ANTICIPATING THE ADVENT

ON A RECENT trip to the West Coast of the United States I left the well-travelled Interstate highway and took what the map indicated to be a short cut. Within minutes I realized that the choice was a mistake. The primitive condition of the unfrequented road kept me so occupied that I even forgot to check the mileage to discover if I had saved any!

Tiresomely tortuous, the route proceeded interminably uphill, downhill, and around hairpin turns. Awesome sights occasionally greeted me as I peered anxiously down unprotected steep cliffs and surveyed beautiful valleys far below. Short cut or no, the trip took twice as long as if I had stayed on the main road.

Toward the end of my detour I passed through a desert community, plainly a ghost town. At the centre of this former mining area the State had placed a small sign giving a brief history of this place. Years ago gold had been found here and people had come in great numbers to mine the reef, hoping to get rich quickly. Some of them did.

But now, the deserted community's homes, restaurants, saloons, a school, several stores, and a church were empty and forlorn. High weeds added to the rundown appearance of the unpainted, neglected buildings.

While standing in the eerie silence of the place, I reflected on all the ambitions, joys and sorrows, hatred and affections of those who had once dwelt here. Now only the cemetery contained inhabitants and only the gravestones expressed the community's disappointed hopes. When the cost of mining the ore had exceeded the price the gold could command, the dispirited people had all moved elsewhere, leaving behind their shattered dreams.

Homes and businesses that had once consumed full attention became worthless. Willingly their owners abandoned them and went—I know not where. A simple event over which they had no control—the setting of the price of gold—had robbed their lives of meaning in this place.

From the abandoned, empty village my thoughts leaped ahead to a time when, according to Scripture, the entire world will become one vast ghost town. Though this may not appear

a very inspiring thought, surprisingly, when understood properly, it can be comforting, and even uplifting.

Global Ghost Town

The second advent of Jesus will reduce the earth to a global ghost town, for God will take the righteous to heaven while He renovates this earth. During the thousand-year period that follows, the earth will be one vast desolation.

Perhaps you do not relish the prospect of leaving your present home. Would you feel bad about abandoning it if you knew that God was going to give you one infinitely better? He has promised to do just that.

If only we could see our earthly houses and possessions in the light of eternity, how insignificant and transitory they would appear. God intends to replace them.

Someday we will leave our pitiful accumulations in which we now take such pride. Our well-furnished homes will then soon become dilapidated, sagging on their foundations; our fine motor-cars will soon become inoperable, and our bank accounts worthless.

Are you wondering what is coming, even uplifting about this? The

disciples wondered too. Christ described for them not what they would leave, but what He has prepared for them.

Jesus told them, "Let not your heart be troubled: ye believe in God, believe also in me. In my Father's house are many mansions: if it were not so, I would have told you. I go to prepare a place for you. And if I go and prepare a place for you, I will come again, and receive you unto myself; that where I am, there ye may be also" (John 14: 1-3). To His perplexed followers this was a precious promise, one which they never forgot.

Why should anyone worry about deserting a crumbling earthly home if he can lay claim to one of the Father's "many mansions"? While I am satisfied with my home here, it surely is no palace; it should not be difficult to leave it for the special place Jesus has prepared for me. That is what I shall do when Christ returns to earth!

But our Lord's return is not only to make possible the exchanging of our homes here for mansions in the skies. Christ's second advent will also reunite families. What a precious promise this is, made more meaningful in time of loss.

CEYLON'S POYA WEEK A PROBLEM

SEVENTH-DAY ADVENTISTS in Ceylon are having hard going, reports Lawton G. Lowe, president of the Ceylon Union Conference. But the church is growing in spite of it.

In January, 1966, the Ceylon government discarded the weekly cycle, which gave recognition to Sunday. In its place it substituted the Buddhist Poya Week, with a wandering holy day. The weekly holiday is determined by moon phases during the month and may occur any time during the week.

As a consequence, says Pastor Lowe, Seventh-day Adventists have found themselves observing their seventh-day Sabbath (Saturday) when the rest of the community has scheduled a regular workday. Jobs are hard to keep. Adventist students have had to miss classes on Saturdays when schools were open so that Buddhists could observe Poya day in the middle of the week.

Lowe reports that Catholic and Anglican churches have adjusted church services, to enable members to work on Sunday when that is a regular work day. "Seventh-day Adventists cannot readjust their Sabbath observance," he explains, "because the seventh-day sacredness has been assigned by God and not man."

The conference president reports a 30 per cent gain in Adventist membership in Ceylon in the past two years. "The Christian experience of our people has deepened," he observes.

Isaiah wrote, "Then the eyes of the blind shall be opened, and the ears of the deaf shall be unstopped. Then shall the lame man leap as an hart, and the tongue of the dumb sing." Isa. 35:5, 6.

5. Christ's second advent means the end of crushed and disappointed hopes.

6. All nature will reflect the peaceful harmony of God's universe. Nature, now seemingly at war with itself, characterized by violence, will become peacefully harmonious. In the

Editorial—

THIS PEOPLE SHALL DWELL ALONE

ONE OF OUR JOURNALS recently published a series of articles entitled "Other Sabbath-keeping Groups." While the data is interesting *as information*, it nevertheless contains a dangerous pitfall that we need to be on our guard against. The thing that is disturbing is that certain of these groups are *commended* because of the fact that they observe the Bible Sabbath, notwithstanding the fact that in some notable instances their systems of doctrine embrace many grave errors. The implication of thus *commending* teachers of false doctrine for the one solitary ray of light that they happen to hold, could be to *condone* the errors they teach. It could lead to an attitude something like this: "Oh, well, they keep the true Sabbath, so therefore they must be all right. The other things they teach that are wrong just can't be important!"


No greater mistake could possibly be made than this! They *are* important. It is not enough to merely be teaching truth on one particular point while misrepresenting it on other equally important issues. In order for a church to qualify as bearing the divine credentials, it must teach not only the truth, but the *whole* truth and *nothing but* the truth!

On every doctrine we hold we would be able to name some church that holds it in common with us. There are several bodies that, like us, practise baptism by immersion. Others hold the same view as we do on the state of the dead. There are one or two others that practise foot-washing. But in each instance that is where the similarity ends. There are a few bodies that have several similarities to us. But on other major points they differ from us. *What is of consequence is not our points of similarity but our points of dissimilarity.* This is what matters.

This may not sound like good public relations. It certainly is completely out of harmony with the current religious climate which tends to gloss over "differences" and emphasize "points of agreement." But it is nevertheless an observation which is vital if we wish to stand through the last great delusion, which will be so sinister that it will sweep many Seventh-day Adventists off their feet! Satan has been conditioning men's minds for this final showdown for a long time. And *one of his most cunning devices has been to mix truth and error in religious systems and then make the error look harmless because it is linked with elements of truth!*

In no area is this more pertinent than that which relates to *eschatology*, the study of last-day events. Many denominations today teach the doctrine of the second advent. But *what* they teach concerning it is completely at variance with what Christ, His apostles and all the New Testament writers had to say on the subject. One of the Sabbath-keeping bodies mentioned in the articles referred to, is foremost in teaching the millennial reign of Christ on earth. We contend that all those who thus teach are simply aiding Satan in preparing the minds of millions for the coming of the deceiver who will attest to his claim to be Christ by the performance of breathtakingly remarkable miracles. On every hand the cry will ring forth, "Indeed, this is Christ returned to earth, in fulfilment of His own promise!" Those whose hearts and minds have not been fortified with the truth concerning the manner of Christ's coming will be caught up in the web of deception along with all the rest.

We need constantly to remind ourselves that as Seventh-day Adventists we are not just one denomination among many. We are not merely Sabbath-keeping Methodists or foot-washing Baptists. We are a people who hold a system of truth for this hour, every doctrine of which interlocks with every other to give a complete and unified picture of total truth. An ancient prophet declared concerning God's called-out bearers of truth, "Lo, the people shall dwell alone, and shall not be reckoned among the nations." Numbers 23:9.

medical book but Brother Wood has made a habit of always selling a religious book with a medical book, and finally had the two books sold.

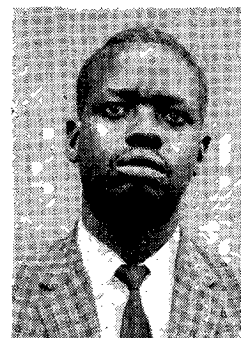
"Well, I will read this Bible book," said Jimmy, "to prove that you Seventh-day Adventists are wrong."

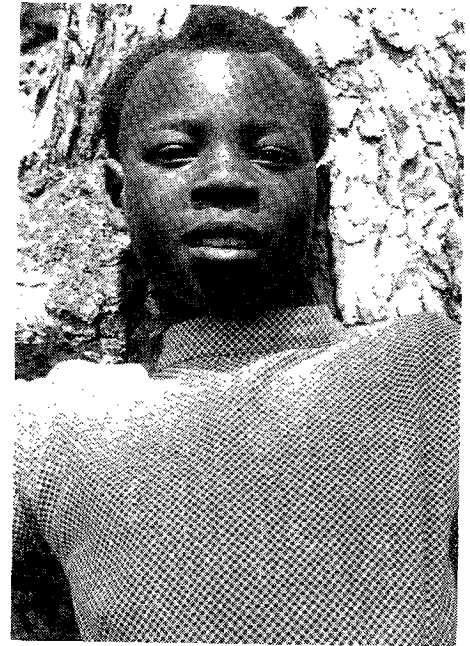


PASTOR H. ASIEL RUHAYA is secretary-treasurer of the East Congo Field. Born into a Christian home, he received his primary and secondary education at Gitwe Seminary in Rwanda and commenced teaching at the age of 17. After teaching in several schools, including his home school at Kanyinya, he joined the staff of Gitwe Seminary where he held the positions of teacher, book-keeper and later head teacher, until he was selected to attend Solusi College for further training. Upon leaving Solusi with a Commercial Course certificate he accepted his present post in the East Congo. 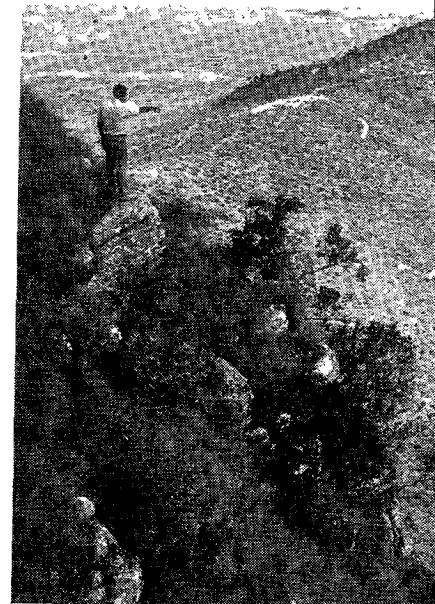

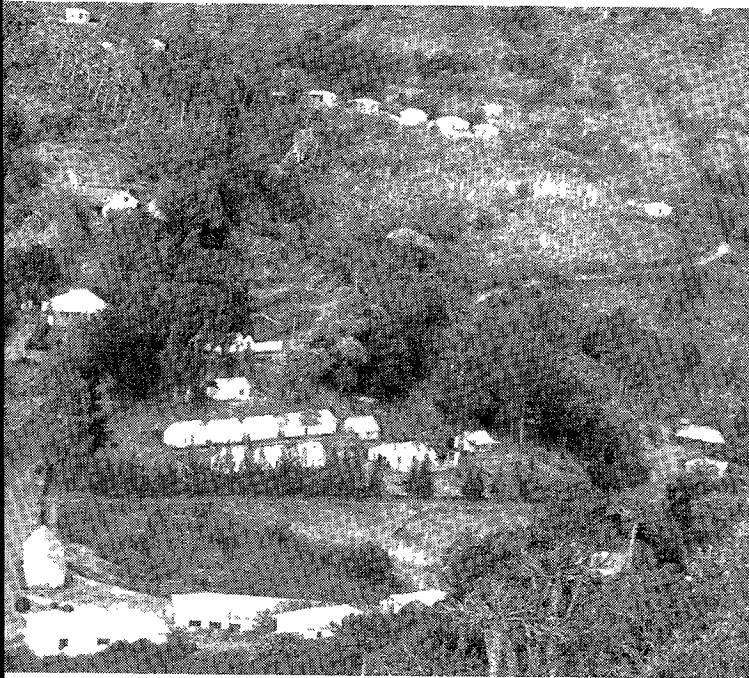
A Watutsi maid with typical hair-do.

Watutsi matrons, true mothers in Israel, cling to traditional robes and headbands though customs are changing for the younger generation.



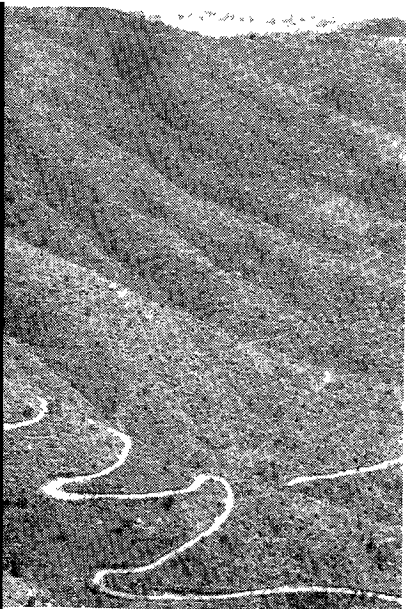
Camp-meetings in the Congo and Tanzania

The road to Suji mission in Tanzania winds steeply over a 4,000 foot mountain spine.



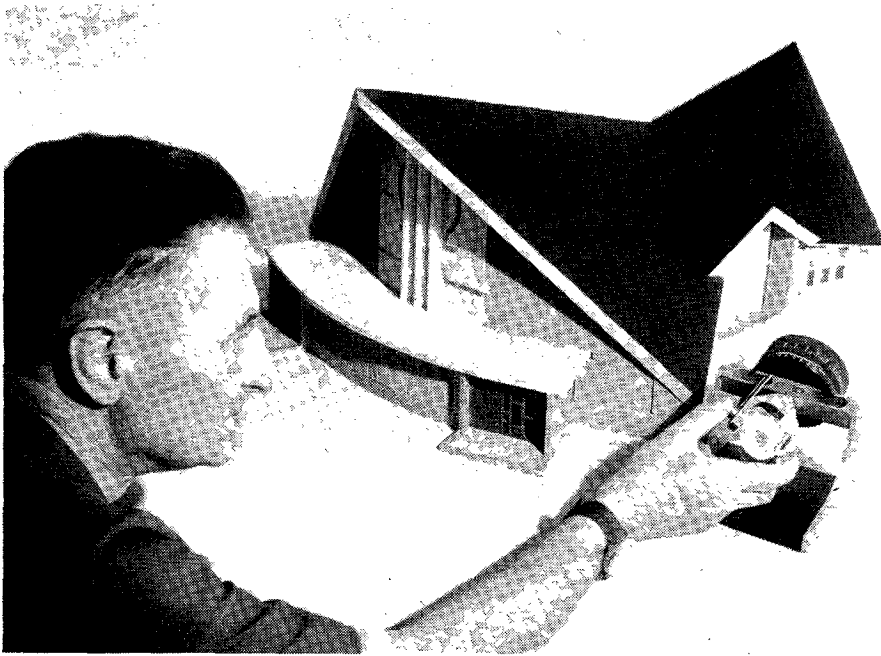

Are Church Buildings Always Properly Planned? (Abridged)

[Recently we received a very fine treatise on the subject of church building, prepared by J. F. van Straaten and T. M. Ferreira. Since this article covers this subject in some detail we have not been able to print it in its entirety, but should any church leaders or workers wish to have copies of the full article, kindly write to the editor and make your wishes known. Aspects dealt with are: ventilation and thermal performance, sunshielding, ceiling insulation, wall finishes, lighting, acoustics, foundations, water penetration, et cetera. Mr van Straaten is from the Environmental Engineering Division, National Building Research Institute, and Mr Ferreira is from the Acoustics Division of the National Physical Research Laboratory, both departments of the South African Council for Scientific and Industrial Research. Both writers are fully qualified to deal with a subject of this nature and their treatise is exceptionally informative and constructive.—Ed.]

This article, prepared for the guidance of both the congregation and the architect, stresses the functional design of church buildings—an aspect that is all too often neglected—and points out that designing is not only an art but also a science.

LARGE AMOUNTS of money are spent annually on the erection of church buildings. Careful consideration is usually given to the appearance and size, while precisely those aspects that eventually determine how well the building will fulfil its functional purpose, when measured in terms of comfort and performance, are neglected. If, through bad design, members of the congregation are uncomfortably seated, feel too hot or too cold, or cannot see and hear the preacher properly, and if the quality of the music is not high, they find it increasingly difficult to keep their attention from wandering.

It must be strongly emphasized that *acceptable thermal conditions, good ventilation, lighting and acoustics are always possible*—often at little or no extra cost—provided attention is given to these factors in the initial planning stage and not after the building has been completed. Even if the initial costs for a better building are higher, the higher figure may be more realistic than the lower one for a poorly designed and less functional building. Much more is involved than purely materialistic considerations.

The saying that prevention is better than cure is particularly true when it comes to the functional design of church buildings. It is there-

fore believed that a church council should attempt to achieve the most desirable solution at the design stage and for this reason the functional and other aspects of the design must be carefully considered and studied if the desired requirements are to be met.

FINE BUILDING PROGRESS AT MWAMI

DURING 1969 several worth-while building projects were undertaken and completed at Mwami Hospital, Zambia. The first of these was the new doctor's house where the medical superintendent, Dr Harold Frank and his family now reside. Next was the Arts and Crafts classroom at the leprosarium. This 20'x40' structure is now completely equipped with facilities for some very meaningful classes for the handicapped. This area is vital to the TALRES program. Mrs Hartikinen of Finland, who resides in Lusaka, has been very kind in donating her time to getting this program under way. She visits Mwami each month when Dr Ray Foster flies in.

Another useful facility is the new mortuary, complete with slab and sink. The former mortuary was an extension of the medical stores room.

Yet another most useful edifice completed in 1969 is the new recreation and assembly building. This facility has been named the E. G. Marcus Hall in honour of Dr Marcus, the founder of Mwami Mission Hospital, who established this institution in 1927. It has 2,000 square feet of floor space and will seat 200 easily. The entire staff and student body can now come together under one roof for secular activities.

Last but not least is the new engine room, complete with two 50 KVA diesel generators. When a synchronizing panel is used this plant is capable of producing 100 KVA. If Mwami should be connected with commercial power in the future these units will serve as adequate standby power for many years to come.

These projects, with the exception of the new doctor's house, were designed and built under the supervision of Brother L. B. Denny. He is also farm manager and maintenance superintendent as well as a teacher in the leprosy rehabilitation program.

BROADCAST PIONEER RECEIVES PASTOR'S MANUAL

FORTY years ago H. M. S. Richards began his work as a radio broadcaster. Within a few years this local pastor became the inspiration for broadcasters not only in North America but around the world. His kindly encouragement led overseas countries to commence with their own programs.

For the pastor, too, he had words of help. Though the Voice of Prophecy now has a coverage of more than 1,700 programs each week, Pastor Richards has always sought to have the local pastor involve himself in broadcasting.

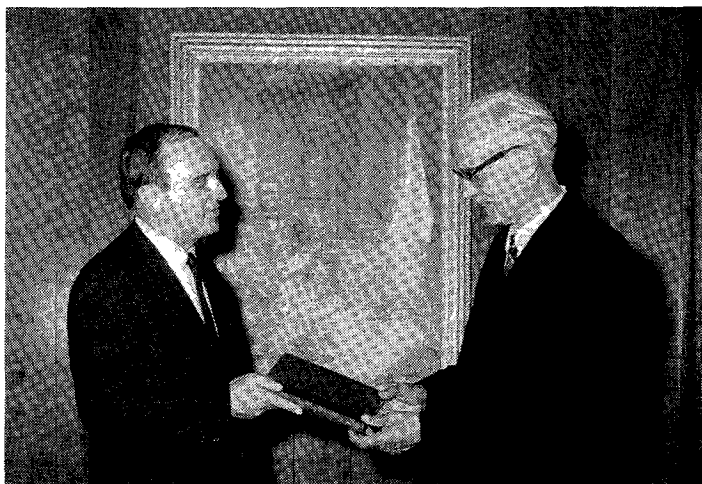
When the General Conference Radio/Television Department asked J. Orville Iversen to write a manual on broadcasting for the local pastor, it was only natural that it should be dedicated to H. M. S. Richards. As Pastor Iversen said so succinctly, "Who else?"

The manual, *So You're Going on the Air*, printed by the Review and Herald, seeks to take the pastor step

by step from the first nervous beginnings to successful broadcasting. Included are the actual scripts of a number of our most successful programs.

Pastor Richards commented on the book as follows: "This book was needed. 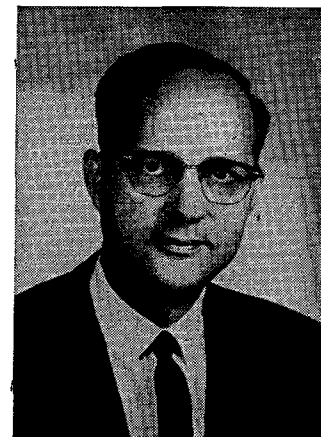

HOW DO YOU THINK?

PART I

THE INCREASING PERPLEXITIES, uncertainties, fears and moral depravity of modern life are making a devastating impact upon our civilization. It is disquieting to observe a marked increase of neurotics, psychotics, psychopaths, and other types of malcontents. In fact, it is asserted by medical science today that from 75 to 90 per cent of those requiring medical attention are suffering in one form or another from mental disorders. As a result, mental institutions are overflowing. Drug companies are doing a flourishing business. Physicians, psychologists and psycho-analysts are overworked.

The rapid mental deterioration and breakdown of our contemporary society is both tragic and alarming. Until recently, physical disease occupied much of the attention of the physician and medical scientist. Research has unmasked mental illness as a giant and ruthless enemy which stalks the land as a deadly killer. The uncomplimentary epithet "disease of the head" is no longer considered a fancy of the imagination, as it was a few generations ago. In fact, it is now recognized that many diseases which afflict mankind are due to mental stress and emotional turmoil. Hence a new term, psychosomatic, has been coined. It has to do with the ability of the mind (Greek, *psyche*) to produce various disorders in the body (Greek, *soma*), resulting in physical pain, suffering and disease.

It is now common knowledge that the state of one's emotions and mental attitudes are to a large extent the determining factor in having either a sound or a diseased body. Fatigue, debilitation, stiff neck, headache, vomiting, abdominal pains are more often than not the result of stress, strain or an emotional upset. If the causative factor of such a situation is not remedied, and the body is subjected to long and frequent mental strain, irreparable physical damage will ensue,

resulting in organic disease and death.

The delicate and intricate relationship between mind and body cannot be over-emphasized. If the emotions are not brought under control and a healthy, happy attitude of mind maintained, physical deterioration is inevitable. For this reason, one cannot afford to allow the negative emotions, such as fear, anxiety, hate, revenge, bitterness, guilt, melancholy, envy and jealousy to dominate the life. Nor must we have an unforgiving spirit towards those who have wronged us. These are symptoms of a distraught and disordered mind which will not only wreck the personality but will cause one to be miserable and mean, and will lower one's physical vitality, subjecting the body to illness.

Peace of mind is a prerequisite to good health. You see, the mind regulates the emotional centre which influences major changes in the body by means of certain mechanisms, such as the change of the flow of blood to any organ, which affects the secretions of certain glands by changing the tensions of muscles. For instance, embarrassment causes blood to rush to the face and neck. Anxiety and fear sometimes cause one to turn pale because of a restriction of the flow of blood. Nervousness and tension can lead to a dryness of the mouth and parched lips, all because of a change of the flow of blood or secretions of certain glands of the body which are triggered by the emotional centre. Secretions from the adrenalin, thyroid and other glands are known to release certain poisons into the blood stream which often can be detrimental and fatal because of the influence of negative emotions. Medical research has proved that secretions in abnormal and substantial amounts as a result of mental distress can be the cause of high blood pressure, arteriosclerosis, arthritis, headaches, hives, obesity, ulcers, asthma, diabetes, heart attacks, and a host of other diseases.

Scientists have only recently made these discoveries, whereas the Holy Scriptures long ago revealed this truth. It should come as no new discovery to the Christian, for we read that "a merry heart doeth good like a medicine." This clearly reveals that one's emotional state can have either a destructive or constructive effect upon the life. It is not what we eat alone which is imperative to good health. Wholesome attitudes and thoughts are equally important if we would enjoy a sound and healthy body.

Long before medical science began emphasizing this phase of healthful living the servant of the Lord said: "The condition of the mind affects the health to a far greater degree than many realize. Many of the diseases from which men suffer are the result of mental depression. Grief, anxiety, discontent, remorse, guilt, distrust, all tend to break down the life forces and to invite decay and death. Disease is sometimes produced, and is often greatly aggravated by the imagination."—*The Ministry of Healing*, page 241.

From this statement it becomes very evident that a regime of healthful living demands that we give an equal amount of attention to the care of the mind as to the body.

Reader of mine, determine now that with the power of Christ your mind will be subjected to the control of His Spirit, so that the negative forces and carnal emotions of the natural man will be brought into subjection. "Then shall thy light break forth as the morning, and thine health shall spring forth speedily." Isa. 58:8.
