# I WILL KEEP THEE FROM THE HOUR OF TEMPTATION

TEXT: "Because thou hast kept the word of my patience, I will also keep thee from the hour of temptation, which shall come upon all the world, to try them that dwell upon the earth."

These words are important and solemn, and it would be profitable to us should we take them home with us, and search the Scriptures in reference to their true meaning. The hour of temptation is to come upon all the world, to try them that dwell upon the earth; and although we do not wish to make a time of trouble for ourselves, nor do we wish to groan over trials in the future, still we should be so closely connected with God that we shall not fall under the temptation when it does come. "Who is among you that feareth the Lord, that obeyeth the voice of his servant, that walketh in darkness and hath no light? let him trust in the name of the Lord, and stay upon his God."

The Lord will raise up a standard for us against the enemy. We should believe that we have a helper in God, that we shall not be afraid; we shall not be filled with wonder and amazement, for we know that the God of Israel has been with his people from the very first—from the very infancy of this world God has been with his obedient children. His word is pledged that "there hath no temptation taken you but such as is com-

mon to man; but God is faithful, who will not suffer you to be tempted above that you are able; but will with the temptation also make a way to escape, that ye may be able to bear it."

We should be watching unto prayer. Just as surely as we do watch and pray, we shall know who is our helper. "Then shalt thou call, and the Lord shall answer; thou shalt cry, and he shall say, Here I am." He is ready to strengthen us; and may the Lord give you grace day by day, that you may be able to withstand the storm that is coming, for it will try your spiritual hope to the very uttermost. If your hope is in man you are lost; if in Jesus, who is the Rock of Ages, your salvation is sure. He has said, "Behold I send you forth as sheep in the midst of wolves: be ye therefore wise as serpents, and harmless as doves. But beware of men; for they will deliver you up to the councils," We ought to be thankful that these words are left on record. Every child of God that is brought into difficulty and trial because of his faithfulness to Jesus, may claim the promise, and will receive sufficient grace for every emergency.

We are only selfishly wise when we plan the future, and make resolutions and bring them in, and we ourselves arrange matters, as we think in all wisdom; for in so doing we are in danger of getting in the way of the Lord. Stand out of the way with your many resolutions, and when the time comes for God to bring his people into trying times to test and prove them, he will help them, and he will not fail nor be discouraged, but will be a present help in trouble.

We read in the Scriptures: "But beware of men; for they will deliver you up to the councils, and they will scourge you in their synagogues: and ye shall be brought before governors and kings for my sake, for a testimony against them and the Gentiles." Kings, governors, and councils are to have a knowledge of the truth through your testimony. This is the only way in which the testimony of light and truth can reach men of high authority. "But when they deliver you up, take no thought how or what ye shall speak; for it shall be given you in that

same hour what ye shall speak. For it is not ye that speak, but the Spirit of your Father which speaketh in you." Christ stood by the side of Luther, and by the side of all the Reformers whom he commissioned to go forth and make aggressive moves to advance the message of God in our world. He did not send them forth alone. Jesus has promised to be at our right hand. What a gracious promise is this, and it will be fulfilled; for he is faithful that hath promised. Jesus is yours, and all things in heaven and earth are his, and yours because you believe in him.

We should become acquainted with the Bible. We are required to become diligent Bible students, lest we be found adopting error for truth. We want the truth as it is in Jesus. If you are not acquainted with the words of Christ, if you have never tasted the power of his grace in trial, you cannot expect that the Holy Spirit will bring Christ's words to your remembrance. We are to serve God daily with our undivided affection, and then trust him.

We expect trials to come in these last days; we are not looking for anything else; but may God give us grace that we may endure the trials when they do come, and not faint under persecution. We do not desire to be in a position where we shall have no strength at that time. Then let us become acquainted with God now. Many are ignorant of God's grace and power and matchless love because they have allowed the enemy to do just what he designed to do—to intercept himself between them and their God.

There will be an effort made to unsettle the faith in every believer in present truth. Since Satan fell from heaven, he has been trampling under foot the Word of God, and putting something of his own devising in its place. His work has been accepted as the work of God. When the legislature frames laws which exalt the first day of the week, and put it in the place of the seventh day, the device of Satan will be perfected.

### Notes

KOREA'S CHILDREN. One of the games enjoyed most by the Korean boys is the stone fight, when they throw real stones. must hurt one another in this game very often. If they knew about Jesus they would not want to play so roughly. Both girls and boys have a great deal of fun with their kites. They mix ground glass with glue and put this on their kite strings. Then, when the kites are in the air, they try to cut each other's strings. These children are not very obedient. They are afraid of their fathers; but they say, "Mother is good, we are not afraid of her." When Jesus said, "Suffer little children to come unto me," he meant the boys and girls of Korea just as much as any oth-They must be told the story of his love, that they may give their hearts to him. Then they will be kind to one another and obedient to their parents.

WHY KOREA IS CALLED THE "HERMIT NA-TION." The natural situation of this country, and her attitude in the past toward other nations, are the principal reasons for calling her the Hermit Nation. An isolated peninsula, she seems to be naturally shut away from the rest of the world. Along the east coast is a chain of high mountains, and on the west side, while the land is more level, long ago the government purposely desolated the shores, so that no one would care to land. The Koreans, until late years, have had no use for the foreigner. Along the roads old signs still stand which read: "If you meet a foreigner, kill him; he who lets him go by is a traitor to his country." On the northern boundary these people devastated a strip of land to separate themselves from their neighbors. Originally this was about sixty miles wide, but it has been cultivated and inhabited in recent years. There was also a high wall along the northern border which has fallen in decay. All these barriers are being broken down, and Christianity is obtaining a sure foothold in the once Hermit Nation.

OUR WORK IN KOREA. It has been but a few years since the truth was first given to these people. One day in May, 1904, a Korean was walking in the street in Kobe, Japan. He noticed a sign over a door which was written partly in Chinese and partly in This was what the sign said: "Meeting Hall of the Seventh-day Adventist Church." As the Korean stood reading this sign, one of our brethren inside the hall beckoned to him to come in. He went, and became so interested that he came again and again, bringing a friend with him. The night before they sailed from Japan the study was on baptism. It lasted until midnight, and then, in response to their tearful requests, they were baptized by the light of paper lanterns. The next morning one of these men sailed for the Hawaiian Islands and the other for Korea. On his way home he taught the message to another Korean, and these two were our first workers in that field. It was not long before an urgent appeal for help came to Japan, and a native missionary was sent. Professor Field followed a little later, and during his visit baptized seventy-one persons and organized four churches. Now there are over five hundred Sabbath-keepers and between forty and fifty workers in Korea. They have a number of church schools also, and the boys and girls who attend them are learning of Jesus. Elder I. H. Evans has recenty visited this country.


