essential. We should pray for it. The Lord expects us to ask Him," "The whole heavenly treasure awaits our demand and reception."

Let us draw near to God and to each other in repentance and confession. Without God we are powerless to meet the great issues before us. With His blessing, mistakes will be avoided, right plans will be laid, and the proper leadership will be chosen to carry forward the work.

The crisis of the ages is upon the world and the church. The church must quicken its pace.

We earnestly appeal to our people to plead with God to be present in mighty power at the General Conference session, and to take control of all our hearts in order that light and power may be received for the speedy finishing of His work in the earth.

Three regular colporteurs are working with our larger books and over £100 worth of orders have been taken for literature and over £30 worth have been delivered in the Cape Peninsula during the last two months. Brother J. Donaldson, our assistant field missionary agent, is leading out in a strong way and we are looking forward to seeing a strong work developed in the Cape Field.

From the beginning of June our yearly Harvest Ingathering will begin. We all know that this is one of our most important campaigns and, therefore, I have every confidence that our people will rally to this work as one man, and that all will start on time and finish on time with a substantial overflow of the goal. Finding Joy in Service

THOUGH we serve one God, belong to the same church, and attend the same Sabbath school, our likes and dislikes differ. More Thoroughness and Faithfulness for 1936

ONE of the most cheering features of the Advent movement is the splendid way in which the offerings of God's people all around the globe keep pouring in. Even the poorest members are seeking to do their best for the Master for the finishing of His work. Indeed, the sacrifices that they are making are amazing and inspiring. Over the wash-tub, or out in the fields, working from dawn till dark, in fact from almost every vocation in life, our people are coming every Sabbath, never failing, bringing with willing hearts all they have to give. Sometimes we see a sister quietly placing her offering in the plate, while her eyes for a moment fill with tears. She alone knows the sacrifice it has cost. But we, looking on, can sense the wonderful love that burns within her heart, for the proclamation of God's saving message. Jesus, in the story of the widow's mite, has assured us that these gifts are exceedingly precious in His sight.

They are bringing their pennies, their threepences, their sixpences, and their shillings. The other day one sister, out of her meagre savings, brought to me £10. I know how much she stinted herself in order to make that gift for missions possible. I asked myself whether I was as faithful as she. Perhaps I had done my share in giving Sabbath school offerings, but had I been faithful in other ways? I thought of the Harvest Ingathering campaign. Sometimes in half an hour I had brought into the treasury an amount equal to the gifts of an entire church for a month. Had I done all that I could in this direction? I must confess that there were still a few business houses in my territory that I had failed to visit. I could have been just a little more painstaking and faithful. Mine, I am sure, is not an isolated case. Every worker, every layman can perhaps think of places where he or she could have done a little better, where perhaps a block of territory remained unworked. When I consider that half a guinea collected, represents the hard strivings of quite a group of our dear people in bringing their offerings on the Sabbath day, I begin to see the tremendous importance of the Harvest Ingathering Campaign, and I am constrained to pledge myself to greater thoroughness and faithfulness for 1936.

Let us remember that if faithful we can in a few weeks collect more than we are able to give for missions in an entire year.

Just let us pause for a moment and contemplate what it would mean if every member throughout the world were to do his share faithfully and thoroughly. It would mean that almost every home and every business house in all the world would receive a visit from a Seventh-day Adventist. Prejudices would be broken down, and light would pour into darkened hearts and homes. The Importance of Christian Education

"NOTHING is of greater importance than the education of our children and young people. The church should arouse, and manifest a deep interest in this work."—*"Counsels to Teachers," page 165.*

"By some education is placed next to religion, but true education is religion."—*"Counsels to Teachers," page 108.*

"The church is asleep, and does not realise the magnitude of the matter of educating the children to have the blessings and privileges of an education at our schools."—*"Counsels to Teachers," pages 43, 44.*

"There can be no more important work than the education of our youth."—*"Fundamentals of Christian Education," page 89.*

These few brief extracts from the Spirit of prophecy express in varied ways the supreme importance of Christian education.

It is a truism, yet often overlooked, that a man is what his education has made him. It is a plain case of not gathering figs of thistles.

Two families of children grow up side by side in the same church, the same general environment. In one family each child spends a number of years at our school, graduates and enters denominational work or becomes a strong pillar in a local church.

The parents in the other home are more interested in money making. They are not willing to sacrifice. The children never see our school. They eventually marry, and

settle down to spiritual lethargy. Some marry out of the truth. But why complete the picture. Is this a hypothetical case? No, it is an actual experience of personal knowledge and it represents many such experiences.

Those churches that maintain a well-patronised church school will hold from fifty to seventy-five per cent more of their young people.

Christian education is not a bothersome adjunct to the church. It is one of its chief pillars and it helps to stem the back door exodus that is a most distressing feature in many churches.

"To many who place their children in our schools, strong temptations will come, because they desire them to secure what the world regards as the most essential education. Those who regard as essential the knowledge to be gained along the line of worldly education are making a great mistake. . . . To those who feel that their children must have what the world calls the essential education, I would say, bring your children to the simplicity of the Word of God and they will be safe. Those who seek the education that the world esteems so highly are gradually led farther and farther from the principles of truth until they become educated worldlings."—*"Fundamentals of Christian Education,"* pages 535, 536.

These words present a picture that is altogether too common. It is a tragical picture because often the victim of the tragedy feels a great superiority of education.

Repeatedly we are bidden as teachers to prepare our students for the great storm that is coming upon the earth. Surely the time is not far distant when the ability to stand firm will be about the only thing that matters. Everything else will be less than nothing. Now as never before we need to evaluate things at their true worth and choose those things that really matter.

The work of God calls for a continuous supply of consecrated young people. Our own eternal future demands that we as young people be placed under the most favourable environment for the development of our spiritual life.

make more money by trading than he could by being either a teacher or preacher. So one fine day Jim left the mission to go out into the world and make money. He wandered as far as Mombassa on the coast, but he found that, while he had made some money, he also was getting lean in his soul. He did not know what to do about it, and it was then that he met Brother Bull of England, who is in charge of our missions in that part of the country. He advised Jim to finish school over there and then get into the work. Jim did, but could not make much success of his work there on account of tribal prejudice, so he was advised to return to Nyasaland. This he did, and went back to live with his wife in the Zomba area. There he began to preach the message. In the meantime I was at the Matandani Mission, and in charge of the Zomba area where Jim was working, but his doings were not known to any of us. Yolam, the colporteur at Matandani Mission complained that he could not sell books because the natives had no money. He said, "I walk about fifteen to twenty miles and get a man interested, and he buys the book. Then he says 'I have no money, but I will give you sixty pounds of beans for it.' So, Bwana, if I take the beans, I have to walk back to the mission with the sixty pounds of beans on my head, thus it takes me three days to sell one book worth 3/- How can I make my living that way?" I sent down to Malamulo for Ce Division, one of our best colporteurs, to come up and see what he could do in the matter. Division came and went out with Yolam to try the matter out thoroughly. They took £5 worth of books with them.

I did not hear from them for two months. They tried out the book selling near the mission and found Yolam's story to be true. He then said to Division, "Let us take the books back to the mission and tell Bwana about it." Division said, "I have never taken books back to the mission yet, and I am not going to start now. Let us go over to Zomba, it is only ninety miles away, we can sell the books there because that is the capital and there are many house boys and cooks for the white men over there." So over to Zomba they went. They sold their books, and then one man, who had bought a book a few days before, came to them and said, "There is a man by the name of Jim about twenty-five miles from here who is preaching the things written in this book, you ought to go there and see him." They went, and they stayed with Jim and helped him for five weeks. There was a great interest raised up in that district, and a little later Elder Nash and myself went there and baptised twenty-eight people as a result, and we have a congregation of about 800 people at the baptism. Still later, a request for schools was made, and I am happy to say that there were five schools either in operation, or were just beginning to operate when I left for

America on furlough in March, 1935. What has happened since then I do not know, but God is surely going before us to open the way to finish His work in the world.

The Underlying Principles of Tithe Paying

ONE of the fundamental principles governing all life and involving man's continuance in the family of God and thus his very existence, is his utter dependence on God and his unquestioning and glad acceptance of this principle. In order to impress mankind with this principle and keep ever before him a reminder that God is the source of all good things, and that the gold and silver are His, the earth and all that are therein, God placed in the garden, in man's first experience, the tree of the knowledge of good and evil. This tree was the mark of God's sovereignty and ownership and of man's dependence and stewardship. It was holy unto the Lord and was not in any way to be used by man in his own interest. It served as a test of man's obedience, faith and love. To use it was sin; a sin which brought about the downfall of the whole human race.

The sin of our first parents was more than that of disobedience and theft—it denied God's position as owner and ruler, proclaimed independence and entered into a form of rebellion which resulted in the separation of the race from the family of God and from eternal life.

In the plan for our redemption and reconciliation the principles underlying our right relationship to God have not been changed. God's ownership has now the double significance of creation and redemption. "Ye are not your own for ye are bought with a price." We do not have, today, the tree of knowledge, but to meet the changed conditions which sin has wrought, God has instituted the principle of tithe-paying. "Tithes and offerings for God are an acknowledgement of His claim on us by creation, and they are also an acknowledgement of His claim by redemption. . . . They are to keep ever before us the claim of redemption, the greatest of all claims, and the one that involves every other."—*"Testimonies," Vol. VI, page 479.*

The tenth part of all our increase signifies the same in our relation to God as did the tree to our first parents in the Garden of Eden. It belongs to God and, therefore, is holy and must not be used by us for our own purposes. "By faith-

The Missions Reading was given by a sister who had followed her Lord in baptism only a week previously and the needs of China were very clearly brought home to us. After the Review our classes separated to sheltered spots. The spirit of the Sabbath school was just the same, although our surroundings were so unusual. The children enjoyed their songs and story, and the adults, English and Afrikaans, were just as interested as if we had met in a church building — for were we not in the midst of beautiful nature, an evidence of the great Creator of all?

Our school closed with the hymn "Shall we Gather at the River?" and our minds went to that picture given in the Spirit of prophecy: "Here we saw the tree of life and the throne of God. Out of the throne came a pure river of water, and on either side of the river was the tree of life. . . . We tried to call up our greatest trials, but they looked so small compared with the far more exceeding and eternal weight of glory that surrounded us, that we could not speak them out and we cried out 'Alleluia! Heaven is cheap enough,' and we touched our glorious harps and made heaven's arches ring." — "Early Writings," page 17.

A Personal Letter

DEAR MRS. WRIGHT,

You will surely be surprised to receive a letter from such an address. Well, may I introduce myself as the worker having charge of our work presently in the Seychelles Islands. The reason of my writing this letter to you is to tell you how glad my wife and I were when we received a short visit of Elder Wright who was proceeding to the Far East on board the S. S. "Tasman" which visited our harbour on Sunday the 15th March. I need not tell you how happy we were and how some of the experiences which you (people) were having in your work in the Dark Continent, related by Brother Wright, cheered our hearts. We have been out here for the last six years. Our homeland is Mauritius. My wife and I are the only workers here, so when we meet with a brother, a worker or a leader in the work, our joy and happiness knows no boundary or limit. But neither Mr. Wright knew me nor did I know him; how then could it have been possible for us to meet and to recognise each other? Well, it was most providential.

On Sunday, March 15, I went to the Post Office to mail my letters. At the Stamp Window a gentleman was purchasing stamps. I noticed his letters were addressed to "Mrs. J. F. Wright." Well, I had heard about Mr. Wright and I knew he was the Southern African Division President. So I made up my mind that the gentleman surely must be related to Mrs. Wright in some way or other, were it not so he would not be writing to her. Well, my inquisitiveness pushed me to ask the following question of the gentleman at the wicket. "Do you know Mrs. Wright?" was my question. "Yes, I know Mrs. Wright" was the more or less abrupt reply. Mr. Wright did not know who the questioner was and did not pay much attention at first to the little Indian man who kept following him around looking at the letters he was getting ready to post. After that Mr. Wright left the window and proceeded to an adjoining porch of the Post Office. I followed him. There I said to him, "Will you excuse my curiosity, I would like you to tell me something about Mrs. Wright for I know she is a Seventh-day Adventist Missionary and if I ask you that, it is not by mere curiosity, it is because I am an Adventist worker myself." This bit of news naturally arrested your husband's interest and he looked at me and noticed my M.V. button. He then

replied, "I can see you are an Adventist worker" and he touched my M. V. button. He also added, "I am also an Adventist." Well, I said, I am very glad to know that, but may I know who you are? Just imagine what my surprise was when he finally broke out and said: "I am Elder J. F. Wright." At that point of the conversation my joy knew no boundary and I invited Brother Wright to our place.

Off we went and after a ten minute quick march we passed our church compound and reached our home on a small hill adjacent to the town of Victoria, the Capital of the Island. After the introduction to my wife was over, we had a short but very lively chat together. During the conversation Elder Wright was pleased to have a refreshment served to him. Can you imagine what kind of refreshment it was? Just guess for a minute—Well, I will tell you if you can't guess. It was a glass of coco-nut milk fresh and sweet, which Brother Wright enjoyed drinking, for he said, "I have never before drank this in my life." He further added, "When Brother Montgomery came to Africa he told us about this drink which he evidently had drunk when he visited you."

We were very sorry in view of the fact that Brother Wright could not stay with

Die Beginsels van Christelike Opvoeding

As die beginsels van ons skole nie afsonderlik is nie, en nadruk lê op die ontwikkeling van die karakter en ons jongmense voorberei vir die gebeurtenisse wat net voor ons is nie, dan kan ek geen grondige rede sien waarom ons ons die moeite en onkoste moet getroos om ons eie afsonderlike skole te hê nie.

Die belangrikste beginsel wat ons in aanmerking moet neem is dat die werk van opvoeding en die werk van verlossing een werk is. „Die werk van opvoeding en die verlossingswerk is een.”—„Education,” bls. 30.

Opvoeding sal 'n mislukking wees as die verstand nie die waarhede van goddelike openbaring kan vat en die hart nie die leer van die evangelie van Christus aanneem nie.”—„Counsels to Teachers,” bls. 12.

„Die vernaamste les in alle opvoeding is om die wil van God te ken en te verstaan.” „Great Controversy,” bls. 447.

As daar een ding meer as iets anders is

waarin ouers belangstel dan is dit die verhouding van hul seuns en dogters tot Christus. Ek mag aan ouers skryf omtrent die sukses van hul kind in die een of ander onderwerp; ek mag praat van die kind se populariteit en sy hulpvaardigheid in verband met die sosiale lewe by die skool, maar as ek die ouers nie verseker van geestelike vooruitgang nie, dan klink al die ander dinge hol. Ek mag verkeerd wees, maar ek sal dit waag om te sê dat negentig persent van die studente op Helderberg daarheen gestuur word nie omdat hulle matesis, tale of wetenskap beter kan leer as op Bloemfontein of Salisbury nie, maar sodat daardie bepaalde beginsels by hulle ingeboesem kan word wat in baie lewens die grootste verskil sal maak tussen die ewige dood en die ewige lewe.

Dit is omdat die ewige lewe op die spel is dat ons dit nie kan waag en selfs een van die beginsels van Christelike Opvoeding, soos in die Bybel en die Gees van profesie uiteengesit, in gevaar te bring nie.

Die ander beginsels wat net so belangrik is as die van sedelike en morele opvoeding, sal ons kortlik hieronder aanstip:

1. Die harmonieuze ontwikkeling van die liggamskragte en die verstandelike vermoeëns. Dit beteken die ontwikkeling van liggam en verstand in gelyke mate. Liggamlike ontwikkeling sluit in 'n deeglike kennis van fisiologiese en gesondheidswette, asook gereeldaeelike arbeid liewer as net blote vermaak.

2. 'n Kennis van praktiese werk soos: (a) Huishoudkunde en Kookkuns. (*Fundamentals of Christian Education*, page 160.)

(b) Kleremaak.

"Dis vir ons dogters nie so belangrik om die skilderkuns, kunswerk, musiek, matesis of retorika te leer as dit vir hulle is om te leer hoe om klere uit te knip, te maak en heel te maak nie, of hoe om voedsame, smaaklike kos te berei nie."—*Fundamentals of Christian Education*, bls. 74.

(c) Boekhou, houtwerk, landbou, tiksksrif en drukwerk word in die Gees van profesie genoem as van praktiese waarde.

3. Die voorrang van die Bybel in ons opvoedingswerk:

"Die Bybel moet beskou word as die allerbelangrikste teksboek."—*Fundamentals of Christian Education*, bls. 231.

"Die hoogste opvoeding word gevind in die Woord van die lewendie God."—*Fundamentals of Christian Education*, bls. 532.

"Die Bybel is doeltreffender vir 'n intellektuele opvoeding as al die ander boeke tesame."—*Education*, bls. 123.

Hierdie paar aanhalings, met nog talle van ander in die Gees van profesie beklemtoon die waarheid dat die Bybel ten grondslag lê van alle opvoeding.

Plaasruimte ontbreek om al die grondbeginsels van ons opvoedingswerk te noem. Ons het slegs 'n paar van die belangrikste genoem. Ons veiligheid hang af van getrouheid daaraan. In verband met ons skole lees ons: „Hulle sal heeltemal afson-

derlik wees, en volgens die peil van die Bybel bestuur word."

Daar is vandag verwarring in die opvoedkundige wêreld. Ons behoort bly te wees vir die duidelike leiding wat aan ons is 'n volk gegee is. Mag ons die moed hê om hierdie beginsels hoog te hou en die belangrikste dinge eerste te plaas.



Die Belangrikheid van Christelike Onderwys

„Niks is van groter belang as die opvoeding van ons kinders en jongmense nie. Die kerk moet wakker skrik en belang stel in hierdie werk."—*Counsels to Teachers*, bls. 165.

„Sommige plaas opvoeding langs godsdiens, maar ware opvoeding is godsdiens."—*Counsels to Teachers*, bls. 108.

„Die kerk is aan die slaap en besef nie die grootheid van die taak om die kinders te plaas waar hulle die seënninge en voorregte van 'n opvoeding in ons skole kan geniet nie."—*Counsels to Teachers*, bls. 43, 44.

„Daar is geen belangriker werk as die opvoeding van ons kinders nie."—*Fundamentals of Christian Education*, bls. 89.

Hierdie kort uittreksels uit die Gees van profesie lê nadruk op die belangrikheid van Christelike Onderwys.

Daar is 'n ware gesegde, maar een wat dikwels uit die oog verloor word, n.l., dat 'n man is wat sy opvoeding hom maak. Dit is 'n duidelike voorbeeld van die gesegde dat mens nie vye van distels pluk nie.

Twee gesinne word langsmekaar groot, in dieselfde kerk en onder dieselfde omstandighede. In die geval van die ene huisgesin bring elke kind 'n aantal jare in ons skool deur, hulle graduate almal en kry aanstellings in ons werk, of word pilare in hul plaaslike kerk.

Die ouers van die ander gesin stel meer belang in geld. Hulle is nie gewillig om op te offer nie. Die kinders sien ons skool nooit. Eindelik trou hulle en raak geestelik aan die slaap. Sommige trou met ongelowiges. Maar waarom sal ek verder uitwei. Is dit sommer 'n denkbeeldige geval? Nee, glad nie, dit is gevalle wat ek self beleef het, en wat dikwels voorkom.

Die kerke wat goedbygewonde kerk-skole het, sal van vyftig tot vyf-en-sewentig persent van hul jongmense behou.

Christelike onderwys is nie 'n lastige byvoegsel tot die kerk nie. Dis een van die vernaamste pilare en verhoed dat so baie dat die agterdeur uitglip—iets wat leed veroorsaak in vele kerke.

„Vele wat hul kinders na ons skole stuur, sal kwaai versoekings moet verduur omdat hulle verlang dat hulle kinders die opvoeding moet kry wat die wêreld as onontbeerlik beskou. Diegene wat 'n wêrelde-like opvoeding as onontbeerlik beskou maak 'n groot fout. . . . Aan diegene wat voel dat hul kinders die opvoeding moet kry wat die wêreld as onontbeerlik beskou wil

ek sê, bring u kinders na die eenvoud van die Woord van God, en hulle sal veilig wees. Diegene wat die opvoeding soek wat die wêreld so baie van dink, dwaal stadig al verder en verder af van die grondbeginnels van die waarheid totdat hulle later geleerde wêreldlinge word."—*Fundamentals of Christian Education*, bls. 535, 536.

Hierdie woorde skilder vir ons 'n prentjie wat maar te dikwels gesien word. Dit is 'n betreurenswaardige prentjie, want dikwels gaan die slagoffer gebuk onder die superioriteit van sy opvoeding.

Herhaaldelik word ons as onderwysers vermaan om ons studente voor te berei vir die groot storm wat op die aarde gaan losbrek. En die tyd is gewis nie meer ver nie wanneer die moed om pal te staan die enigste ding sal wees wat saak maak. Alle ander dinge sal dan nietig wees. Soos nooit tevore nie moet ons vandag sake reg waardeer en die dinge kies wat werklik saak maak.

Daar is in die werk van die Here gedurig openinge vir toegewyde jongmense. Ons eie ewige toekoms verg dit dat ons as jongmense in die beste omgewing geplaas moet word vir die ontwikkeling van ons geestelike lewe.

Hoe Jim Deur die Here Gebruik is

Die Here open werk in hierdie land op 'n wonderbaarlike manier deur die natuurlike self. Jim was 'n student in die Malamulo Sending Opleidingsinstelling. Hy was skrander en ons het gehoop dat hy 'n werker sou word, maar hy het wat ons noem die „geldsug“ gekry en besluit dat hy meer geld as handelaar kon maak as om onderwyser of predikant te word. Dertig halwe is Jim een mooi dag van die Sending af weg om te gaan geldmaak. Hy het tot by Mombassa aan die kus gegaan, maar het gevind dat hoewel hy geld gemaak het sy siel maer geword het. Hy het nie geweet wat om te doen nie. Daar het hy Broeder Bull van Engeland ontmoet, wat in bevel is van ons sendingwerk in daardie streek. Broeder Bull het Jim aangeraai om sy opvoeding te voltooi en dan in die werk te gaan. Jim het dit gedoen, maar het nie sukses in sy werk gehad nie weens die vooroordeel van die stamme aldaar, en hy was aangeraai om terug te keer na Niasaland. Hy het dit gedoen en met sy vrou in die Zomba distrik gaan woon. Hy het die boodskap daar begin preek. Ek was destyds op Matandani Sending, en Zomba, waar Jim werksaam

was, was onder my toesig, maar ons het niks van Jim se werkzaamhede geweet nie. Yolam, die kolporteur op Matandani het gekla dat hy geen boeke kon verkoop nie omdat die naturelle daar geen geld gehad het nie. Hy het gesê: „Ek loop van vyftien tot twintig myl om 'n boek te verkoop, en as die boek eindelik verkoop is sê die koper, „Ek het nie geld nie, maar ek sal u sesig pond boontjies gee.“ En dan moet ek terug loop na die sending met die sesig pond boontjies op my kop. Dit neem my dus drie dae om 'n boek van drie sielings te verkoop. Hoe kan ek op hierdie manier 'n bestaan maak?“ Ek het toe na Malamulo gestuur vir Ce Division, een van ons beste kolporteurs om te sien wat hy kon doen. Division het gekom, en hy en Yolam is daar weg met £5 se boeke.

Vir twee maande het ek niks van hulle gehoor nie. Hulle het probeer om die boeke naby die sendingstasie te verkoop en het gevind dat wat Yolam vertel het heeltemal waar was. Hy het toe aan Division gesê, „laat ons die boeke terugneem na die sending en die leraar alles daarvan vertel.“ Division het geantwoord, „Ek het nog nooit boeke teruggegee nie, en gaan dit ook nie nou doen nie. Laat ons na Zomba gaan, dit is maar net negentig myl hiervandaan, en laat ons die boeke daar verkoop; dit is die hoofstd en daar is baie naturelle wat vir die witmense werk.“ Hulle is daarop na Zomba en daar het hulle al die boeke verkoopt. Een van die kopers het aan hulle gesê: „daar is 'n man vyf-en-twintig myl hiervandaan, wat dieselfde boodskap verkondig wat in die boeke staan; julle behoort hom te gaan besoek.“ Hulle het gegaan en vyf weke by Jim gebly en hom gehelp. Daar was groot belangstelling in daardie distrik opgewek, en later het Leraar Nash en ek daar agt-en-twintig siele gedoop. Daar was omtrent 800 toeskouers by die doopdienst. Later het hulle gevra om skole, en ek is bly om te sê dat toe ek in 1935 op verlof na Amerika is, was daar vyf skole gestig. Wat later gebeur het weet ek nie, maar die Here maak gewis die weg voor ons oop sodat Sy werk in die wêreld volendig kan word.
