#### NOTES FROM THE PACIFIC PRESS.

HESE are busy days at our office in Oakland. Four cylinder presses, besides the large perfecting press, are constantly at work on the Capital and Labor number of the Signs of the Times, and the whir of machinery can be heard from early morning till late at night. Running at the rate of 25,000 per day, it will take forty days to print 1,000,000

Extra hands have been employed 250.

Before the date of the Missionary Conventions November 21, 150,000 copies of the Sign's had been mailed from the office and only about half the orders filled at that date.

Orders are still coming in at the rate of from twenty-five to fifty thousand per day. The mails seem to be too slow, so now they come by wire. Here are a few ample :
