NORTH CAROLINA CONFERENCE PROCEEDINGS

THE eighth annual session of the North Carolina Conference of Seventh-day Adventists convened in connection with the camp-meeting held at Lexington, N. C., Aug. 13 to 23, 1908. Eight meetings were held. We had the privilege of having with us the president, secretary, and field missionary agent of the Southeastern Union Conference, and Elder B. G. Wilkinson and Brother I. A. Ford were present for a part of the time. These brethren took an active interest in the deliberations of the conference, giving words of instruction, counsel, and encouragement. Two new churches were received into the conference. All of the churches of white believers were represented excepting one, and others who had not yet become members, with our visiting brethren, were seated among the delegates.

Plans and resolutions indicating advancement were considered, as follows:—

Whereas, The manifest blessing of God has attended us during the past year, in his care over the work and workers and his providence for his people in general, therefore—

1. *Resolved*, That we hereby express our heartfelt gratitude for his mercies, and anew pledge to him our consecration of time, strength, and means for the united support of his cause.

Whereas, Our foreign mission work has, through the providence of God, assumed large proportions, and has become the leading work of the denomination, and—

Whereas, New fields are being rapidly opened for extended work, and necessary means beyond the power of our members to donate are immediately required to meet the demands, and—

Whereas, This denomination has fully borne the expenses of its foreign work for the past fifty years without giving the general public an opportunity to assist, and—

Whereas, Other denominations have been generously assisted in their foreign work by an appreciative public, therefore—

2. *Resolved*, That we approve of, and pledge our hearty co-operation in, the plan recommended by the General Conference for an In-

gathering for Foreign Mission Work, November 23-28, during Thanksgiving week, 1908.

Whereas, The Lord has gone before this people, opening doors in all nations, so that there is opportunity to teach the truths of the third angel's message to all the world, and—

Whereas, We believe that this message is to go to all the world in this generation, and—

Whereas, The funds received by the Mission Board are not sufficient to warrant the enlargement of our missionary operations as the opening providences of God seem to demand; therefore—

3. *Resolved*, (a) That we pledge ourselves to endeavor to greatly increase the donations to foreign missions; (b) That we undertake to raise for foreign mission work an amount equal to ten cents a week per capita for our church-membership; (c) That we assume the responsibility of collecting the above specified sum of money in our territory, and forwarding the same month by month to the Southeastern Union Conference treasury; (d) That a missionary secretary be appointed, whose work shall include the writing of articles for the papers, and corresponding with individuals and churches in helping to raise this large foreign mission donation; (e) That for the present we favor applying the Sabbath-school donations and the annual and midsummer offerings of each conference on the above fund, to make the average of ten cents a week for each church-member; (f) That in each church a person be elected by the church to be known as the missionary secretary, whose duty it shall be to take charge of the distribution and collection of the missionary envelopes, and to in every way encourage the church in systematic giving for foreign missions.

Whereas, The Scriptures teach that the tithe is reserved by the Lord for the gospel ministry, and—

Whereas, The union and local conferences in the United States recognize the importance of sharing their tithes with the mission fields of the world, and—

Whereas, It is evident from the tithes reported by different conferences that our funds for mission fields would be largely increased if a full tithe were paid by all the members in our conferences, therefore—

4. *Resolved*, That a special appeal be made to the officers of all the churches to give to this matter personal prayerful attention, until they are assured that every member is paying a true tithe to the cause.

5. *We recommend*, That every Seventh-day Adventist family in the conference be subscribers to the *Review and Herald* and *REPORT OF PROGRESS*, and—

Whereas, The *Watchman*, *Liberty*, and *Life and Health* contain the message that is to go to all the world in this generation,—

6. *We recommend*, That these periodicals not only be taken in our own homes, but that we make every reasonable effort possible to give them a wide circulation by soliciting subscriptions, by taking them in clubs, or by selling them in our towns and cities.

Whereas, The message is to go quickly to all the world, and the Testimonies tell us that the old-time tract and missionary work should be revived,—

7. *We recommend*, That our lay members be encouraged to take a more general interest in this line of work, and that our workers, as they visit the different churches and isolated members, do what they can to get them started.

Whereas, The schools at Graysville and at Huntsville, in connection with the Southern Publishing Association, have offered the scholarship plan, in order to assist worthy young people to secure an education that will better fit them for usefulness in the cause, therefore—

8. *Resolved*, That we urge our young people to avail themselves of this good offer, and ask our people to co-operate in this matter by rendering assistance in a practical way wherever possible.

Whereas, Following the counsel of the Lord to establish institutions in the South to disseminate heaven-sent truths on health reform, and in an effort to further this line of work the Union Conference management has established a sanitarium at Atlanta, Ga., therefore—

9. *Resolved*, That we extend to the Union Conference a pledge of hearty support, and encourage them to take immediate steps to liquidate the indebtedness incurred in this undertaking.

10. *We recommend*, That the Conference

Committee be authorized to solicit means for the establishment of an "emergency fund," which shall be used to meet all expenses which cannot be rightfully taken from the tithe, and—

Whereas, The canvasser should carry tracts, etc., to give to those who cannot purchase books, and—

Whereas, Emergencies sometimes arise which place our canvassers in positions of temporary embarrassment,—

11. *We recommend*, That 20 per cent. of the donations to the state emergency fund be set aside for the canvassing work.

Whereas, Our brethren of the California Conference have assumed the support of Elder M. H. Brown while he labors in this conference, therefore—

12. *Resolved*, That we extend to the afore-said conference our appreciation of this action, thankful to God for this help to this needy portion of the Master's vineyard, and further—

13. *Resolved*, That a copy of this resolution be forwarded to the officers of the California Conference.

Whereas, The Southeastern Union Conference now has a legal organization for the holding of conference property, therefore—

14. *Resolved*, That we ask the Southern Educational Company to transfer all North Carolina properties now held in trust for the North Carolina Conference, to the Southern Conference Association.

Whereas, The medical work is as the right arm of the message, therefore—

15. *We recommend*, The establishment of treatment rooms, hygienic restaurants, etc., in our large cities, and that we extend to self-supporting workers in these lines our hearty moral support, and further—

16. *We recommend*, That before inaugurating any such enterprise, or any self-supporting enterprise in the work of the closing message, such workers first secure the sanction and approval of the local and union conferences.

Whereas, God has spoken in no uncertain tones concerning the duty of parents to train their children in the truth of God, therefore—

17. *Resolved*, That we urge upon all our people the duty of establishing church schools for the primary work, and of supporting the approved higher schools established for the training of workers for the cause of Christ, and further—

18. *We recommend*, That an educational convention be held at such time and place as may be directed by the Conference Committee.

As was fitting, much time was spent in considering the plans for raising means for the extension of our missionary operations. Opportunity was given for those present to "take immediate steps" in the carrying out of Resolution 9, which resulted in raising \$305 for the Atlanta Sanitarium. Much enthusiasm was manifested in the educational work. Quite a number of our youth expressed their desire to attend our Training School to fit themselves for a place in the closing work, and others their willingness to assist those who needed help in obtaining an education. At the closing meeting, a resolution was passed to the effect that

the resolutions as given above be read in all our churches.

The report of the field missionary showed that on an average six canvassers have been in the field during the year, taking 3,788 orders, value, \$4,429.50; value of helps sold, \$581.90; value of deliveries, \$3,895.40. The Educational and Sabbath-school Secretary reported 18 Sabbath-schools, with a membership of 312; 9 day schools, with an enrolment of 139; and four Volunteer Societies, with a membership of 38.

Upon the presentation of the needs of the tent and camp-meeting work, \$100 was raised in cash and pledges.

Beach; Secretary Sabbath-school Department, Mrs. Alice Church; Secretary Medical Missionary Department, Albert Carey, M. D.; Secretary Religious Liberty Department, T. H. Jeys.

THE PINE GROVE INDUSTRIAL SCHOOL

THIS school is located one mile from Amory, Miss. It is now under the management of the Mississippi Conference, and is to be an intermediate school, teaching up to and including the ninth grade.

We want our boys and girls in the Mississippi Conference to attend this school this fall and winter, and if the adjoining conferences have any intermediate students that they want to send, we shall be glad to have them come, and we will do the best we can for them.

We are expecting Gentry Lowry and his wife of Tennessee to come and take charge of the school as teachers and managers. They are both graduates of the Graysville Training School, and will be able to do good work in this school.

The price of board, room, and tuition is \$10 per month, with one hour's work each day by each student. The students will be allowed from six to ten cents per hour for all work that they do over the one hour required of them by the school. We have plenty of work for boys and some work for girls. As far as possible, we require each student to pay \$5 cash each month, and they will be given the opportunity to work out the balance if they want to.

There is an opportunity now for several

able-bodied boys to work enough to pay all of their expenses. If there are some who are not able to pay the \$5 cash per month, this is a good chance for them, and we want to see them in the school this coming fall and winter. The school will open October 14. Those desiring to come, address Pine Grove Industrial School, Amory, Miss. W. S. LOWRY.
