#### **FLORIDA**

#### More about the Camp-meeting

THE following are some of the resolutions and proceedings of the fifteenth annual session of the Florida Conference, held in connection with the camp-meeting at Palatka, Oct. I-I2, 1908.

Whereas, The blessing of God has attended the work in our conference during the past year, giving success to the laborers, and at this meeting three new churches have been added, three new church buildings have during the year been erected, and three dedicated, and a long-felt need has been supplied in the starting of a sanitarium at Orlando, therefore—

I. Resolved, That we hereby express our heartfelt gratitude for his blessings, and pledge anew to him our consecration of time, strength, and means for the united support of this cause.

This resolution was heartily spoken to by Elder Westworth, emphasizing our duty to praise God for the many blessings our conference has received during the past year. Elder Parmele followed, enumerating a few of the many blessings; he also spoke of the sad fact that two of our young laborers have had to law down the armor because of failing health.

By a rising vote, and thanksgiving expressed in singing "Praise God from Whom All Blessings Flow," this resolution was passed.

Whereas, Our mission work has, through the providence of God, assumed large proportions, and has become the leading work of the denomination, and—

Whereas, New fields are being rapidly opened for extended work, and necessary means beyond the power of our members to donate are immediately required to meet the demands, and—

Whereas, This denomination has fully borne the expenses of its foreign work for the past fifty years without giving the general public an opportunity to assist, and—

Whereas, Other denominations have been generously assisted in their foreign work by an appreciative public, therefore—

2. Resolved, That we approve of, and pledge our hearty co-operation in, the plan recommended by the General Conference for an ingathering for foreign mission work, Nov. 23 - 28, during Thanksgiving week, 1908.

Whereas, The Lord has gone before his people, opening doors in all nations, so that there is opportunity to teach the truths of the third angel's message to all the world, and—

Whereas, We believe that this message is to go to all the world in this generation, and—

Whereas, The funds received by the Mission Board are not sufficient to warrant the enlargement of our missionary operations as the opening providences of God seem to demand, therefore—

3. Resolved, (a) That we pledge ourselves to endeavor to greatly increase the donations for foreign missions; (b) that we undertake to raise for foreign missionary work an amount equal to ten cents a week per capita for our church-membership; (c) that we assume the responsibility of collecting the above specified sum of money in our territory, and forward the same month by month to the Southeastern Union Conference Treasurer; (d) that a missionary secretary be appointed, whose duty shall include the writing of articles for the papers, and corresponding with individuals and churches and helping to raise this large foreign mission donation; (e) that for the present we favor applying the Sabbath-school donation and the annual and the midsummer offerings of each conference on the above fund, to make the average of ten cents a week for each member; (f) that in each church a person be elected by the church to be known as the missionary secretary, whose duty it shall be to take charge of the distribution and collection of the missionary envelopes, and to in every way encourage the church in systematic giving for foreign missions.

Whereas, A sanitarium property has been secured at Orlando, and it is to be opened for the reception of patients immediately at the close of this meeting, with a competent corps of physicians and nurses in attendance, therefore—

Be it resolved,-

I. That we approve of this enterprise, and ask our Conference Association to acquire an interest in the said institution by the purchase of capital stock in the newly incorporated Florida Sanitarium and Benevolent Association, with any funds that may be advised to be

available for that purpose by the Executive Committee of the Florida Conference.

- 2. That we request the Florida Conference Association to accept any stock that may be voted by the Florida Sanitarium and Benevolent Association.
- 3. That we pledge to the sanitarium our hearty support by—
- (a) Encouraging a patronage of the said institution, and by donations, and —
- (b) By donating our means to the Florida Conference Association for the purpose of securing for the Florida Conference Association shares of stock in the Florida Sanitarium and Benevolent Association.
- (c) And be it further resolved that we urge that all donations, from whatever source and of whatever kind, be credited to the Florida Conference Association at market value thereof.
- to. Resolved, That we earnestly recommend the establishment of treatment rooms for the colored at Jacksonville or other large center, where the blessings of hydrotherapy and other rational treatments may be administered to the sick of this people; believing that this branch of the work may be an entering wedge to open hearts to the saving truth of the third angel's message; and that the matter be taken up at the earliest moment commensurate with its important and urgent need.

Whereas, Following the counsel of the Lord to establish institutions in the South to disseminate heaven-sent truths on health reform, and in an effort to further this line of work, the Union Conference management has established a sanitarium at Atlanta, Ga.—

Resolved, That we extend to the Union Conference a pledge of hearty support, and encourage them to take immediate steps to liquidate the indebtedness incurred in this undertaking.

Various resolutions were passed in behalf of the *Review and Herald*, the *Watchman*, Report of Progress and other of our periodicals, as well as our school work and other phases of the work.

The reports of the department secretaries were all good, and showed progress in all lines

In cash and pledges there was raised during the meetings \$1,345.08. Of this \$353.50 was

contributed to missions in addition to the two Sabbath-school offerings, amounting to \$35.58; \$315 was given to the Atlanta Sanitarium, \$141 for local work, and \$500 in cash and pledges was raised with which to purchase five shares of stock in the Orlando Sanitarium for the Florida Conference. For services rendered by the conference, the stockholders voted to the conference one share of stock.

The following officers were unanimously elected to serve the ensuing year: President, R. W. Parmele; Executive Committee, R. W. Parmele, C. B. Stephenson, G. W. Dick, C. V. Achenbach, and H. A. Shreve; Secretary and Treasurer, Mrs. R. G. Stringer; State Canvassing Agent, C. V. Achenbach; Religious Liberty Secretary, C. P. Whitford; Secretary Educational and Missionary Volunteer Department, C. B. Stephenson; Sabbath-school and Missionary Secretary, Mrs. R. G. Stringer; Medical Secretary, L. E. Parmele, M. D.

The following persons were granted ministerial credentials: R. W. Parmele, L. H. Crisler, C. B. Stephenson, E. W. Webster, Page Shepard; honorary ministerial credentials to G. I. Butler, Irving Keck, and R. G. Stringer; ministerial licenses to J. Russel Mitchell, J. B. Case, W. H. Branson, C. V. Achenbach, and B. D. Gullett; missionary licenses to Mrs. R. G. Stringer, Dr. L. Mobley, Miss Ella Sanks, Mrs. C. Williams, Mrs. Lula Mumford, Mrs. Gracy Hunter, and Mrs. Mary Hicks.

#### TENNESSEE RIVER CONFERENCE

The Tennessee River Conference held its twenty-ninty annual session in connection with the camp-meeting at Memphis, Tenn., Oct. 2-10. Besides the regular conference laborers, we had with us Elders G. A. Irwin, G. B. Thompson, C. F. McVagh, S. B. Horton, and Brethren M. B. Van Kirk and A. F. Harrison. The talks by these brethren were much enjoyed by all. Elder Irwin's talks on the spirit of prophecy were timely and much appreciated.

About fifty delegates were present, every church in the conference being represented; there were also about the same number who were not delegates. Harmony and love prevailed throughout the entire meeting. All gave liberally as calls were made for the different funds. One church (Hustburg) was admitted to the sisterhood of churches.

Rowe, Educational Secretary; C. F. Parmele, Field Agent: J. S. Washburn, Religious Liberty Secretary: Bertha B. Lowry, Missionary Volunteer Secretary; Beulah Callicott. Sabbath-school Secretary. Executive Committee: W. R. Burrow, C. P.

Bollman, J. S. Washburn, Dr. George, L. A. Callicott, I. A. Ford, Thos. D. Rowe.

Due consideration was given the different departments of our work. Following are some of the resolutions adopted:—

- I. Resolved, That with grateful hearts we acknowledge the blessings of God upon our work in this conference during the past year, and that we renew our consecration to him, and pledge ourselves to faithfulness in his service during the coming year.
- 2. Whereas, Our foreign missionary work has, through the providence of God, assumed large proportions, and has become the leading work of the denomination, and—

Whereas, New fields are being rapidly opened for extended work, and necessary means to advance this work are immediately required to meet the demands, and—

Whereas, This denomination has fully borne the expenses of its foreign work for the past fifty years without giving the general public an opportunity to assist, and—

Whereas, Other denominations have been generously assisted in their foreign work by an appreciative public,—

Resolved, That we approve of, and pledge our hearty co-operation in, the plan recommended by the General Conference for an ingathering for foreign mission work, Nov. 23 - 28, during Thanksgiving week, 1908.

4. Whereas, The circulation of our tracts and periodicals has done much toward bringing people into the truth, and—

Whereas, Our literature should be circulated like the leaves of autumn; therefore—

Resolved, That we recommend each church to organize a tract and missionary society, and enter energetically into the work of circulating our small literature.

- 5. We recommend, That during the coming fall and winter conventions be held with our churches, where instruction shall be given in the duties of church officers, Sabbath-school officers, and general tract and missionary work. And further, that two or more churches unite where convenient.
- 6. We recommend, That a fund be raised by donations for the purpose of aiding worthy persons to enter the canvassing work, also to provide tracts for judicious distribution by the canvassers.
- 7. Resolvel, That a four weeks' course of instruction in our denominational books and book canvassing be held in connection with the Hazel Academy, by the state agent, at such time as may be arranged by the conference committee and the school faculty.
- 10. Whereas, Continued efforts are being made by the would-be National Reformers to secure such legislation as will abridge the rights of conscience; and—

Whereas, The time is just at hand in this country when the success of Sunday legislation before Congress is about to be consummated; therefore—

Resolved. That we encourage our people in this conference to adopt plans to enlighten the public in reference to the real issues at stake.—

(a) By becoming subscribers to Liberty, and securing subscriptions from others.

- (b) By supplying this journal to all the Congressmen from Tennessee, and all the members of the Legislature in Tennessee, and that the Cumberland Conference be asked to eo-operate with the Tennessee River Conference in providing for the expenses thereof.
- (c) By engaging regularly in the sale of the paper.
- (d) By giving the Religious Liberty Leaflets a wide circulation.
- (e) By using the public press as a means of disseminating the truth concerning these questions.
- (f) By encouraging our Young People's Societies to place in the hands of other young people's organizations papers and other literature of an educational character, dealing with the subject of religious liberty.
- II. Whereas, Life and Health may be sold— Ist, as an opening wedge for the message; 2nd, as a means of self-support; and 3rd, as a help in advertising our sanitariums, therefore we urge all our people to become subscribers, and to sell this good health journal.

I trust our churches throughout the conference will begin at once to put these resolutions in practice. I am sure that if we do faithfully the work here outlined, another year will show wonderful advancement throughout our conference, and we shall all be built up spiritually. Let us all pray earnestly that the coming year may be the best year this conference has ever experienced.

#### AMONG THE CHURCHES

November 6 to 8 I was at Terra Ceia and at Bradentown. The brethren report an interest to hear the message at both of these places, both among the colored and the white residents. They are planning to do something with the Missions number of the *Review*, and have ordered a supply for the Thanksgiving effort. If all pull together, brethren, success will crown our efforts in this undertaking.

At Tampa I found Brother Webster hard at work, though under difficulties, owing to the illness of Sister Webster. She is now on the road to recovery, and hopes soon to be able to resume her work for the Spanish-speaking people there. Elder Webster is enjoying the co-operation of the church, and we hope for success.

# Report of Progress

ELDER W. R. BURROW writes: "I am glad for the good visits that I have had among the churches the last few days. I think our people everywhere in our conference will be willing to do something to get out the special number of the *Review* during the Thanksgiving week."

The articles "Missionary Siftings" are designed to help the local missionary societies by providing a suitable program for their meetings. For want of space to give these articles entire, they are published in instalments. Those wishing to use them should preserve these instalments as they appear from week to week, until the article is finished.

The very first report of results of soliciting for Thanksgiving donations, reaching us from Cánada, revealed an average of about 14 cents per copy on papers used,—200: (\$27.70). The first report from the United States territory (Nebraska) gives an average of \$1.04 per copy. This average was made by a sister who was not able to leave home, so she solicited those who called on her. She could not wait until Thanksgiving, after she received the papers, so began as soon as they came to her.

We hope all of our people will be blessed with this spirit of service for missions, and that they will be as successful. If they are, over half a million dollars will be collected for the development of our needy missions, and a still better result will be witnessed in the encouragement of our people everywhere. The Lord's blessing is sure to accompany this Thanksgiving Ingathering. None can afford to be without a part in it.

#### AN EXPERIENCE WITH THE SCHOLAR-SHIP PLAN IN ALABAMA

At the close of school this year, Brethren Walter Nelson and Ray F. Thompson came to Alabama to canvass during vacation. They set their last delivery for October, and the following are the results of their summer's work:—

Brother Nelson, who wished to earn a scholarship for his brother as well as one for himself, did not stop when school opened, but continued to canvass up to the time of his delivery, canvassing in all six months. During this time he delivered \$733.90 worth of books. This made a profit for him of over \$61 per month.

Brother Thompson, who returned to school when it opened, canvassed only five months, and delivered \$483.35 worth, making a profit of over \$48 per month. As it only takes a delivery of about \$200 to earn a scholarship, these boys have much more than succeeded in getting one.

Many of our brethren do not enter the can-

vassing work because they fear they cannot earn a living. The writer is fully persuaded that some who are struggling hard on farms and elsewhere could do much better if they were to take up this work with right motives. The above figures show what two young men without previous experience, have done.

The institute will furnish an opportunity to prepare for effectual service in this grand work.
