Our Responsibility To Open Work In New Places

By Robert H. Pierson

THE SERVANT of the Lord has much to say about entering dark communities, bringing them the light of present truth. She also emphasizes the need of nurturing the work in places where we have a few believers in a company or Sabbath School so that such groups may be built up into good strong church organizations. Note well the following words from the pen of inspiration:

"I have been shown that more can now be accomplished by labouring in places where a few have been raised up, than in entirely new fields, unless the opening is very good. A few in different towns who really believe in the truth, will exert an influence and excite inquiry in regard to their faith; and if their lives are exemplary, their light will shine, and they will have a gathering influence. And yet, I was shown places where the truth has not been proclaimed, which should be visited soon. But the great work now to be accomplished is to bring up the people of God to engage in the work, and exert a holy influence. They should act the part of labourers. With wisdom, caution, and love, they should labour for the salvation of neighbours and friends. There is too distant a feeling manifested. The cross is not laid right hold of, and borne as it should be. All should feel that they are their brother's keeper; that they are in a great degree responsible for the souls of those around them. The brethren err when they leave this work all to

the ministers. The harvest is great and the labourers are few. Those who are of good repute, whose lives are

in accordance with their faith can be workmen. They can converse with others, and urge upon them the importance of the truth. They must not wait for the ministers, and neglect a plain duty which God has left for them to perform." Test., Vol. I, p. 368, First Paragraph.

"The vineyard includes the whole world, and every part of it is to be worked. There are places which are now a moral wilderness, and these are to become as the garden of the Lord. The waste places of the earth are to be cultivated, that they may bud and blossom as the rose. New territories are to be worked by men inspired by the Holy Spirit. New churches must be established, new congregations organized. At this time there should be representatives of present truth in every city, and in the remote parts of the earth. The whole earth is to be illuminated with the glory of God's truth. The light is to shine to all lands and all people. And it is from those who have received the light that it is to shine forth. The day-star has risen upon us, and we are to flash its light upon the pathway of those in darkness." Test., Vol. VI, p. 24.

Sunday Schools and Branch Sabbath Schools

Realizing that Sunday Schools and Branch Sabbath Schools can help us win many souls for God, it was voted to recommend:

- That every Sabbath School be encouraged to establish at least one Branch Sabbath School.
- That the District Pastor visit every church in his district during the first quarter and help the church to establish Branch Sabbath Schools by encouraging them to set a goal of one or more Branch Sabbath Schools or Community Sunday Schools for each church.
- That the Mission Sabbath School Secretary should be encouraged to send a Branch Sabbath School bulletin once every six weeks to the Sabbath Schools in his field.

Missing Sabbath School Members

Recognizing that a more definite work needs to be done for the missing members, it was voted to urge that the Sabbath School Council of each church give earnest and prayerful consideration to this matter; that all church members be enrolled in the Sabbath School classes; that each class become responsible for its missing members and that certain individuals be asked to visit the absent member. We further strongly urge that the teachers assign to the students of their classes the responsibility of visiting any absent members that very day.

Recognizing the fact that literature plays a great part in the promulgation of the message, it was voted to recommend the following:

- Systematic Tract Distribution Programme:
 - That a strong programme of systematic tract distribution be launched in each church in the Union.
 - That we order these tracts in quantities to cover not less than fifty (50) homes at a time, and that the first Sabbath Offering each month be used to purchase the literature.
 - General Information:
 - That definite follow-up work be planned to win the interested people to Christ through:
 - Organization of a Community Bible School.
 - Establishment of a Circulating Library, using eight of the Crisis Series Books, as follows:
 - So Little Time
 - Signs of Christ's Coming
 - Steps to Christ
 - Health at Home

Sabbath School Lesson Study Period

In order to encourage a deeper study of the Word of God and to develop a better understanding of the great truths as presented in our Sabbath School Lesson Quarterlies, it was voted to recommend that the following plan be adopted by the local mission Sabbath School Departments of the British West Indies Union:

- That we encourage our Sabbath School teachers to preview the lesson of the coming week at the close of the lesson study, assigning to each student a certain phase of the lesson on which he should do special research work during the week.
- That the Sabbath School lesson study be closed by the following three signals:
 - At the end of twenty-five minutes first bell will ring.
 - Two minutes later the lesson study will close by second bell.
 - During the final three minutes, assignments for the next week's lesson will be distributed by teachers to their students, this period closing by ringing of third bell.
- It is understood that the students will be encouraged to study the entire lesson as well as the special assignments.
- That we re-emphasize the importance of daily study.

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The Church's Field for Soul-Winning — Who Are We Going to Work for?

The Gospel invitation is to be given to the rich and the poor, the high and the low, and we must devise means for carrying the truth into new places, and to all classes of people." *Medical Ministry*, p. 312.

What a vast field has been opened by God and what a challenge to His church today! In this short article I shall deal with just three groups of people for whom we should earnestly pray and work.

Jesus instructed His disciples to begin in Jerusalem before going out to Judea and Samaria. Begin in your own home. Do you have an unconverted father or mother, brother or sister, son or daughter, or other near relatives or close friends? Have you ever thought what heaven will be to you if your closest friends and relatives are not there to share its joys with you? Are they not more precious to you than other people's relatives and friends? Begin today to pray that God will give you the wisdom and grace to labour and to win those of your own household.

Living around every church, there are some who once stood on "the Rock" but whose feet have slipped back into the miry pit of sin—the backsliders.

"Lord thou has here Thy ninety and nine;

Are they not enough for Thee?

But the Shepherd made answer:

'One of mine has wander'd away from me;

And although the road be rough and steep,

I go to the desert to find my sheep.'"

The backslider is very precious to the Lord and ought to be just as precious in the sight of His church. How apt we are to say—"Ephraim is joined to his idols, let him alone"; but Jesus says: "How shall I give thee up, Ephraim." Perhaps there is no class that is harder to win than the backsliders, for these cannot be won by argument. They already know all the arguments, and in many cases, know the doctrines better than we do ourselves. They can only be won by LOVE. They must see in our attitude toward them a deep, earnest, and sincere love for their souls; and this will

melt their hearts and bring them back to Jesus. Then "Ephraim shall say, what have I to do any more with idols? I heard him and observed him. I am like a green fir tree. From me is thy fruit found." Hosea 14:3.

The third class is a large group who cannot be induced to come to our churches. "The gospel invitation is to be given to the rich and the high"; what are we doing to reach them?

"We talk and write much of the neglected poor: should not some attention be given to the neglected rich? Many look upon this class as hopeless, and they do little to open the eyes of those who, blinded and dazed by the power of Satan, have lost eternity out of their reckoning. Thousands of wealthy men have gone to their graves unwarned, because they have been judged by appearances, and passed by as hopeless subjects. But, indifferent as they may appear, I have been shown that most of this class are soul-burdened. There are thousands of rich men who are starving for spiritual food. Many in official life feel their need of something which they have not. Few among them go to church; for they feel that they receive no benefit. The teaching they hear does not touch the soul. Shall we make no personal effort in their behalf?" —*Test.*, Vol. VI, p. 78.

"Men in high positions of trust in the world will be charmed by a plain, straightforward, Scriptural statement of truth." *Evangelism.*, p. 557.

The harvest field is white, brethren, and shall we not go in and reap it for the Lord? "All power is given unto me in heaven and in earth... and, lo, I am with you always"—Surely with this attendant power we can gather in a rich harvest for the Lord.

Finding Your Place

(A Message to the Young People of the B. W. I. Union)

PART II

In Part I of this article, which appeared in the March issue of the VISITOR, I emphasized that it is "Backbone" and not "Wishbone" that a young person must have if he wishes to succeed today. Further I mentioned the importance of combining consecration and determination. These suggestions are of paramount importance if you wish to find a place in the Lord's work.

In keeping with my promise I now want to tell you of twenty-five open doors into various types of work in different parts of the British West Indies Union. Some of these openings are waiting just now for young men and women, properly trained and who are not afraid to work, to come along and step into them. As chairman of seven boards and committees I know that we are always on the lookout for young men and women who have the consecrated determination to work and make good to fit into constantly occurring openings. But let me emphasize again, we are looking for folk who want a *job* and not a *position*—those who will throw their whole lives unreservedly into the task of making full proof of their calling.

Now for the 25 openings:

1. Science and Mathematics teachers—Young men and women having qualified themselves in our schools abroad.
2. Laboratory Technicians—Our growing medical work urgently needs qualified Seventh-day Adventist Laboratory Technicians.
3. X-ray Technicians—A field in which a young man or a young woman with a college background could prepare himself or herself by taking about a year's course in one of our Institutions in America.
4. Physical Therapists—Our island field with its large tourist trade offers unique opportunities to young men and women to prepare themselves to open treatment rooms in different parts of the islands and make good as self-supporting missionaries.
5. Doctors.
6. Nurses—both men and women.
7. Dentists.
8. Ministers—Young men upon whom the Divine imperative has rested so heavily that they cry out with Paul, "Woe is unto me if I preach not the gospel." If you are looking for a white collar job don't enter the ministry. This is a *calling!* Unless God has definitely made your call

15. Accountants—With our rapidly developing institutional programme there will be an increasing demand for first-class accountants.

18. Home Economic Teachers.
- 19-24—Industrial supervisors and foremen for our college industries—Bakery, Press, Sheet Metal Shop, Wood Products Department, Farm and Dairy. Many of our youth have not been called to the professions but have been given special talent to work with their hands. If this ability could be combined with the proper education, positions of responsibility and trust could be assumed. Some of our young men should decide to make life careers of these industrial opportunities.
25. Colporteurs—The literature ministry demands the best and the Spirit of Prophecy confirms that many of our College Graduates as well as others should decide to make this their life's work. We need some graduates here in the B. W. I. Union to follow this counsel.

In addition to the above openings within the structure of our denominational programme many others exist outside where one with the determination can make a living and obey God's commandments. Carpenters, cultivators, plumbers, bakers, printers, etc., etc., can serve the Lord!

While all of the above mentioned 25 and more posts are not open at present some are and others will open up from time to time as vacancies occur. The time to prepare to step into the one of your choice is now.

Again I say the Lord has a definite place for every young man and woman who has accepted Him as their Saviour. Pray and work diligently with consecrated determination and He will help you find yours!

Do You Have an Ananias or Sapphira in Your Church?

The brief but terrible history of Ananias and Sapphira is traced by the pen of inspiration for the benefit of all who profess to be followers of Christ. This important lesson has not rested with sufficient weight upon the minds of our people. It will be profitable for all to thoughtfully consider the nature of the grievous offense for which these guilty ones were made an example. This one marked evidence of God's retributive justice is fearful, and should lead all to fear and tremble to repeat sins which brought such a punishment. Selfishness was the great sin which had warped the characters of this guilty couple.

With others, Ananias and his wife Sapphira had the privilege of hearing the gospel preached by the apostles. The power of God attended the word spoken, and deep conviction rested upon all present. The softening influence of the grace of God had the effect upon their hearts to cause them to release their selfish hold upon their earthly possessions. While under the direct influence of the Spirit of God, they made a pledge to give to the Lord certain lands; but when they were no longer under this heavenly influence the impression was less forcible, and they began to question and draw back from fulfilling the pledge which they had made. They thought that they had been too hasty, and wished to reconsider the matter. Thus a door was opened by which Satan at once entered, and gained control of their minds.

This case should be a warning to all to guard against the first approach of Satan. Covetousness was first cherished; then, ashamed to have their brethren know that their selfish souls grudged that which they had solemnly dedicated and pledged to God, deception was practiced. They talked the matter over together, and deliberately decided to withhold a part of the price of the land. When convicted of their falsehood, their punishment was instant death. They knew that the Lord, whom they had defrauded, had searched them out: for Peter said, "Why hath Satan filled thine heart to lie to the Holy Ghost, and to keep back part of the price of the land? Whiles it remained, was it not thine own? and after it was sold, was it not in thine own power? Why hast thou conceived this thing in thine heart? Thou hast not lied unto men, but unto God."

A special example was necessary to guard the young church from becoming memorialized; for their numbers were rapidly increasing. A warning was thus

given to all who professed Christ at that time, and to all who should afterward profess His name, that God requires faithfulness in the performance of vows. But notwithstanding this signal punishment of deception and lying, the same sins have often been repeated in the Christian church, and are wide-spread in our day. I have been shown that God gave this example as a warning to all who should be tempted to act in a similar manner. Selfishness and fraud are practised daily in the church in withholding from God that which he claims, thus robbing Him, and conflicting with His arrangements to diffuse the light and knowledge of truth throughout the length and breadth of the land.

God, in His wise plans, has made the advancement of His cause dependent upon the personal efforts of His people, and upon their free-will offerings. By accepting the cooperation of man in the great plan of redemption, He has placed a signal honour upon him. The minister cannot preach except he be sent. The work of dispensing light does not rest upon the ministers alone. Every person, upon becoming a member of the church, pledges himself to be a representative of Christ by living out the truth he professes. The followers of Christ should carry forward the work which He left for them to do when He ascended into Heaven.

Institutions that are God's instruments to carry forward His work on the earth must be sustained. Churches must be erected, schools established, and publishing houses furnished with facilities for doing a great work in the publication of the truth to be sent to all parts of the world. These institutions are ordained of God, and should be sustained by the and liberal offerings. As the work enlarges, means will be needed to carry it forward in all its branches. Those who have been converted to the truth, and been made partakers of His grace, may become co-workers with Christ by making voluntary sacrifice and free-will offerings to Him. And when the members of the church wish in their hearts that there would be no more calls for means, they virtually say that they are content that the cause of God shall not progress.

Pray with and for them; talk over their problems with them; encourage them in their journey heavenward; pray and counsel with those who have erred. Make your fellow member feel that you really care for him. Let the ministers and church leaders in all our churches go into the homes of weaker believers and keep

the fires of love and truth burning in their hearts.

Recently, one of our ministers had the pleasure of visiting all the members in their homes, praying with and for them and strengthening them in the Lord. Although each member expressed gratitude to God for such a visit, the worker left each home more refreshed and happy with the love of God filling his own soul.

"This is the first time I have ever had a visit from a worker. oh, I am so glad you have come. I was discouraged and my faith was waning, but now I am encouraged and want to make a new start for the kingdom." Such expressions cheered the worker's own heart. Another said, "For fifteen years I have been a member, and this is the first time a worker has ever come to my home. Sometimes we feel awfully left out." One sister with tear-stained cheeks said between sobs, "I know I have fallen from the principles of the church. I know I'll have to be disfellowshipped, but won't you please pray for me because I want to come back to God." As the worker prayed with her, there seemed to come a light upon her face as she said, "God is still gracious and merciful to me, and, my dear brother, your visit has given me a new start in the Christian life."

Not only the members and backsliders will benefit from personal visits and personal work, but those outside the fold also. One great soul-winner said, "Soul-winning is like catching fish; when one is caught, you want to catch another. There are today right around us souls who are longing for the light that we have. Would to God that we would heed the message from above and go out two by two or in little groups to give the message of hope to the people all around us. Souls are crying! Souls are dying! Will we rest idly on our oars when the waves of sin are raging? Won't the blood of men and women be required at our hands if we fail by personal work to give the message?"

People on every hand, everywhere are interested to know that someone cares for their personal salvation. Brother, sister, wherever and whatever your station in life might be, you can, by your own effort through the power of Christ, draw souls to the Master.

"Let us then be up and doing

Still achieving, still pursuing
Learn to labour and to wait.

Our Responsibility to Open Work in New Places

Union we are under divine obligation to respond to this challenge. We have scores of struggling little companies throughout our field that could, with a little consecrated effort be built up into good strong church organizations.

At the beginning of 1947 several of the Mission Committees took actions designating certain companies that they planned to concentrate on in an effort to build them up into organized churches. In the Bahamas Mission the committee selected Pleasant Bay, Tarpum Bay, Moss Town, Clifton and Little Creek. In the East Jamaica Mission their committee selected John's Hall, Moore Town, Shewsberry, Black Hill, Belle View, Seven Miles, Priestman's River, Danver's Pen, White Horses, Rock Hole, Hagley Gap, Devon Pen, Wilmington, Dumfries, Bull Bay, Woodburn, Cavalier, Mt. James, Mt. Rosser, Gordon Town, Windsor, Comfort Castle, Heywood Hall and Long Road.

A number of these companies were actually organized into strong churches during 1947. Others, because of the special efforts put forth, were developed considerably and will doubtless reach their goal in 1948. Many others should be encouraged by Mission Officers, District Pastors, neighbouring churches, and leaders from within their midst to put on strong missionary programmes that will mean their building up as strong units to mother other branches into churchhood.

The following programme was carefully planned and prayerfully voted to assist in developing our small companies into strong churches:

(a) That the companies be visited by conference workers and organized for missionary work.

(b) That prayer lists be compiled including the names of all unbaptized juniors and young people of Adventist homes in the district, unconverted husbands and wives, sons and daughters of members, and interested persons. That a prayer band be organized to pray regularly for these individuals.

(c) That a baptismal class be formed and carefully and regularly instructed.

(d) That literature bands be organized to faithfully undertake the systematic literature distribution programme. (See the Home Missionary Department page for details of this plan.)

(e) That special work be done for the persons mentioned in (b).

(f) That arrangements be made between the mission officers and the com-

pany leaders concerned for strong, short evangelistic efforts to be held in places where members of companies will work earnestly as outlined above to create and develop a good interest.

We appeal to each mission officer and departmental secretary, district pastor and church leader to give careful and prayerful consideration to this plan built upon the instruction of the Spirit of Prophecy to enter the unentered or partially entered districts. With judicious planning, much prayer and a little well-organized effort our weak work in certain communities can be greatly strengthened and new districts entered.

May God give us all a wider vision of the great unfinished task before us!
