

ALLEN MABERLEY Brother Maberley had been conducting an evangelistic campaign in Kalimpong and although many were coming to the meetings and seemed interested no decisions were being made. He was told it was because of the influence of Ong Tshering Young, head man of Tannak "busty." Brother Maberley planned to win this man with God's help. On one of his visits the man told Brother Maberley the following strange dream and asked him to explain it. "I had a most strange dream last night and f can't get it out of my mind. In this dream I was climbing up a very steep path that wound away up into the snow above. The snow had a strange light shining on it as though someone was shining a huge lantern on it. Ahead of me on the path you also were climbing and looking back to see where I was. While you were looking back you came to a great hole in the path that way ou sing an buge lantern on it on the path that was finded with water and you suddenly fell in. I rushed up to see what had happened but for some time could not see anything. Then I saw you struggling far below in the water calling for help. I immediately jumped in to help you and aiter a struggle we both got out of the water safely and started up the path once more. Then I awoke. Tell me, what does this mean for I feel sure God has spoken to me?"

NOW, I am no seer and do not claim power to interpret dreams but there in that room I asked God to give an answer to this man. Then it became plain to me. The path, of course, was the narrow way that leads to the city of light beyond. I pointed out to him that God was showing him he was right in following the message we were giving him. "Now," I said. "we have come to this great hole in the road, a place of difficulty where I can go no further. For weeks I have been preaching to these people here to give their hearts to Jesus but no response has come. Now I need your help to get beyond this point in the road. And there is only one way. You must get down with me into the waters of baptism and when we come out we will see God's blessing on the work." He thought for a minute and then looking up said, "When can we have the baptism?" What a thrill to hear those words and to know that he really meant them!

When the time of baptism drew near I asked him where we could hold the baptism as we had no font there. "Leave that to me," he replied. "I want it in a place where all my neighbours can see the baptism. You just come here on Sab-

bath afternoon and all will be ready." We took him at his word and arrived down at the place a little before the time for the baptism. What a sight! A little mountain stream had been dammed up right in the middle of the huge paddy fields and sitting on terrace after terrace above the pool were all the people of that area. Hundreds of them were there and I found our brother had personally been to every home in the district inviting the people to come and see his "burial." Not one of them had ever seen a baptism before for although a number were professing Christians they had only been sprinkled. There were four others. besides Brother Young, from our work in the town who were ready for baptism that day. We will never forget it. Each gave his testimony before the baptism and it was thrilling to hear. Brother Young preached a sermon that would do credit to any minister. He spoke for half an hour and told the people what kind of man he had been. "Now," he said "this is all changed, for Jesus has called me to follow His way." Then with pleading voice he turned to that great throng and pleaded with them to follow Jesus.

We then entered the water and it was bitterly cold as these mountain streams always are. But when I went to baptize Brother Young he said, "Wait a minute, I want to sing a song." Then he began to sing in Nepali "I am coming to the cross." He had learnt all the verses and I joined in with him in the parts I remembered. "Now," I said, "let's have the baptism." "First," he said, "I want to speak to the people again." So while we stood in the freezing water, he preached another sermon. "Now I am ready," he said. Silence reigned over the vast throng as they saw the headman of their "busty" going down into the watery grave. Going up from the water our brother refused to get changed but said, "No, I must talk to the people before they

go away from here." And in his wet clothes he went from one to another, pleading with them to follow the Lord. The fruitage came two weeks ago when we had the privilege of baptizing four more in this same place and every one of these was fully instructed by Brother Young himself. But far bevond that is the tremendous influence his baptism has had on our work here. Truly from that day, we have gotten out of the "hole" and see the light ahead. In the past four years, we had baptized only thirteen Nepalis, every one won by hard work and much praver.

Every week our Mobile Clinic pushes out into the village areas and we are now treating around 800 per month. Some of our clinics have up to 200 people attending them. The problem was to find the time to give our health talks as well as the gospel talks. Again God provided for our needs. Brother Young again had a dream and this time he saw hundreds begging for medicine and as he looked closer he saw they were all blind. Then a voice said, "You can open their eyes." He immediately offered to assist us in our work and now you will find this faithful layman out with the clinic every week preaching to the people while we give medicines.

Our medical work is now on a self-supporting basis and we expect to see more progress in the near future.

RANCHI HOSPITAL MAKES STEADY PROGRESS

HAVE just filled in the Report I for the Seventh-day Adventist Statistical Summary, Sanitariums and Hospitals, for the year 1957, and found the report quite satisfying. Then I compared it with the previous years. The picture is one of steady progress. Let me support my statement by figures:

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We are grateful to God for the wonderful and steady progress the Ranchi Hospital is making. Here is another instance:

The report for 1953 has an interesting item which reads *Highest Cash Receipt for a Single Day* (since the beginning of the hospital.)—Rs. 461.00 on August 28, 1953. The cash receipt on December 8, 1957, was Rs. 1,113.75. According to our records the highest monthly income this hospital ever received w a s in December 1957 which was Rs. 13.198.48.

Much credit is due Dr. and Mrs. Buxton for the steady progress depicted here. Without progress in income, the progress in other statistical items would be meaningless. The financial position of this hospital is sound. The monthly average incomes for the past four years are as follows:

We have a group of good workers and with God's help we are endeavouring to fulfil the purpose for which this institution was established.

I do not want the reader to think that we have no problems. Our biggest problem is finding enough good nurses. Our staff has not increased in proportion to the increase in in-patients. Our second problem is finding more accommodation for our patients. Last year we built a six-unit family ward and we fixed the rents between Rs. 8.00 and Rs. 10.00 per day. These rooms remain occupied most of the time. We are, however, contemplating a new ward to accommodate about twenty-five private patients.

We are very grateful to the Division for assigning Dr. J. C. Johannes to the Ranchi Hospital and we know that under his guidance the steady progress will continue.

Doctor Johannes is not moneyminded. His instruction to those in the office is that we should not turn away any patient because the patient is poor, or because the doctor is too busy. And we have adhered to his instructions. Every time he speaks to the staff he exhorts them to be humble, kind, and courteous.

Please pray for this institution and the workers connected with it so that we may not fail to fulfil the purpose for which it was established.

WITCH DOCTOR JOINS REMNANT CHURCH

DEFORE he became a Christian Chutu Soren was a witch doctor and a leader in his community. He led out in all the heathen festivals and in spirit worship. Because he was an Ayurvedic Kaviry the people looked to him for help and counsel in all their sickness and trouble. Every day they came to him for treatment. Some of the people he treated got well. To get his medicine, the people invited him to their homes and gave him liquor to drink. Naturally he became a great drunkard. Not a single day passed when he was not drunk. When he came home he would beat his wife and children. So his case, as far as his ever becoming a Christian was concerned, looked hopeless. His uncle had been a Christian since Chutu was a young man, but Chutu hated Christianity and talked against it.

In 1954 we were holding some evangelistic meetings in Damdorpur. During the day time we visited the people in their homes, and invited them to our meetings. We also invited Chutu and he came to the meetings regularly. We were praying for him. He expressed his desire to become a Christian and began to come to the Sabbath

school. But he found it difficult to give up his drinking. We visited him in his home, gave him Bible studies and prayed with him. Some people then went to him and told him that as he was not yet baptized, he could continue his drinking. After baptism he could not drink alcohol. But we told him we could not baptize him unless he stopped. One day when we went to visit him, we found him drunk, "This is the last time you will find me drunk," he said. "The next time you find me drunk you are at liberty to cut off my ears." Several times after that we found him drunk, but of course, we did not carry out his word regarding his ears. But we realized how difficult it is for a man to be saved by his own power. We taught him to pray. We prayed with him and prayed for him. At last he fully surrendered to God, and by the power of the Spirit he stopped drinking.

We studied with him one year and he became a new man. He was baptized on June 11, 1955.

Now Chutu Soren is rejoicing in the truth, and his wife is the most happy woman in the world.

He has brought a headman, Gura Hansdak, and his family to the truth, and has created several interests in his village.

ASSAM CALLS

MUCH could be said about the progress of God's work in the states of Assam, Tripura, Manipur, Northeast Frontier Agency and the adjoining areas of this vast section. This is so because of the fact that many of the unentered sections of this field have been contacted and reached, either by preachers or through the Voice of Prophecy during recent years. It was through the Voice of Prophecy that we first gained an interest in the Garo Hills and established work there in 1954. During the past three years there has been an amazing increase of membership in this place.

At present full-scale efforts are being conducted in two different villages of this section. Brother Prem Nath Bazroy writes

of his effort at Dilma, one of the biggest villages in the Garo Hills. Brother Dapsingh Nongtdu told us that the meetings at Puntimary were coming along well and that many non-Christians were listening to the message. We pray that the Lord will abundantly bless his meetings in that place. From other parts of this field many calls came to us to send someone to teach them the way of salvation. We do "not have a worker to spare, nevertheless, Brother Bazroy plans to answer at least one such call when he closes his present effort.

Right here in this area, where our local headquarters is located, we are reaching out in an effort to bring souls to Christ. Recently an effort was planned and started at Sohrymkham village where we have an organized church. The effort was started by Brother Baxter Fanwar, one of the leading evangelists of this section, but after a few weeks he fell sick and couldn't proceed with the meetings. Seeing the need, Brother K. E. Tariang came to the rescue and carried on the meetings. Brother Janmiet Dkhar has started another effort at Mawryngkneng village, just at the middle gate from Shillong to the Assam Training School. The first night's meeting was very good and we are hoping for good results. We have a strong soul-saving programme for this section and Brother B. J. Williams, the acting president, is giving his full support and lead.

Brother Thangpuimanga has been working in Cachar district for some time and we now have a good interest there. This district had not been touched before by us. This is a new venture and the prospects are very bright. Brother C. Saikhumma is also busy organizing and making things ready for his effort at Damcherra in Tripura State. This is also a new place for us in which to work and we hope to have a church established there soon.

Our hearts were cheered when we heard recently from Pastor D. J. Donesky that eighteen souls were baptized and a new church was organized at Charroi-chakatlong, a village twenty-two miles out of Imphal. A few years ago no one in this village had heard about the Adventist message, but now, because of it, a marvellous change has taken place in the lives of the people there. There is now a group of clean, honest people and nobody eats swine's flesh. Brother Donesky also mentioned the many calls that were coming to him to teach this message to the people. Most of the calls go unanswered because we do not have workers to send. We wish we could answer the calls from the various places of this section. But we cannot do it without funds and personnel. Please continue to remember the work and workers of the Assam section in your prayers.

Recently the Union supplied us with a flour mill which was greatly needed and for which we are very thankful. The rice and the flour mills are a source of daily income. A paddy boiling unit is also being prepared.

On the whole the school is showing a fine, healthy growth and for this we thank God.



Brother S. Jesu Dass is another of our workers who has received all of his education in Seventh-day Adventist Schools.

His first appointment in the work was to the Kottawa school in Cevlon. where he served as science teacher until 1941 when he was selected as one of the students from the Southern Asia Division to go for further studies to the Philippine Union College at Manila.

Three months after he had enrolled there the Japanese army took possession of Manila and his four years of college were carried on under conditions of war. Even after receiving his B.A. degree in 1945 it was impossible for him to get back to India. So Brother Jesu Dass taught for about a year in the High School section of the college in Manila.

Since coming back to India in 1946 our Brother has taught in Lowry Memorial Training School, Kotarakara High School, and Raymond Memorial Training School. In the latter school he served as headmaster from 1951-1953 and as industrial manager for one year. Then in 1954 the Northeast India Union committee called Brother Jesu Dass to the Educational and MV departments of the Union in which capacity he serves at the present time.
