#### ATLANTIC AND WIOTA.

THE meetings at Atlantic were not a great success in regard to the number of new believers, but we believe much good was done. We began services Friday evening, July 22, and believe that God has some honest souls here. The tent is pitched in the schoolhouse yard, and is well protected. It is necessary for Eld. Olsen to be in Atlantic during the day, to oversee the work of completing the church building, but he drives over every night to meeting. Nearly every evening we also have present a number of brethren and sisters from Atlantic. It helps the interest when others see our own people take sufficient interest to drive over from Atlantic regularly. This is truly a manifestation of the gift of "helps," and will not lose its reward even here. if exercised for the love of the truth, which it is.

#### THE CANVASSER'S PRIVILEGES.
