#### Opening and Dedication of New Hospital Wing

April 24, 1952 was a great day in the history of the medical work in Singapore when about 850 people attended the Opening and Dedication of the new wing of the Youngberg Memorial Hospital. The addition is a 2-story ferro-concrete building erected at a cost of \$425,000 or US\$140,000 contributed largely by business firms and friends in the Chinese, European, American and Indian communities in Singapore. About one-quarter of the cost money came from Hospital funds.

To understand the significance of this day one must know a little concerning the background of the new hospital. In May 1948 the hospital opened in a 2-story house purchased and renovated with funds from the overflow 13th Sabbath Offering, of December 1946. Although small, the building was adequate for a time with its 24 beds. However, an expansion program was entered upon after 2 years and a nurses' dormitory was built. Then plans were laid for a unit containing facilities for a new hospital.

Present at the opening were Mr. W. L. Blythe, Colonial Secretary, and his wife, and his address lauding the work done by mission institutions such as this, was well received. Among other speakers were Dr. Innocent, Medical Director, who gave the welcome speech, Pastor L. C. Wilcox, acting president of the Malayan Union Mission, who gave a history of the origin of the medical work and Pastor V T. Armstrong, president of the Far Eastern Division, who gave the dedicatory address. Pastor H. W. Peterson expressed gratitude to the donors, some of whom contributed as much as US\$7,500 to the building. Others who partook in this ceremony, were, Mr. P. L. Williams, treasurer of the Far Eastern Division, who offered the dedicatory prayer, the American Consul, the deputy Director of Medical Services and representatives from the various racial groups of the colony. At the conclusion of the speeches, the building contractor, following an ancient Indian custom, came forward with garlands of exotic tropical flowers for Mr. and Mrs. Blythe and Dr. Innocent and placed them around their shoulders as a token of esteem and respect. The Colonial Secretary then proceeded to the entrance and cut the silk ribbon stretched across it, with the words "To the glory of God and for the service of man, I declare this wing open." A tour of the new unit, which provides for 30 additional beds, brought the program to a close.

It may be of interest that approximately 100,000 out-patients have been treated in the four years of operation and about 2,000 in-patients have been admitted to our little 24-bed hospital.

The "Right Arm of the Message" is reaching out over the circle of the globe wherever our medical institutions are found. May they all truly be dedicated "to the glory of God and the service of

man," and lead many to the kingdom of Heaven.

#### Voice of Prophecy Correspondence School Rally

A very successful Voice of Prophecy student Rally was held in the Kuala Lumpur Seventh-day Adventist Church, Sabbath March 8, at 4 p.m. It came as a fitting climax to the Malay States Annual Meetings held March 4-7. Most of the delegates were still present, and did their part to make the program a success.

In the city of Kuala Lumpur and surrounding area, the English section alone has more than 600 graduates and students. Since there is no English pastor in Kuala Lumpur, very little has been done for these students in visiting them, and further instructing them in our message.

Letters were sent out to all students and graduates from our office in Singapore inviting them to meet at the Adventist Church at 4 p.m. A mimeographed progam was also enclosed with a red badge for graduates and a blue for students. They were asked to wear these badges, so we were able to tell who were graduates and who were students. Greeters and ushers were stationed at the gate leading to the church and welcomed the students on arriva'.

As the hour for the service approached, they began to arrive by auto, trishaws and bicy les. By far the largest number came by bicycle. One of our men counted 75 bicycles parked in orderly arrangement in the church yard. It was an interesting sight, and thrilled our workers and delegates. Since the Rally was held in a church many were doubtful as to the attendance. All the graduate students wearing the red badge were given a beautiful Voice of Prophecy pin in three colors—red, white and blue with the words in Chinese and English "Voice of Prophecy Graduate." It has a picture in the center depicting an open Bible.

Pohan, and a testimonial from Albert Tan telling what the Bible Course had meant to him were other features of the Rally. A charge to the graduates and highlights for 1952 were given by the writer. Mrs. V. T. Armstrong thrilled the

This is our day of opportunity. We need to pray the Lord of the harvest that He will send forth more laborers into the field.

#### Our Telugu Work in Malaya

Mrs. Rao and I are extremely happy for the privilege of spending a few weeks in Malaya in the interests of our Telugu believers. We landed in Penang on the 31st of March, where Pastor Phang, the President of the Malay States Mission, met us. After spending a day there visiting some of our Church members, Pastor Phang took us to Teluk Anson where we have an organized church comprised of about twenty-five baptized members. We spent a happy five days with our people there holding meetings, once in the morning and once again in the evening every day, using the rest of the day visiting our members in their homes and contacting members in the nearby estates. Our people responded very encouragingly to these revival meetings. Mrs. Rao spoke especially to the women about the cardinal points of our message, and they seemed to appreciate this.

From Teluk Anson we went over to Bagan Datoh; here we have a church building and about thirty-five baptized members. We spent a week here with our people. Due to the working hours of our people we could hold only one meeting a day for them, in the evening. Brother Rathnam, our local evangelist, and I would start about seven in the morning visiting our members, who are scattered, and get back to

Bagan Datch about four in the evening, just in time to get ready and go to the meeting. We had very good meetings with our people here. On the closing day the Lord was very near to us by His Spirit, and as opportunity was given, our members, one by one, got up, confessed their sins with tears in their eyes, and expressed their determination, by God's help, to stand firm to the truth until the end, come what may. May the Lord be with them and help them.

Our people love this truth and want to do what is right. A few members who had been slack in paying tithe have already begun paying a faithful tithe. Others who had neglected the Sabbath, have begun keeping the Sabbath again. The most important need is for qualified workers and for the outpouring of God's Holy Spirit. There are no doubt, other problems, but the future is as bright as the promises of God.

We are at present visiting our members in the Kuala Lumpur and Sungei Way areas. Our ambition is that the Lord will use us in reviving our dear people so that they may be ready to meet the Lord when He comes,

When we go back to India, we will have very pleasant memories to carry back with us. Our brethren and sisters in Malaya have indeed been good to us, and we have experienced the blessed fellowship of Christian love and Advent unity. We shall continue to pray for our work in Malaya and are confident that when the Lord comes there shall be a rich fruitage from this field.

#### Dedication Service

With the Bangkok Sanitarium and Hospital having been officially opened on March 18th, 1951, and its procedures thoroughly established, there remained only the formal dedication of this building to complete the original purpose in its construction.

This was done on April 1, at Bangkok in an interesting and impressive ceremony. The dedication address was given by Pastor C. C. Cleveland, who was at that time in Bangkok on his way to America for furlough. He said, in part:

"The Bangkok Sanitarium and Hospital has taken its place in the world-wide sisterhood of Seventh-day Adventist medical institutions. This sisterhood is comprised of 163 Sanitariums, clinics, and treatment rooms strategically located in many of the countries of the world. There are 376 medical doctors stationed in these institutions in addition to 8,206 employees. The total property value amounts to the equivalent of 500 million baht. Eleven of these sanitariums and hospitals are located in the territory of the Far Eastern Division, and five of these are in Thailand; three are in India, three in Pakistan and one in Burma.

As a whole, our buildings are filled to overflowing and still the people of the nations come for necessary treatment. More and more there is an urgent need for sanitariums, hospitals and clinics.

Have you ever stopped to wonder why there is so much sickness, suffering, and death in the world? Have you ever wondered why the great God of love has permitted these conditions to exist? It is a grotesque libel to suggest that a good God made a bad world. No! Sin, suffering and death are a result of a rebellion against the authority of the great God of the universe. A usurper, whom the Bible calls Satan, rose up out of his place to challenge the great God of love. He and his wicked followers were driven out of the heavenly courts above and limited in time and space to this world. Thus, this world became the stage of conflict between God and Satan.

God has given his created beings the power of choice. In the beginning of this world man was deceived by Satan, choosing to obey him rather than to obey God. As a result of this disobedience to God, man has suffered much at the hands of Satan. He has been buffeted by disease, by sickness, and by death. Here in Bangkok the Seventh-day Adventist Mission has erected this adequate fire-proof medical building. A competent staff of four American doctors and two American nurses are now in active charge of the medical training. Unnumbered thousands of the sick have been treated and healed of their diseases.

Prior to the erection of this building hundreds of donors contributed amounts, both large and small, to help meet the cost of the construction of this building. The Seventh-day Adventist Mission gratefully acknowledges this substantial aid and expresses its sincere appreciation to each one who has had a part in the contribution of fiunds. We also wish to express our gratitude to the government of Thailand for their cooperation and their recognition of our medical work, and for the honor they have bestowed on this occasion by the presence at this dedication of their Minister of the Interior.

Now, under the blessing of God, the good work of medical care may go forward. Skilled doctors, surgeons, and nursing care are here available for all classes of people. Here, sickness and suffering are mitigated. Here also may be learned lessons of eternal importance. Here may be witnessed healing and care in the spirit of the Master.

Today, we dedicate this building and this institution to the service of God. May it always reflect His spirit of love and devotion to those who are in need. We further dedicate all these facilities to the people of this great nation of Thailand. May it ever remain a symbol of good will between our countries and between us and God.
